Get the most from your Android Samsung, LG or HTC phone and tablet



Want to know more about your LG, HTC, Nexus, or Samsung phone or tablet? If so, our October Tech Night is for you. (Even if you have an Apple device you will likely learn something that will apply to iOS devices.).

You have probably heard about Androids, but maybe didn't realize your phone or tablet was considered an Android, meaning it has an Android operating system. It doesn't matter if your phone or tablet is using Jelly Bean, Kit Kat, Lollipop or the Marshmallow operating system. Although all those names sound tempting and calorie laden, it's not imperative that you know which

version your Android phone is using.

During this Tech Night presentation our panel

will give a brief overview of the Android system and will cover apps (applications). They will show you where to get apps for your devices, how to download them, how to manage them and how to delete them when they are no longer useful.


Bob Brown and Boone Baldwin will be showing some Android features and apps you really need and some apps you just might want. According to some estimates Android phones/tablets have more than 2 million apps from which to choose.



"Phones and devices are starting to need an anti-virus protection" said Bob Brown. "And there are precautions you need to take in choosing what apps you download," he added.

Boone will cover how to use your phone/tablet camera and some great apps to spark your creativity. Phone cameras are improving with every version that is released. The great quality of the photos and the fact that they are accessible and convenient makes it important to know how to use all of its features.

Renovations Continue


We have added another new projection screen to our inventory. This one is in the classroom which should provide a better image of the PowerPoint slides used in our instruction.





Snipping Tool

I ask my class how many used the Snipping Tool and was amazed that 85% of them did not use it.

This is a feature I use it all the time. It is a fantastic program and it is free.




On the next page is an example using the Boeing website homepage. On most of that page is one of their latest airplanes.

Let's say I had a reason to select just a picture of that airplane from their homepage to send to someone. I would use the snipping tool to capture that image.

Below is the Boeing home page.

Let's say I want only the airplane, not the SHHH ad or the hanger.

JOE ISAAC TECH TALK CONTINUES

Using your + sign and your pointer, once you click and drag the rectangle around the plane and select COPY your new picture is on your clipboard. You can open a WORD document or Email where you want to put that capture. Just use Control V and it will paste your capture into the body of your document or email.



What you capture becomes a jpg picture. If you want to save this to Pictures, click on the floppy disk symbol at the top of the snipping tool dialog box and save it into your Pictures folder after you name the capture.

It is a great tool, available to everyone who has Windows 10 or some earlier versions. It is truly a very useful tool.





iOS 10 & macOS Sierra

By now, many owners of Apple's mobile devices and Macs have upgraded to the newly–released versions of the latest operating system software.

"iOS 10 is a good update with a lot to offer and there's really no reason not to install it on any hardware that can run it. It doesn't murder your battery, it doesn't hurt performance too badly...," writes



Andrew Cunningham in his <u>very lengthy review</u> of the new iOS 10. Apple released the free upgrade for its iPhone, iPad and iPod touch mobile devices on September 13.

"...iOS 10 is a more consistent, coherent, clever experience that's making not just my day-today, but moment-to-moment interactions more efficient and more enjoyable. I like the direction it's going, even and especially when it's been opened up in new and surprising ways," writes Rene Ritchie in his <u>iMore piece</u>, "iOS 10 review: Cleaner, cleverer, and more convenient."

Here's a brief overview of what's new in iOS 10 from the iMore article:

Raise to wake

(iPhone only) – By simply picking up your iPhone, you can wake up the device.

Universal clipboard

- Apple lets you copy text from your iPad or iPhone and paste it into a document on your Mac. As Rene Ritchie writes. "It does take a few seconds for the data to transfer, especially if big blobs like images are included in the pasteboard, but once you get used to it, it works great."

