Stay current and learn something new this fall

It's September and time to get back in school...or in our case, take some classes to learn something new.

Whether it's staying current with technology or learning a new program or skill, it's a good time to enroll in a class or a workshop. The classes generally run once a week for six weeks and the workshops are a one day deal for 2 to 3 hours.

Our photography classes are as abundant as our computer classes. If you don't want to invest in expensive software, take Joe Dietz's three-hour *FastStone Workshop* and learn how to straighten, crop and enhance your photos. You will also learn how to make a slide show with music and a contact sheet. If you've always wanted to learn about PhotoShop Elements, Anne Campbell's 3 hour workshop, *Quick and Easy Ways to Enhance Your Photos*, would be the ticket. If you really want more sophisticated skills in fixing your pictures, take the six week class, *Beginning Digital Imaging with PaintShop Pro*. In this class you will learn how to scan your old photos and slides, lighten and restore the color in old photos, fix red eye, lighten and darken photos and many more tools to fix your photos.

Unfortunately, by the time you are reading this newsletter the Windows 10 class is full. But you can get on the waiting list to get into the next class Mike Seiler teaches – if you are interested just call and get your name on the list. But don't rule out the other computer classes that will help you with your

computer skills like *Beginning Computer Basics* (which you really need before the Windows 10 class), *Managing Your Files* and *Word*.

If you want to feel like you know what you are doing on Facebook, sign up for the 2.5-hour workshop on *Beginning Facebook*. If you want to take better photographs with your camera, join the camera buffs and take *Improve your Camera Skills*. Maybe you want to get more out of your iPhone or iPad, then take the *Beginning iPhone* or *Beginning iPad class*.

Windows 10 show attracted a full house

On August 11, a few days after Microsoft introduced the new Windows 10 operating system, Joe Isaac was ready with a complete presentation of his favorite features of the new product. A show of hands indicated that about 20 had already been able to download the new OS which had been advertised for months, almost as the best new thing since sliced bread.

Microsoft had been rolling out the new product to Windows users free in controlled waves, not to overload the Internet with downloads. The upgrade is free for the first year for those with Windows 7 or 8 -- other versions requires a purchase.

This may have been the first time in years at CKCS that there were more in attendance than there were chairs. Some had to sit on desktops. In the past, when anticipating a big crowd, we have moved to a larger facility, such as the Kentucky Education Television's meeting room or a UK facility.

Joe entertained the crowd by asking several questions of "Cortana" a new "personal assistant" built into Windows 10. He also introduced EDGE, Microsoft's new extra fast Internet browser along with other features of 10. Be sure to read Joe Isaac's column elsewhere in this issue.

Please be also aware that Windows 10 expand the amount of information obtained by Microsoft from your computer usage (more on it can be read at many places online including http://www.polygon.com/2015/7/31/9075531/windows-10-privacy-how-to).
- » Make sure that you are visiting the website that you really want to visit; there are many misleading sites that try to trick you into believing that they are the intended legit site ... but they are not! Be careful with the spelling of the name of a site; be careful with the first "findings" of the search engines; most times they are no findings but (many times deceptive) advertising.
- » If somebody call you about the "problems of your computer" simply hang off; they are not legitimate people so do not even waste your time even threatening them.

Word Processing... Learn the basics of Microsoft's Word: Basic document creation including indenting, fonts, type sizes, columns, text editing, printing and much more will be demonstrated with hands-on exercises.

Photography: Improving your Camera Skills*... Each photographer has a level of comfort when photographing. This class will help you achieve greater comfort, confidence and knowledge about photography. Whether a beginner or advanced photographer, this class will move you up a step or two or more, as we explore photography. Our hands-on teaching includes working with you in a group and assisting you as you need, on a one-to-one basis.

Windows 10...Learn how to navigate in Microsoft's new operating system, add new apps as well as use them. Anyone taking this class should have a prior working knowledge of a Windows operating system.

