



Mac Article

June & July are busy months

The links below will help answer questions about what Lion offers and whether the new operating system is for you.

In addition, owners of Apple devices, including the iPad, iPhone, and iPod Touch, will want to view the links below to see what's in store when iOS 5 comes their way this fall.

One thing is certain. Technology is never boring, it never sits still, and CKCS continues to be a vital place where folks can learn how to get more out of their computers, their gadgets, and devices.

Get ready for OS X Lion and iOS 5

Millions of Mac users and owners of Apple devices are looking forward to the July release of new operating systems. Mac users will need to download OS X Lion through the Mac App Store. Apple has said that iOS 5 (runs iPad, iPhone and iPod Touch) will be available for download by fall.

As I write this in late June, here are some questions and answers about the soon to be introduced operating system upgrades.

OS X Lion How much will OS X Lion cost? \$30.

Can I buy a DVD containing Lion as I purchased Leopard and Snow Leopard before it?

Apple says Lion will be available in July from the Mac App Store. In other words, you will buy and



download the upgrade by clicking on your Mac's Mac App Store icon and downloading Lion. News reports say Lion <u>won't</u> be available in DVD format. *Macworld* <u>reports</u> there won't be any option to order a Lion DVD or buy it from Apple's brick and mortar stores.

I work in a school with dozens of Macs. How do we upgrade all those machines located in our building without a DVD?

If you're buying Lion for a school, you can upgrade through your Apple Education account rep. or via Apple's <u>online Education Store</u>. Reports from *Macworld* indicate that Lion will automatically be bundled with iWork and iLife as part of Apple's Software Collection. Pricing for schools will be \$39 per license (with a minimum of 25 licenses.)

I work in a business that uses quite a few Macs. How do we upgrade to Lion?

Businesses will be able to buy Lion and Lion Server through Apple's <u>online Business Store</u> or by phoning Apple's business line. Businesses will be able to buy volume licenses for \$30 a license with a minimum purchase of 20 licenses. Again, Macworld outlines the process for businesses upgrading to Lion and discusses <u>maintenance contracts</u> and other details.

I just bought a Mac and want to upgrade to Lion. Do I have to pay the \$30 purchase price?

If you bought a new Mac on or after June 6 (and the Mac meets the requirements to run Lion), you should be entitled to a free upgrade. Apple runs an <u>Up-to-Date program</u> that allows buyers of new Macs to upgrade to Lion without paying the purchase price.

I don't have DSL or cable Internet service. I have a very slow dial–up service. I know. It's so 90's—but I'm trying to save money. A friend who lives in the country and has a slow satellite Internet connection asked the same question. What about us?

A story in <u>Computerworld</u> indicates that owners of Mac laptops may bring their machines into any Apple Store and use the store's Wi–Fi connection to download Lion when it becomes available in July. Genius Bar reps. won't install Lion—but Mac owners are free to download the 4GB upgrade and install it themselves.

The *Computerworld* article quotes a Mac user living in southern California where fast DSL or cable Internet apparently is unavailable. "We live in the San Diego mountains and must rely on satellite provided by Wild Blue," wrote John LaPlante. "It would take us over 10 hours for us to download the 4GB program and I'm not sure if the system would allow me online for that long." The article adds that customers don't need to make an appointment with the Genius Bar and may simply walk in with their Mac laptop to download the operating system upgrade.

This doesn't address a customer owning a heavy iMac with a 27–inch screen. But if you own a Mac laptop, you could simply save the installer on that machine and copy it to the iMac for installation on that machine when you get home.

You haven't mentioned which machines are eligible for an upgrade to Lion.

There are several <u>requirements</u>. Your Mac must meet the upgrade guidelines. You must have Snow Leopard installed on your machine (or a Snow Leopard DVD to upgrade the machine first.) And you must have at least Snow Leopard version 10.6.6 because that's the specific operating system upgrade that installed the Mac App Store.

Macs containing an Intel Core 2 Duo, Core i3, Core i5, Core i7, or Xeon processor qualify. Click on the black apple on the upper left–hand corner of your screen. In the drop–down menu, click on *About This Mac* to see which processor is powering your Mac. If your Mac contains a blue apple, you're running an older version of OS X and the machine probably has an older processor installed.

My two–year–old Mac mini qualifies since it's got an Intel Core 2 Duo processor. An older iMac, MacBook or other Mac will run Lion as long as it meets the requirements mentioned above.

Can I erase my hard drive and install Lion from scratch?

You should be able to erase your hard drive, install Snow Leopard from a DVD and then install Lion. But you need Snow Leopard to first download Lion. If you don't have Snow Leopard, it <u>won't work</u>. Apple CEO Steve Jobs <u>mentioned</u> this in an email response to someone who asked about installing Lion on a new hard drive. Lion requires Snow Leopard to download, but Lion doesn't require you to upgrade over an existing Snow Leopard installation, according to several <u>reports</u>.

What does OS X Lion have to offer?

Apple says Lion offers <u>250 new features</u> including multi-touch gestures, full-screen apps, Launchpad, and Mission Control.

iOS 5 Available This Fall

What about iOS5—the operating system that powers the iPad, the iPhone and the iPad Touch? Apple has indicated it would be <u>free</u>, offer 200 new <u>features</u>, and become available in the fall.

Some of the major new <u>features</u> include a new notification, system, integrated Twitter, new email program and other upgrades.

So bring your iPhone, iPad, or iPod Touch, or just bring your curiosity and your questions and we'll take it from there.



You have been directed here to download and install the beta version of **Microsoft Standalone System Sweeper** Beta, a recovery tool that can help you start an infected PC and perform an offline scan to help identify and remove rootkits and other advanced malware. In addition, Microsoft Standalone System Sweeper Beta can be used if you cannot install or start an antivirus solution on your PC, or if the installed solution cannot detect or remove malware on your PC.
