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WINDOWS 7 TO BE DEMONSTRATED ON TECH NIGHT

Talented CKCS member Matt Snoddy is scheduled to unveil a beta version of Windows 7 on Monday, March 9 starting at 7:00 PM at the CKCS Resource Center. Windows 7 is the latest Microsoft product scheduled to replace Windows Vista toward the end of this year or early next year. The dictionary offers one definition of the word "beta" as "ready for customer testing".

Actually Matt has been testing Windows 7 Beta for many months now and offering suggestions to Microsoft for improvements. As a result of Matthew's input along with a million other testers, Microsoft has made more than three dozen changes to the beta product thus far. Included in the changes, is a new keyboard shortcut that allows the user to launch an application simply by pressing



the windows logo in combination with a number that corresponds to the apps' order in the Quick Launch menu. For example, if an application is listed fourth in Quick Launch, it could be opened by pressing the Windows key in concert with the number 4 key. It is conceivable one could have a desktop screen with almost no icons on it.

CKCS Members and their guests should find this presentation informative as the details of this exciting new computer product is demonstrated.

What Every Mac User Should Know, Part II

Just bought your first Mac?

Been using a Mac for awhile?

No matter. You've probably got questions no one has answered.

This second series of questions and answers hopes to resolve some of those issues.

1. What's the Finder?

To many folks, the Finder is what makes the Mac a Mac. When you first boot up your machine and the Desktop loads, the Dock appears, and your menu bar clock ticks away, the Finder is active. It's been compared to Windows Explorer in Microsoft Windows and Konquerer in the Linux version called KDE. The Finder is where the user manages his or her files, copies documents, and gets work done. You can tell the Finder is active if "Finder" is shown to the right of the black or blue apple in your Mac's menu bar.

2. Do I need to download Adobe Acrobat Reader to open .pdf documents?

No. Any version of Mac OS X released since 2001 will automatically open Acrobat Reader documents when you double-click on them. It's built into the operating system. A program called Preview automatically opens Reader files and lets you annotate them. My experience has been that Adobe Acrobat Reader on the Mac is guite sluggish and pales in comparison to Preview.

3. What's a widget?

A number of years ago, Apple introduced an item in the OS X Dock called Dashboard. Click on that icon and you'll access your Mac's widgets, or tiny programs designed to provide weather, sports, stocks, flight schedules and other valuable information. You can download several thousand widgets here: http://www.apple.com/downloads/dashboard/.

4. I'm used to clicking on an "X" in Windows to close a program. How do I perform a similar function in Mac OS X?

By clicking on the program's name in the menu bar and then then clicking on Quit Mail, or Quit Word, or Quit (enter your favorite program's name here). The keyboard way of guitting nearly every Mac program is by holding down the Command key (also called Apple key) and then typing the "g" key. You don't guit a Mac program by clicking the red dot on the upper left hand corner of the document's window. That *closes* a document or file but doesn't *quit* the program.

5. How do I get information about a specific file or program on my Mac?

Click once on the icon so it's highlighted. Then hold down the Command key and type an "i" for information. A vertical box will open on the left-hand side of your screen showing all kinds of details. This is similar to what Windows calls "properties." In the Mac way, you want to "Get Info" about a specific file.

6. How much room is left in my hard drive?

Click once on your Mac's hard drive so it's highlighted. Then use the "Get Info" command by tapping on the Command key and typing "i." A vertical box will open displaying your hard drive's capacity, available space, and how much space is used, in addition to many other details.

7. How did you learn about the Mac?

I bought my first Macintosh in 1992 at a Sear's Department Store. Back then, I read all the Macworld Magazines I could, I read the manuals which came with the computer (remember those days), and I visited plenty of Web sites and Usenet newsgroups to learn about the nifty beige computer. A few years later, I joined CKCS and learned more about computers there than from any other source. In 1998 when the first iMac was introduced, I bought one and learned all I could about OS 9. In 2001, I began upgrading to early versions of OS X (pronounced "10," like the number and not "X" like the letter.)

8. What's Time Machine?

The easiest method I've ever discovered of backing-up a computer. If you own Mac OS (operating system) 10.5 (also called Leopard), you have Time Machine. To use it, you need to connect an external hard drive to your machine, click on the Time Machine icon in System Preferences and choose to back-up. One caveat: Your hard drive must be formatted in HFS Plus filing system with Journal enabled.

9. What's your favorite Mac browser?

I must have Norwegian blood somewhere in my past because I actually prefer Opera. You know, Opera, the browser created in Norway? I also use Apple Safari as well as Mozilla Firefox. But Opera just seems to load faster on my desktop Mac as well as the MacBook (laptop model). My hunch is that most Mac users choose Safari because it comes pre-loaded and they don't have to download it. Opera is actually more popular on mobile devices such as smart phones and personal digital assistants as well as the Nintendo DS and Wii gaming systems. Opera introduced the Mac version of its browser in 2000. Okay, it's not the most beautiful browser of them all, but for me it's one of the best. I do make sure that I update Opera every time a new version is introduced. For security reasons, it's wise to update your browser often no matter which one you use most.

10. Pick one of your favorite Web sites and share it with us.

Google and LIFE (remember the old LIFE Magazine?) have teamed up to offer dozens of old photos here: http://images.google.com/hosted/life

I have spotted Civil War photos, happy children more than 120 years ago playing with hula-hoops in New York City, and World War I photos that simply amazed me. You can search by decade, by keyword, or by category. Every history lover should check this out. Honest.