PaintShop Pro Beginning Digital Imaging ... Students learn how to fix up their pictures using Corel's Paint Shop Pro. You will learn the tools used to crop, lighten/darken a picture, fix red eye, clone part of a picture out, add text and tips on how to scan old pictures and slides and lots more.

Computer Basics (Windows 7)... Learn the fundamentals of using a Windows 7 computer. Learn to use various aspects of the Microsoft Word Processing program, including manipulating text and inserting graphics into a document. Basic filing, basic file management, and how to use a thumb drive are introduced. The final class of this course deals with the basics of email and use of the Internet.

File Management...Have you ever saved a file on your computer only to find out later that you could not remember where you put it and could not find it after searching for it? Then this class is designed for you. We will give you a deeper understanding of how to organize your documents and photos so that they are easier to retrieve. We will also assist you in organizing your own computer files. Flash drive required.

PaintShop Pro Advanced Digital Imaging ... Students will build on tools they learned in the beginning class. They will also learn how to use layers, create collages, restore old photos, straighten images, perspective correction and lots more.

PaintShop Pro Digital Imaging Independent Work... Students bring projects that they want to work on with guidance and assistance from the instructors. Students may be working on their pictures, restoring old photographs, working with templates, making brochures and business cards or other projects.

PaintShop Pro Advanced Digital Imaging and the **Independent Work** classes will be combined as space permits.

Beginning iPad*... This course will introduce you to the layout of this wonderful iOS device, teach you how to navigate around the tablet and familiarize you with each of the preinstalled applications.

Beginning iPhone*... Learn how to use the Apple iPhone. Beginning with basic features: receiving and making calls, adding entries to your contacts list, receiving and sending text messages, reading your email, taking photos and more. Then, learn how to use the preinstalled applications that come with your phone.

* These classes meet in the main room and their class size is determined by the instructor. All other classes meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.

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Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (This is at the discretion of the instructor.). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.

COSTS: All classes have a fee payable to CKCS of \$60 unless stated otherwise (see above).


If you want to download Windows 10 now and not wait for a notice from Microsoft, click on this link for Windows 7, 8, and 8.1 and follow instructions.

If your Windows update is up to date, your System Requirements should be OK.

IMPORTANT: To upgrade for free, select Upgrade this PC now in the tool. You should NOT be asked for a product key during the upgrade process. For example, Windows product key (xxxxx-xxxxx-xxxxxxxxxx-xxxx).

Just do this first: go to Control Panel, click on System and see if you have a 32-bit or 64-bit version of Windows and download the proper version.

Since both of my computers are 64-bit, I used the 64-bit version link to download Windows 10 for my Desktop and my Laptop and everything went smoothly. Call me at (859) 299 6464.

Kroger shoppers please do this

If you shop at a Kroger store, anywhere, the company is willing to make a cash donation to a charitable organization based on your purchases. CKCS is an organization that qualifies to receive this donation. It costs the individual shopper nothing.

We learned last month that once each year you have to designate the organization you choose to support. On September 1 they delete all previous designations on file.

The next time you shop at Kroger, our organization should be listed at the bottom of your receipt. This is important to CKCS, because previous Kroger donations comes close to paying one month's rent each year.

More and more members are moving to the latest version of Windows. Microsoft had been rolling out the new product to Windows users free, in controlled waves not to overload the Internet with downloads. The new program is getting good reviews and seems to get better every day.

Some who have requested a copy are still waiting to be notified that the new program has been downloaded to their computer and may be installed when ready. A new programmable thermostat has been installed at CKCS controlling the heat and air conditioning system.