 Home screen – Surprise. You can now hide many of Apple's built–in apps. You can't

By nature, iOS is not a permissive operating system. Apple started from a position of not trusting third-party software developers, fearing those outsiders could screw up the company's platform (a completely reasonable position to take, incidentally). Every new version of iOS since the second one has been very cautious and deliberate about what new canabilities are given to

delete them, but you can hide them. I know a lot of folks have been pushing for this ability.

• Mail – A new threaded view comes to Mail, providing better context for your ongoing email conversation. New Mail also offers a button at the bottom allowing you to switch to just unread messages. The 12.9–inch iPad Pro gets its own unique 3–column layout, similar to the Apple Mail app on the Mac.

Safari Split–screen – "You enter Split View via long press or dragging a tab to the edge of the screen," writes Rene Ritchie. "Once in split view, you can switch tabs from side–to–side,

These skills are fundamental but nearly everyone stumbles at times trying to learn them.

Of course, for tablets, and phones also, the big benefit comes from applications programs. Android has thousands of apps. So many that no one can ever use them all.

At the next SIG meeting, Tuesday, October 18, at 7 p.m. we will cover some apps devoted to safety such as anti-virus, phishing, hoaxing and other nasty stuff. Then we will get into more interesting apps for daily use such as weather, photography, mapping, research, games and much more.

The Android crew will also present some apps and other Android tricks and tips at the Tech Night meeting on October 10.



SEPTEMBER TECH NIGHT REVIEW

Microsoft reps stressed internet safety

Brandon Boling and Keenan Ray, two technicians from the Microsoft store in Fayette Mall, were guest speakers at the monthly Tech Night on September 12. Their topic was about online fraud and how to detect it and prevent becoming a victim. Their presentation followed a Microsoft guide on the subject which is accessible for all our members.

The two took turns in giving examples of online fraud, such as phishing scams, pop-up windows offering rogue security software or fake technician support. Some scams such as announced winnings you obtain by providing some information. Scammers also prey on those struggling financially, offering to solve all their problems should you provide account numbers or a SSN.

All should be suspicious of unsolicited offers that look like they come from a bank or major companies you might use – even Microsoft. In such scams, look carefully at the email address. Look for poorly worded sentences with grammar or spelling problems. All of these are signs telling

you to be weary because it is likely a scam. Never provide or respond to requests for personal information. Never call a number or use an email address they provide. It is always good to create a new separate email to the company headquarters to see if they really sent that request for your information. They emphasized that Microsoft never asks for your address, password or personal

information.

Our two presenters urged each member to read an eight page guide that we have reproduced for your use. It is entitled "*Stay Safe Online*". It covers many of the points they made and answers just about every question the group asked afterwards. This is a great reference guide to keep handy. Mother Goose Calls 911

As reported by Cincinnati Police Officer Givens


Givens had worked for Cincinnati Police Department for over 26 years, but in all that time "I have never had an experience that compares to this one"

On Monday, Givens was sitting in his patrol car in a parking lot when he was accosted by one very unexpected visitor who seemed dead set on getting his attention.

"This goose came up and started pecking on the side of the car," Givens said. "I threw some food out for her, but she didn't take it. She just kept pecking and quacking. Then she walked away, stopped and looked back. Then came over again and pecked some more."



When the goose walked away a second time, and again looked back, Givens decided to follow her.



And it's a good thing that he did.

"She led me about 100 yards away to this grassy area near a creek. That's when I saw one of her babies all tangled up in some string from a balloon. His little feet were kicking," said Givens. "She led me straight to him."

Though stunned by what just happened, Givens was wary of approaching the trapped gosling, fearing that the goose might attack if he did. So instead he radioed the SPCA, but no wildlife rescuers were immediately available.

Givens' colleague, Officer Cecilia Charron, heard the call and volunteered to help.

"She showed up on her own," he said. "I told her to be careful, but she just walked over and untangled the baby. The mother goose just watched, like she knew. It was amazing." Once the baby was untangled, Givens and Charron looked on as the babe rejoined his mom and swam away safely. Not surprisingly, the officers were in disbelief about how it all played out from start to finish.


