



Both are oriented to helping users create family movies on DVD using photos and music. Both are on the CKCS class schedule from January 18th through Feb 22nd.

The DVD course demonstrates use of the DVD maker product built into Windows 7. This software provides simple tools for copying photos to DVD, adding music, and making a movie that you can play on a DVD player or modern TV set.

The Digitizing and Converting course provides instruction in converting photos, videos, music and other audio into digital form so it can be treated as computer files. Once converted into standard computer data, it can be edited, rearranged and reproduced into many entertaining forms including making DVDs.


Road map on your windshield

If you've ever struggled with your PC's BIOS, Windows 8 will pull the PC industry out of the BIOS, Basic Input/Output System (30 Years) generation and into a more capable Unified Extensible Firmware Interface.

When a PC powers up, the BIOS checks all hardware, then opens Windows and hands control of the computer over to Windows. The **BIOS** sits on a chip on the motherboard and is difficult to update.

The **UEFI** can access all PC hardware, including the mouse, network connections, modern video cards, monitors, access the Internet, make dual-booting simpler and can exist on a disk, just like any other program.

Businesses discover Macs


Prediction: In 2012, sales of Macs and iPads to business will climb 58%

 (Apple's) rapid growth in the corporate market has been the big surprise of 2011, and it will be even more of a factor in 2012."
— Andrew Bartels, an analyst with Forrester Research

Macs are making inroads into many companies that used to be nearly





Recently, *The Wall Street Journal* <u>profiled</u> General Electric's acceptance of Macs and Apple iPhones. For more than a year, the giant multinational firm has operated a pilot program allowing employees to choose a Mac desktop or laptop rather than a Windows PC.

Under the pilot program, 1,000 G.E. workers now use Macs. That is expected to skyrocket after word of the pilot program spreads

throughout the company. The Journal article indicated that G.E. has about 330,000 computers.

Workers throughout the firm's different divisions will be able to participate in the program as long as there aren't issues with security clearance or compatibility problems with software.

In 2011, CNN Money released an updated list of the Fortune 500 and General Electric ranked sixth, behind Wal–Mart, Exxon Mobil, Chevron, ConocoPhillips and Fannie Mae.

G.E. is well known for producing a long list of products, ranging from refrigerators and stoves to light bulbs. It also owns NBC–TV, MSNBC, CNBC, and Bravo.

Other companies making a switch include Boston Scientific. That firm is <u>switching</u> to Apple's tablet computer, the iPad. The company, known for its medical devices, anticipates using only iPads instead of desktop and laptop computers by year's end.



Law firms, politicians, newspaper publishers, web development firms, financial holding companies, Web page coders, cloud, networking, and virtualization tech firms, and others are now using Macs.

One trend encouraging the switch is the decision by more and more companies to allow employees to pick their own computing devices. A *New York Times* story last fall said it this way, "Employees are now bringing in the technology they use at home and demanding the I.T. department accommodate them. The I.T. department often complies."

"Bring your own device" policies, as they are called, are also shifting the balance of power among electronics makers. Manufacturers good at selling to consumers are increasingly gaining the upper hand, while those focused on bulk corporate sales are slipping, the *Times* article added.

With iPad popularity growing, Mac SIG gets new name

Apple's computer tablet, the iPad, is steadily growing in popularity, as is the Macintosh computer. So we've decided to rename the monthly Mac SIG. It's now called the Mac and iPad SIG. The SIG (special interest group) meeting is held the second Thursday of the month at 7 p.m.

iPad users are invited to bring their tablet computers to the meetings. The SIG hopes to address issues not only facing Mac users, but also folks who use iPads. In addition, The Mac Corner, the CKCS web site



directed toward Mac and iPad users, has now been renamed The Mac and iPad Corner.

In October of last year, Apple <u>reported</u> all time record Mac and iPad sales figures. During its fourth quarter, the company sold 11 million iPads, a 166% increase over the previous year. Mac sales were also climbing rapidly. In the fourth quarter, Apple sold nearly five–million Macs, a 26% increase over the year before.

Numbers: Just who's buying all these iPads? The <u>Wall Street Journal</u>, <u>Yahoo!</u>, and others were busy in 2011 crunching the figures. As of April 2011, a study by comScore Inc. revealed that 7.8 million people in the U.S. owned iPads and more than half were men. Yahoo's research revealed that ten percent of iPad users viewing its web content were from outside the United States. The U.K., France, and Germany were the top iPad using countries in Europe, and in the Asia Pacific region, Taiwan and Hong Kong led the pack.

My memory's not as sharp as it used to be. Also, my memory's not as sharp as it used to be.





Considering switching from Word to Pages?



machines. Others have decided to take the leap and begin using Pages full-time. If you've recently decided to switch to Pages, TidBit's Tonya Engst wrote a <u>piece</u> that might prove invaluable.