Mac & iPad Article

Reports: New operating systems just around the corner Free downloads for both Mac and iOS mobile devices soon

"The headline feature in iOS 9 is intelligence... Apple has created an entirely new feature called Proactive. It's a new assistant that will learn your behaviors and predict what you're interested in doing with your phone." — Gizmodo in iOS 9: Everything you need to know, June 8

"The performance improvements will mean that your Mac should feel faster, for example, opening your first email message will be two times faster, according to Apple, and PDFs will open four times faster." — British version of Macworld, in Mac OS X 10.11 El Capitan release date rumours, new features, design changes, Aug. 18

"At last, Apple introduced multitasking apps on iOS 9 for iPad, which means you can work with more than one application at once." — Gizmodo in iOS 9 just made the iPad more work friendly with multitasking, June 8

"Approximately 90% of Mac owners will be able to install and run El Capitan." — Computerworld in Apple picks up OS X El Capitan's development pace, Aug. 5

New OS versions coming soon – From all indications, Apple is about ready to release finalized new versions of both OS X for its Mac computers and iOS 9 for mobile devices. Sooner, rather than later, is how several different news outlets phrased the expected release of El Capitan (version 10.11 of OS X) and iOS 9 (the operating system on Apple's mobile devices.)

The British version of Macworld asked the guestion, "Why the name?" referring to El Capitan.



The answer? Macworld U.K. explained that El Capitan refers to a rock formation in Yosemite National Park. which is said to be "one of the world's most challenging for rock climbers."

For those of you who've used an earlier version of OS X called Snow Leopard, you know that operating system was built upon Leopard and contained many improvements and refinements over Leopard.

The same goes for Mountain Lion, which used OS X Lion as its foundation.

Fast forward to today and El Capitan is built on the foundation of OS X Yosemite.

That's why the folks at Apple picked a site inside Yosemite to name the upcoming Mac operating system.

Computerworld's Gregg Keizer predicts Apple may start offering El Capitan as a free download to Mac users between September 11 and 22. Keizer and other tech writers are betting that Apple's release of OS X 10.10.5 in mid–August will be the final version of Yosemite, except for security updates. (Savvy Mac users know that Yosemite is the latest version of OS X–the Mac operating system–available for Mac computers.)

Macworld U.K. describes some of El Capitan's new features:

Find your cursor – To easily locate the cursor on your Mac, all you have to do is shake your mouse or move your finger on your trackpad. For a few moments, the cursor will get larger, helping you find it on your screen.

Turn off menu – A new feature in System Preferences > General allows users to 'Automatically hide and show the menu bar' similar to the way Mac users have been able to hide their Dock for years.

Improved performance – This is really what El Capitan is all about. Apple is building upon Yosemite to make El Capitan faster and run more efficiently. Opening email should be two times faster, while PDFs should open four times faster.

In addition, Macworld U.K. writes, "There will be tweaks to the interface, new full–screen views, changes to the way you arrange all the windows on your desktop, a smarter Spotlight that can recognize natural language (and be moved around on your desktop), and changes to the Mail, Safari, Notes and Photo apps.

Who can install El Capitan? If your Mac could run Mavericks or Yosemite, it will support El Capitan. Apple says the supported Macs include:

- iMac (mid-2007 or newer)
- MacBook Air (Late 2008 or newer)
- MacBook (Late 2008 Aluminum, Early 2009 or newer)
- Mac mini (Early 2009 or newer)
- MacBook Pro (Mid/Late 2007 or newer)
- Mac Pro (Early 2008 or newer)
- Xserve (Early 2009)

El Capitan is expected to be a free download, available this fall.

August Tech night featured gadgets

Bob Brown and Jim McCormick showed gadgets that they own and explained how they work. That was the Tech Night program on August 10.


Jim McCormick introduce the crowd to the *Amazon Echo* which is a new device that is, at the very least, a very smart speaker. At the most, it may become your new assistant. Like 'Siri' of

Apple fame, the Echo's alter ego is called 'Alexia'. A voice recognition app lets the Echo hear and respond to questions – anything from the news and weather to helping you keep track of what you need to order at Amazon.

Once connected to your home's Wi-Fi, Alexia will always be ready to respond once she hears her name. 'Alexia, what is the weather tomorrow', will give you a quick report on what to expect in the morning. 'Alexia, play the news' will get what Amazon calls a flash briefing that, with the help of a smart phone app, include a wide range of news and sports sources to give you a report. There are also a number of the music options that can be used to play your favorite songs. Since Audible is part of the Amazon family, you can also have Alexia play any of the books in your library.