Charron even started to tear up, telling Givens it was the highlight of her 24 years on the force.

"It seems like something made up. It was just incredible," said Givens. "I honestly don't know why I decided to follow her, but I did. It makes me wonder - do they know to turn to humans when they need help?"

Though we'll never be sure if the desperate mother goose did indeed approach the officer knowing he would help, what is certain is that he did - and that's what made the difference. "I don't know what it all means," Givens said, "but I hope it might inspire more compassion in other people."

- » Upgrade your hard drive to a SSD (Solid State Drive): now 120GB and 250GB SSD drives cost under \$100.00; the SSD positive impact on the performance of a computer is simply unbelievable.
- » Do Image Backups of your computer: of the whole computer (OS, programs, settings, everything) and no only your documents and personal files; use Acronis Backup Software to do monthly (and weekly) completely unattended image backups of your computer to a second hard drive (a USB connected one but preferable an internal one).
- » Use MalwareBytes software to protect against malware: and better yet use the Premium version (only \$15 per computer per year);
- » Windows 10 is GOOD and free (for existing Windows 7 and Windows 8 computers)! Welcome back to the Windows 7 like interface that most everybody feel at home with. Please be also aware that Windows 10 expand the amount of information obtained by Microsoft from your computer usage (more on it can be read at many places online including http://www.polygon.com/2015/7/31/9075531/windows-10-privacy-how-to).
- » Make sure that you are visiting the website that you really want to visit; there are many misleading sites that try to trick you into believing that they are the intended legit site ... but they are not! Be careful with the spelling of the name of a site; be careful with the first "findings" of the search engines; most times they are no findings but (many times deceptive) advertising.
- » If somebody call you about the "problems of your computer" simply hang off; they are not legitimate people so do not even waste your time even threatening them.

- or merge them all back into a single window...it works great and is incredibly useful; I wrote a lot of this review in Split View on the 9.7–inch iPad Pro," adds Ritchie.
- <u>Swift Playgrounds for iPad</u> This is big news, according to iMore, because it will change the way "we learn to code for generations to come." Ritchie describes it this way: "A technical marvel with a coding environment, made multitouch, directly manipulable, and fully accessible, melded with an educational miracle, teaching coding itself in a way that's engaging, empowering, and approachable to everyone. It's not just the mainstreaming of technology — something Apple has proven themselves good at a ridiculous amount of times over the last few decades — but the mainstreaming of the tools used to drive the technology itself."
- iOS 10 QuickType This is a predictive keyboard that is designed to get better the more you use it. Apple has greatly improved the way it works with the virtual keyboard on the screen of your iPhone, iPad or iPod touch so that it has built–in intelligence that can identify useful, relevant information such as location, contact info., calendar schedules and more. <u>Computerworld's Jonny Evans</u> describes several examples:

When you receive a message from someone they may ask you for an email for a third party, "Do you have Jeremy's email?"

All you need to do is type "Jeremy's email address is," and it will appear in the QuickType window – no need to switch apps, copy and paste...

If a friend asks where you should see a 'Current Location' box appear in the QuickType window where you can share your location in one tap.



You'll find similar examples of applied and useful intelligence in Maps. These include Proactive suggestions to help you get to where you are likely to want to go; personalized locations and the ability to figure out the fastest possible journey's to your destinations.

• Layout of lock screen and Notification Center – iMore reports that the lock screen layout on your Apple device has gotten simpler. In addition, the messages appearing on your screen when you receive a notification have been redesigned and are simpler.