Strategies for Switching from Word to Pages provides a first–hand account of what it's like to make the switch. Tonya, with her husband, Adam, publishes one of the oldest Mac–oriented web sites on the Internet. She describes how her company migrated its Take Control ebook series from Microsoft Word 2008 to Pages '09.

Tonya wrote, "Now that the commotion from the transition has died down, I want to share the strategies we used in switching from Word to Pages, along with some of my favorite Pages tips."

Her advice is golden for Pages users who want to quickly get up to speed and get more out of Apple's word processing software. She said one mistake common among long–time Word users who've decided to switch is to "assume that if you look long enough in the menus and dialogs, you'll encounter all the important commands available."



As a frequent traveler might help a new flier at a busy airport, Tonya helps the Word user adjust to the changes between the two programs, and thereby dramatically lowers the switcher's frustration level. She points out the valuable <u>Pages Apple Support Community</u>, designed to serve Pages users who are stuck, bewildered or downright frustrated.

She concludes her article with this: "Although it was fairly easy to write this article, it was not easy to learn everything that I've mentioned in it. It would have been all the harder had I not been part of a small working group of smart and good-spirited people who could commiserate with my woes and

sometimes point out options that I'd overlooked."

Well put. If you're thinking about switching, or you just want to learn more about how Pages differs from Word, check out Tonya's TidBits article.

Because both Word and Pages are so popular, readers were quick to sound off. Richard Reitz might have said it best: "Wow! Did I need this article. Thanks so much for sharing your experiences with the rest of us."

Free Widget Makes Keyboard Shortcuts a Snap

I use keyboard shortcuts because they're:

- A. Time Savers
- B. Easier than using the mouse or trackpad or trackball
- C. Very easy to use thanks to FlashKards
- D. All of the above

The answer? D. All of the above.

I don't have to move my mouse, trackball, or hands on Magic Trackpad to the menu bar at the very top of the screen. That saves me plenty of time. In addition, using the keyboard, for me, is easy since that's where my hands are already placed.

Finally, a free <u>widget</u> from dashkards helps me quickly remember keyboard shortcuts. (To download the widget, click on the Download link on the dashkards <u>page</u>.)

Then, when you save the widget to your Mac, you'll get a giant list of keyboard shortcuts for many programs, including Mac OS X, Pages, Apple Mail, Gmail, Google Docs, iPhoto, Numbers, Keynote, Safari,

Google Chrome, Acorn, Pixelmator, Aperture, the Magic Trackpad, Transmit, Tweetie, Twitter, Wordpress, Mac OS X Special Characters, Mac OS X Text, and more.

The Beginning of the End For Paper Textbooks?

From a child's first day at school to the day he graduates from college and beyond, he or she is surrounded by one constant: paper textbooks. Heavy and expensive, paper textbooks have been a part of school from almost the very beginning. Now, all that might slowly be changing thanks to Apple's recent release of its <u>iBooks 2 app</u>.

The app allows iPad users to buy and download textbooks to their tablet computer. The <u>iBooks 2 app</u> allows digital textbooks to display audio, video, and interactive diagrams, which have the potential to turn traditional textbooks into paper dinosaurs.

During Apple's mid–January announcement of iBooks 2, it was learned that textbook publishers Houghton Mifflin and Pearson, McGraw–Hill are already offering several math and science titles beginning at \$14.99 (or less.)

Apple also released a new tool called iBooks Author. The free software allows users to develop interactive textbooks.


iBooks 2 is an iOS app and can be downloaded from the iOS App Store.

In addition, Apple announced a new <u>iTunes U app</u>, allowing colleges and universities to deliver content to anyone using an iPad, iPhone

or iPod touch. The free iTunes U app can be used to provide entire online course offerings, in addition to signing up students for classes.



Corel Introduces AfterShot Pro Software

Most Mac photo enthusiasts are quite familiar with the names Adobe Photoshop, Photoshop Elements, Photoshop Lightroom, Aperture, iPhoto, and possibly Pixelmator, Acorn, and Graphic Converter. Now Corel is offering fresh competition in its newly <u>announced</u> AfterShot Pro software.

Corel <u>says</u> its new product combines robust photo management, advanced non– destructive adjustments and complete RAW processing. AfterShot Pro allows the user to organize his photos in catalogs or folders.



AfterShot Pro works on Macs as well as Windows and Linux machines.

A PCMag.com <u>review</u> of AfterShot Pro praises the product for fast display of large RAW files, good auto–correction, and the ability to accept and include industry–standard plug–ins.

On the downside, PCMag.com says AfterShot Pro has a weak import feature and the interface could be friendlier. It says there is no dual-monitor support, very limited camera and lens profiles, no red-eye correction, and no web or email sharing features. Corel sells AfterShot Pro for \$99.