Since the Echo is basically a speaker, microphone and wireless connection to the Amazon servers, its capabilities are easily updated as the folks at Amazon see new opportunities to extend its reach. Some of the newer features that have recently been added, include the ability to work with some of the newer home automation devices such as the Philips Hue, SmartThings, and Wink devices.

When first announced, the Echo was priced at \$99 for preorder for Amazon Prime members. It looked like fun, so Jim took a chance and ordered it. That option is no longer available and it's now \$179 and though more expensive, it still is an

interesting product and quite frankly a fun thing to own. Children and grandchildren have a ball quizzing the device.

The Google Chromecast device that connects to a TV set was demonstrated by Bob Brown. It



into an HDMI port in the back of a TV. Doing so makes an ordinary TV capable of accessing programs and features available on the Internet. provides Wi-Fi Internet connection for TVs that do not have it. It works with a computer or tablet to set up the TV to capture a video program from the Internet and play it without further intervention from the computer.

The *Chromecast* device looks much like an odd-shaped thumb drive. It contains a Wi-Fi network interface and a small computer chip that can retrieve a video program from the Internet and hand it off to the TV to play. The device sells at office supply and similar stores for about \$35. It requires a small amount of power which it can get via a USB plug or a connection to a household power outlet.

Its function is similar to that of Apple TV and Amazon Fire TV but there are some differences that make them incompatible. Plus some TV manufacturers are building Internet connectivity into some models now.

Also, Google has developed a film and television production organization with Hollywood studios and is producing programs which will be distributed via Internet. And, of course, they will be compatible with the Chromecast.



iOS 9 for mobile: Regarding iOS 9, The Next Digit reported in mid–August, "The company (Apple) is just a month away from its official public release for its consumers."

A new feature that's getting a lot of buzz in iOS 9 is proactive Siri. It's supposed to learn your

habits and make recommendations.

For example, Owen Williams, who writes for TNW News, tells how he normally rides his bike to work and usually listens to music using an app called SoundCloud on his iPhone. To accomplish that, he opens Spotlight on his phone, searches for SoundCloud and then opens it to begin playing his music.

With Predictive Siri installed on a pre–release version of iOS 9, Williams says once he plugs in his headphones, he's asked if he wants to immediately open SoundCloud.

In addition, Predictive Siri remembers which apps he uses at different times of the day.

Williams writes, "It gets even better, though. It also makes suggestions based on the types of apps you use at different times of the day. For example, when you wake up, it'll suggest the app you use first every morning at the bottom of the multitasking screen...most useful of all there's also a location–based suggestion. I've only seen it a handful of times, but it suggests apps that are popular in a location or based on what you frequently use in a place."

Gizmodo calls the new feature, Proactive, and says, "It's a new assistant that will learn your behaviors and predict what you're interested in doing with your phone."

A new feature available on both Apple's mobile devices and Macs is flight tracking.

9to5Mac reports, "Flight tracking apps have been popular on iOS for as long as the platform had the

App Store, and this fall Apple is baking a key function of those apps right into the operating system. A little known feature called 'flights data detector' is included in both iOS 9 and OS X El Capitan but was not highlighted on stage during Apple's WWDC (Worldwide Developer's Conference – a large yearly gathering of men and women who write software for Apple products) keynote." Zac Hall writes about the feature in a 9to5Mac column.

Another new feature coming to both Apple's mobile devices and the Mac is split screen apps. TIME magazine's John

Patrick Pullen writes, "It's clearly a play towards making the Mac seem more like an iPad (with its new split screen mode in iOS 9) and the iPad more like a Mac."

"The inability to work in two apps at once has long plagued iPad users who want to do anything beyond reading or internet scrolling. Today, Apple introduced three new features for multitasking on its tablets," write Time's Pullen in a June 2015 article.

"Let's start with the things you'll be able to do on the most models. First, there's Slide Over, which lets you swipe a secondary app over onto your screen from the right side to Multitasking



iOS 9, for the first time, provides the ability to multitask on the iPad, as shown on Apple's web site.

interact with it while you keep a primary app open. Then there's Picture-In-Picture, which will let you keep a video playing in the corner of your screen while you work in a different app..."