• **Control Center** – "Control Center has gotten one of the most significant redesigns in iOS 10," reports iMore. Author Rene Ritchie writes, "I'm still not settled on the new design. I love the new functionality, but I'm not yet sold on the implementation." iOS 10 delivers three separate panels with each one serving a different purpose. You still access Control Center by swiping up from the bottom of your screen. Night Shift is now more prominently displayed. It's moved from a

shortcut button along the bottom to the middle row where it's more prominently displayed. Night Shift is Apple's implementation of the technique similar to the f.lux app on the Mac. As your bedtime approaches, it automatically shifts the color temperature of your device's display toward the warmer end of the spectrum. Years of research has shown that light has a noticeable impact on brain function, especially sleep. Altering



the iPad, iPhone or iPod touch screen to a warmer color temperature makes it easier for humans to fall asleep. Read more about the new Control Center <u>here from c|net</u>.

- Siri Apple's voice activated personal assistant, introduced five years ago, has received a makeover. It now uses natural language and is tied to apps. iMore reports that six types of apps are now integrated with Siri in a much deeper manner than in the past: Messaging, Ride booking (think Uber), Photo and video, payment apps, Workouts, and voice over Internet calling (VOIP), which is the method that Ooma, Vonage and similar phone systems use to allow you to make and receive phone calls over the Internet.
- Slide to Unlock is gone To unlock the screen, you no longer touch the device's screen and swipe to unlock as all of us with iPads, iPhones, and iPod touch devices have been doing for years. This process which "helped define the original iPad experience is gone," reports iMore. Instead, you press the Home button to bring up the screen where you can enter your passcode to unlock the device.



Ritchie ends his lengthy iOS 10 review this way: "By pushing design, architecture, and intelligence forward, Apple is taking an almost decade-old operating system and making it fresh, fun, and futuristic again...I like the direction it's going, even and especially where it's been opened up in new and surprising ways...The story of iOS 10 has just begun."

A new Mac operating system called macOS Sierra

Okay, what's to like about the new Mac operating system (now called macOS Sierra)?

Plenty, according to the articles that I've been reading. Folks who follow Apple announcements realize that El Capitan is the last version of OS X – the operating system that's been



running Macs since March 2001. The new Mac OS is macOS Sierra (version 11 of the Mac operating system). OS X is no longer.

There are many new features including:

 Safari Integration – Apple's voice–activated personal assistant, available for years on the iPad, iPhone, and iPod touch, comes to the Mac. To turn on Siri if it's not activated on your

Mac, visit System Preferences and click on the Safari icon. Make sure the "Enable Siri" box on the lefthand side is checked. You can also show Safari in your menu bar by clicking in the small box next to "Show Siri in Menu Bar" in System Preferences. According to notebooks.com, here is a short partial list of the functions Siri can perform on the Mac:



assistant, Siri, to the Mac. Siri can be a handy tool for finding, opening and organizing files on your Mac.

- Adjust the volume
- Increase/decrease the screen brightness
- Play music in Apple Music
- Make a call
- · Find your media files in iTunes
- Get weather from local areas and anywhere
- Change settings
- Put the computer to sleep
- Get stock quotes
- · Get sports scores and schedules
- Universal Clipboard Shares with iOS 10 This makes it easy to copy text, numbers, etc. on your iPhone, iPad or iPod touch and then paste the same information into a document on your Mac. <u>notebooks.com</u> writes, "To use the Universal Clipboard, connect both devices to the same network. Now copy something on your iPhone or iPad. Open a program on the Mac like Notes and, when you paste using COMMAND+V or the Paste command from the Edit menu, it should paste the text copied on the iPhone or iPad."
- **Messages Makeover** iOS 10 users who use Messages to draw an animated note using Apple's texting app will be able to send that note to a Mac user who can then view the

animation. This is a leap beyond simple texting. There's also a feature called "invisible ink" that reveals itself when the recipient chooses to view it.