Keyboards That Switch Between Your Mac and iPhone

Canadian company Matias has just <u>introduced</u> some of the most unique <u>keyboards</u> you'll ever find. They allow you to switch typing between your Mac and your iPhone. Each of the three full–sized keyboards contains a button that toggles the typing between the two devices.

Matias makes several models: one for the Mac, the other for Windows machines.

As Electronista <u>explains</u>, the One Keyboard model uses a riser and dock connector to allow instant switching between the Mac and iPhone. The Slim One model has smaller keys, similar to Apple's USB keyboard. Finally, the Tactile One version is similar to the One Keyboard and contains a thicker case to take advantage of mechanical keyswitches and a USB 2.0 hub.

The <u>One Keyboard</u> sells for \$99.95. The <u>Slim One model</u> costs \$79.95. The <u>Tactile One</u> keyboard sells for \$199.95.

Starry Night Screensaver Is Back for the Mac

A very popular Mac screensaver is back. 23 years ago, Berkeley Systems released Starry Night as part of its After Dark collection. When activated, the screensaver showed lights streaming from city high-rise buildings as stars flickered in the sky. If you have a fond recollection of Starry Night first available in 1989, you'll be glad to know that it's back and available for modern Macs running OS X 10.5 (Leopard) and later versions of OS X. The screensaver is a free <u>download</u>. <u>Starry Night</u> was quite a popular Mac screensaver in its day, filling the screens of many Mac SE/30s and Mac IIcx models in the late '80s and early '90s. This You Tube <u>video</u> shows the screensaver running on a Mac with System 7 (Mac operating systems used to be the "system" rather than OS).

Apple reports record–breaking sales of Macs, iPhones, and iPads for fiscal 2012

Apple just recorded the best financial guarter ever, in the company's 36-year history. During the last three months of 2011, the maker of Macs, iPhones, iPads and iPods posted revenue of \$46 billion in sales and \$13 billion in profit.

This is the biggest quarterly revenue for a tech company in history, says David Goldman of CNNMoney.com.

Headlines reporting Apple's stellar quarter reported it this way:

Apple's earnings far exceed Wall Street expectations — L.A. Times Apple returns to form, blows Street targets away - Reuters Apple's astounding guarter and its unbelievable numbers — MercuryNews.com

Digging into Apple's numbers, reports show the iPhone, the Mac, and the iPad all played a role:

- Mac sales rose 26 percent to 5.2 million; The Mac was especially hot in Asia-Pacific. Mac sales set records for both desktops and laptops with especially strong growth for both the MacBook Pro and MacBook Air
- iPhone sales doubled over last year with the new iPhone 4S given the credit
- Revenue from iPad sales is up 99% over the same period last year; Apple says iPad sales topped expectations; 1.5 million iPads are now used by schools, universities and colleges
- Only Exxon has ever had a • more profitable quarter than the one Apple just reported

Very Strong iPhone Sales

iPhone generated \$24.42 billion revenue.

During the same quarter, all of Microsoft: \$20.89 billion.

More broadly, Apple revenue (\$46.33 billion) was more than twice Microsoft's, and net income nearly was (\$13.06 billion versus \$6.62 billion, respectively).

But it's the iPhone figure that really stands out. One product's revenues against an entire company's.

Microsoft's margins are better, but who wouldn't want more money in the bank?

- Apple spent enough on research and development in three months to pay for three Avatar movies. Avatar is one of the most expensive movies in history. Avatar cost \$237 million. In just three months, Apple spent a staggering \$758 million on R&D. All that R&D probably went

into the iPad 2, iCloud, iPhone 4S, Mac OS X Lion, iOS 5, the newest MacBook Air, and a host of products we don't know about

- After adjusting for inflation, Apple is a little over halfway to being able to finance *its own version* of the Apollo program all by itself
- iPod sales dropped to 15.4 million–down from 19 million sold during the same period one year ago; iPod touch now accounts for more than one–half of all iPod sales; Market share of the iPod still tops 70 percent according to company known as NPD which tracks sales

MacRumors dug into the numbers and provided even more figures.

Creating iTunes Playlist in Perfect Fashion

The Mac–oriented magazine and web site, MacLife, has <u>advice</u> for anyone who's ever wanted to create top–notch playlists in iTunes. If you want to organize your music according to genre, burn a CD to listen to music in the car, or just de–clutter your copy of iTunes, you'll find suggestions from Alan Stonebridge on how to create that perfect playlist.