He adds that a feature called SplitView allows the user to divide the screen between two apps and continue to scroll and work in both screens. "This is the multi-tasking functionality many users have been waiting for, with one major caveat: It will only work for the iPad Air 2. This seems to suggest that SplitView is really meant for the workplace-focused iPad Pro we've heard rumors about for so long."

Most popular Emoji - by state

When it comes to emojis used on Apple's mobile devices, it appears Kentuckians really like their barber poles, baby chicks, wrapped candy, an icon with the word "OK," and a window or computer screen peering into the nighttime sky.

SwiftKey, the company that created the popular virtual keyboard used on millions of iPhones, iPads, and iPod touches, recently revealed a state –by–state snapshot of emoji preferences.

Emojis, of course, are those icons used in emails, texting, Apple's Messages app, and other online correspondence.



USA Today reports that SwiftKey completed a similar study worldwide and discovered that "happy faces, sad faces, and hearts are the three most popular emojis overall."

In the U.S., a birthday cake, eggplant, and a slice of pizza were used more than other parts of the world.

USA Today reports that "New Yorkers love the Statue of Liberty, Hawaiians dig surfing, and Nevada residents are big fans of the eggplant...the taxi was popular in California, grapes were big in Texas,

and the trumpet emoji was popular in Flori da."

Some emoji use is predictable. Iowans choose the corn emoji most, and Arizonans prefer the cactus.

Globally, Brazilians prefer cats, Australia led the way with junk food and holiday–themed emoji (as well as alcohol–themed emoji), while Canada scored highest for the use of money, sports, poop, and violent emoji.

Reports: Apple revamping its stores

9to5Mac reports that Apple is making significant changes to its retail stores to simplify the shopping experience.

The Apple–oriented web site says, "Apple products, ranging from iPods to iPads to Macs, have typically been stored in the back of Apple Stores and brought to a customer upon the point of sale. Now, when a customer wants to buy an iPod, she or he can simply pull it off a shelf without needing to wait for the product to be brought from the back room."

iPods are apparently moving to shelves formerly housing accessories. This change frees up space for customers to buy a desired product directly off the store shelves.

Reports also say that Apple will do away with the so-called smart signs where iPad 2s were used to display product information directly adjacent to Macs and other items.

Instead, Apple will "begin pre-loading



price information and product details onto displays iPhones, iPads, and Macs themselves. Apple will use the new space to install more devices that potential customers can test on the show floor," writes 9to5Mac.

The web site says these are just a few of the many changes Apple Stores have adopted over the last

few months. "In July, Apple began displaying accessories from key partners in new Apple–designed packaging, while the company also recently reorganized its stores with a focus on displaying the Apple Watch. Since launching the new Apple Watch tables in April, Apple has improved the process by dropping the in–store appointment requirement," according to 9to5Mac.



Adobe Flash just won't go away

Last month, I wrote about ongoing security headaches caused by Adobe's Flash Player and asked if it was time to delete the Flash web browser plug–in from your Mac.

I promptly deleted Flash from my Macs after reading one article after another about a host of targeted attacks on Flash and how hackers

were using it to reach into users' computers. Adobe was, and still is, on a fast track patching holes after they're discovered.

It turns out that many readers of this newsletter also rely on Flash for a variety of uses. Technology called HTML5 is built into every modern Mac browser, but it turns out that many web sites are slow as molasses to adopt the much more modern technology.

Fast Company recently published an article titled, "The Agonizingly Slow Decline of Adobe Flash Player" and asked why so many companies still use this old technology which is causing a flurry of security problems. It hoped to get some answers. What it got instead was mainly dead air.

"The idea was to talk with some of the biggest websites still using Adobe's browser plugin, which has fallen out of favor within tech circles for its constant security issues and thirst for system resources. Maybe they could explain why Flash is still necessary, offering a counterpoint to the resounding calls to end its existence," writes Jared Newman.