- Optimized storage using iCloud This is a great feature but if you have dozens and dozens of flies on your Mac, you might run out of free iCloud storage and be asked to pay for additional space. Here's how <u>notebooks.com</u> puts it: "iCloud Drive will offer to let you sync your Desktop and Documents folders when you first install the upgrade to macOS Sierra. If you choose to let it sync, those folders will move to your iCloud Drive. You won't really notice any difference, especially with the Desktop. All the files will still show up on your screen. macOS Sierra will remove those files from the drive and they will sync to iCloud so you can download them when you need them. This only happen when the drive gets full. The syncing of files in your Documents folder can cause some problems if programs store their files in the folder. One of my programs didn't work properly until I moved the folder to another location. This happened because the developer didn't update it yet to take advantage of the change. It wants the files stored on the local drive and not in iCloud, so be careful if you have a similar app or program."
- **Collaborate with Pages, Numbers, Keynote & Notes** <u>A team of</u> <u>folks may now edit a document together, in real time</u>. Only people you invite may make changes to the document. Each person can add text, images or drawing and collaborators will see the changes, nearly in real-time. Apple says the beta release of collaboration is built into iWork apps on Macs running macOS Sierra, iPhones, iPads, the iPod touch, and at the <u>iCloud.com</u> web site. Apple adds, "To invite others to collaborate you must be signed in to iCloud on your device and have iCloud Drive turned on. If you're using a web browser, sign in to iCloud.com and open the iWork app you want to use. If you have an iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch with earlier versions of iOS or iWork apps, or if you have an Android device, you can view documents but not edit them."



<u>TechRadar says this</u> about macOS Sierra: "Our Verdict – macOS Sierra enters the fray as a solid, dependable operating system just like the final two versions of OS X. It offers clear

benefits when used in conjunction with iPhones and Apple Watches, while the addition of Siri and iCloud Drive are a boon for working with files and retrieving information on the desktop."

<u>TechRadar also offers tips</u> to fix the most common issues with macOS Sierra including solutions for these potential problems:

- macOS Sierra freezes or crashes when installing
- Not enough space to install
- macOS Sierra won't start
- Mac runs slowly after Sierra upgrade
- Apps show 'damaged and can't be opened' error
- Slow Wi–Fi
- Some Bluetooth devices won't work

MacRumors provides <u>extensive coverage</u> about the newest Mac operating system. In addition, MacRumors <u>offers a roundup</u> of its Sierra coverage. Rene Ritchie offers a very good overview in his iMore article, <u>"An update as big as the mountains."</u>

TechRadar answers the question some of you might be asking: <u>Why does Windows 10 cost</u> <u>money when OS X is free?</u> (Of course, Apple has dropped the OS X name and gone with macOS Sierra for the newest Mac operating system).


Finally, it must be said that third–party apps may not yet work with macOS Sierra. As I type this, Brother has not yet updated its printer and scanner drivers for the newest Mac operating system. Brother's web site indicates those drivers will be updated soon – this fall.

My utility of choice, TechTool Pro 9, has not yet been updated. Because so many Mac users rely on this app, I suspect that Micromat will update it before Halloween. The El Capitan version of TechTool Pro was updated within three weeks of OS X 10.11's release.

Remember, despite a lengthy beta-test period where many Mac users tested pre-release versions of macOS Sierra, bugs still appear.

I would NOT install macOS Sierra on a "mission critical" machine – until Apple releases the first few updates to patch issues with the initial release of the new operating system software.





iStockNow.com reveals which Apple Stores have iPhone 7 inventory By

the time you read this, Apple's newest iPhone 7 and 7 Plus may be out–of–stock at Lexington's Apple Store in Fayette Mall. But as I write this on September 20th, there are still supplies of the newest Plus model available locally according to <u>istocknow.com</u>. That phone is sold out at Apple Stores in Louisville and Cincy, according to <u>istocknow.com</u>'s map.

When you first visit the site, type in your zip code and then choose the product you're interested in (next to "Filters" at the top of the page).

The map updates in real time to show inventory levels at various Apple Stores across the world.

You can also change filters to reflect whether the latest iPhone model is available using Verizon, AT&T, T–Mobile or Sprint at various Apple Stores. Other filters include the color of the iPhone as well as the amount of RAM installed.