Western Digital announces Thunderbolt hard drive

During the first few days of Macworld | iWorld 2012, hard drive maker, Western Digital introduced My Book Thunderbolt Duo. The external hard drive connects to a Mac via the Thunderbolt port and will support up to two 3.5–inch hard drives in a RAID setup (that means your data is backed up more than once–should one hard drive die, the data is available on the second hard drive.) Reports indicate that it's so fast that this hard drive will copy a full HD version of a movie file in 30 seconds. This is quite fast but not as fast as it might be. It appears that the bottleneck is the hard drive itself since hard drives have not kept pace with the speed of the ports on your Mac.

Cook predicts: One day, tablets will outsell PCs

During a conference call in late January when Apple announced its earnings report, the company's CEO, Tim Cook, predicted: "I think there will come a day that the tablet market is larger than the PC market."

When most of us think of tablets, we think of Apple's iPad. It's a \$9.1 billion business. Since Apple introduced the iPad in 2010, the computer maker has sold 55 million of them.

What's interesting is that Cook might just be right. He <u>admitted</u> that the iPad is cannibalizing some Mac sales (in other words, some people are opting to buy an iPad instead of a Mac laptop or desktop machine.) But Cook went on to say that the popular computer tablet is cannibalizing Windows PCs at an even greater level.

What's a CKCS member to make of all these <u>reports</u>? Here's my take. Use whatever device empowers you and makes you more productive.

If you find the iPad fills your need? Definitely use it. If an iPhone makes you more productive, try to learn iOS (that's the operating system powering the iPad, iPhone and iPod touch) and get the most out of it. Take some classes at CKCS (Debbie Settles teaches an iPad class and I assist) to get more out of your Windows PC, your Mac, or your iPad.

Cook might be accurate. But I know a number of folks living in central Kentucky who've replaced an aging Mac desktop or laptop over the past two years. All of them considered buying an iPad.



In the end, almost all have opted for another Mac. Some have bought an iPad at a later date and use both devices. But the Mac still takes center stage in their household to view the web, send email, keep their finances in check, organize and edit photos, listen to music, and keep their digital lives in order.

Love Dinosaurs? Go Inside their world in this app

Here's an iPad <u>app</u> that science teachers, dinosaur fans, and others will find absolutely eye–catching. MacRumors reports that British actor Stephen Fry has narrated the virtual encyclopedia app called *Inside the World of Dinosaurs*. It took more than one year to create, details 60 dinosaurs, contains 84 videos, 200 pages of text, and five hours of narration by Fry.

The app provides a glimpse of dinosaurs in 360 degrees and costs \$13.99. The app's <u>web site</u> says: "Experience over 310 fully rotatable 3D models. View the Monolophosaurus or the Deinonychus, leaping in mid–flight, in full 360 degrees."

A New Audiobooks Service Streams

A new service is targeting folks who are heavy users of audiobooks. These are sort of the modern books on tape.



Instead of reading your favorite books, you listen to them.

There are several different sources of audiobooks, including the very popular Audible.com (owned by Amazon); audiobooks provided by local libraries (through OverDrive, OneClickDigital, and others); and a few other sources.

A new streaming source is called Audiobooks.com. For \$25 a month, you get unlimited access to Audiobook's library. A potential downside is that these audiobooks cannot be downloaded to an iPod or other listening device. They must be streamed through a web browser on your Mac, iPhone, iPad, iPod touch or similar device. A *Macworld* <u>article</u> says the company intends to provide native iOS and Android apps later this year. So, let's say an iPhone user, could listen to his favorite books through the Audiobooks app on his phone rather than use the built–in Safari browser. In addition, the iPhone user could pick up where he left off when he begins to the same audiobook on his Mac.

I searched for several of my favorite artists and found the library to be somewhat slim. Since the site has just begun operating, odds are the library will grow. I am an Audible.com subscriber and have found that service to be the one by which I compare all other audiobook sites.

I am not overly impressed by the Lexington Library's audiobook service (I've written about this before.) In my opinion, OverDrive (such as that offered by the Paul Sawyier Library in Frankfort and many other libraries throughout the state) is a far better bet. Once Audiobooks.com grows, it might be your choice for audiobook listening. But if you prefer downloading audiobooks to your iPod and taking them with you, you'll want to find an alternative.

Stickies Devotees, Note This!

I have never really used the Mac's version of Post–It Notes, built into OS X, but I know folks who cannot do without them. Tell them their Stickies are gone and it's akin to telling them that someone stole their dog. To those folks, life just isn't the same without those portable notes found on their Macs. Apple calls them Stickies, and they're located in the Mac Applications folder.



Stickies are also part of the Mac widget system. So even if you're a fairly new Mac user, there's a pretty good chance you've come across these colorful notes. If you absolutely cannot live without Stickies (and you know who you are), make sure you read Lex Friedman's *Macworld* <u>article</u>.

He spells out how to create a new note simply by highlighting text (or images) and pressing this keyboard shortcut: Command + Shift + Y. Stickie devotees, this article is right up your alley!

INVESTMENT SIG