He adds that Flash–reliant web sites by big names such as HBO, NBC, CBS, Zynga, King, Showtime, Pandora and Spotify are still up and running. Problem is, not one individual from any of those companies would talk to Newman about why they insist on using Flash.

Finally, folks who would speak all indicated they would move beyond Flash within a year or so.

So what's wrong with Flash? In an essay he wrote five years ago, Steve Jobs admitted that the Adobe Flash plugin was the number one reason that Macs crashed. That one web browser plugin was causing headaches for Apple as it attempted to make the Mac an even more stable computer platform at the time. (Millions of Mac users have opted to send anonymous reports to Apple providing a snapshot of what's going on when a Mac encounters a crash, a Kernel panic, or other issues. Apple engineers are constantly reviewing these reports and pinpointing the culprits.)

In addition, Jobs wrote that the Flash plugin would never appear on Apple's mobile devices because of the security issues and the stability problems encountered on the Mac. Newman writes that Job's comments about the iPad and iPhone might just as well apply to today's desktop and laptop PCs. Jobs might well have been ahead of his time.

"Security, for instance, remains a major concern, with new exploits popping up on a regular basis. In one recent example, hackers were even able to break through the sandboxing that's meant to minimize vulnerabilities in Google Chrome. Flash is also a notorious resource hog, which is a problem as laptops become thinner, lighter, and more reliant on power efficiency for long battery life," writes Newman.

Last month, the chief security officer of Facebook wrote on Twitter that Adobe should set an "end of life deadline" for the Flash plugin. In addition, an "Occupy Flash" web site is urging users to uninstall Flash and asks developers to adopt newer technologies such as HTML5.

What's a user to do? It's clear that many companies are dragging their feet when it comes to switching to HTML5, a technology already built into all modern browsers. (I regularly view British TV shows on my Mac via the ACORN TV web site which relies on Flash.)

Flash is no longer installed on my Macs as a browser plug–in on Safari or Firefox. Instead, I use the sandboxed Flash version in Google Chrome. So I open Chrome and the Flash movie plays just fine. I rarely use Chrome, but do choose it when I need to watch a Flash movie.

The Flash icon no longer appears in my System Preferences – an indication that Flash has been removed from the Mac. To use the Flash plugin in Chrome, first open Chrome. In the address bar at the top type:

chrome:plugins

That will open the Chrome plugins page.

Find Flash in the list. Click the Enable link under its name.

That's it. You have enabled the Flash version bundled with Chrome. The Chrome version of Flash should automatically update itself.

While this doesn't solve the Flash problem, it does provide a temporary solution until more companies adopt HTML5.

Mac Chrome users benefit from new browser version

If you're a regular user of Google's Mac Chrome browser, reports indicate you'll be pleased by improvements in the newest browser update. Reports from Amsterdam–based The Next Web (TNW) and others indicate Chrome for Mac version 46 may boost battery life in MacBooks, and speed up the browser on Macs.

"I didn't believe it would be possible at first, but after spending the better part of a week on Chrome 46 I'm blown away. Memory consumption seems to have halved, groggy slow tabs are snappier than ever and my battery life isn't shamefully bad anymore — also, my laptop's fans aren't constantly blowing," writes Owen Williams describing a pre–release version of Chrome, Version 46, in his article appearing in The Next Web.

He adds, "The Chromium team has been working to improve Mac graphics performance over the last few months and has begun testing its fixes, along with focusing on major memory leaks in the browser."

If you're running Google's Chrome browser on your Mac, it should automatically update when a finalized version of an update is available.

Internet Service Providers: RCN Cable tied with Verizon FIOS (Fiber cable). RCN provides Internet service to parts of Washington D.C., Chicago, Boston, New York, Philly, and the Lehigh Valley portion of Pennsylvania and New Jersey. Verizon FIOS provides Internet service through fiber–optic cable (instead of cable TV wiring) and serves more than five–million customers in 13 states. The two Internet providers with the most customers in central Kentucky rated 15th (Time Warner Cable) and 19th (Windstream) for overall satisfaction with service and speed out of 21 companies.
