A REPORT FROM THE MAYOR'S OFFICE

Can Lexington become a Gig city?

Want to know what is on the technology horizon for Lexington? At the September Tech Night, on Monday, September 11, at 7 p.m., our guest speaker, Scott Shapiro, will address that issue and more.

Scott Shapiro is Mayor Jim Gray's Chief Innovation Officer. He will be discussing three projects that he leads for the Mayor.

Scott co-leads Lexington's Gig project, which aims to bring a fiber-optic network with ultra-fast internet speeds to the city. You have seen the news about Charter/Spectrum raising prices for cable television and internet services in Lexington. In the Mayor's

office, they are working to bring competition for Charter/Spectrum and Windstream to Lexington – they are in talks with companies that may be interested in building a fiber-optic network in the city to bring gigabit internet speeds (as well as cable TV channels) to businesses and residences. The goal is to become the nation's largest gigabit city, and to increase competition among providers so that internet access and cable TV prices come down.

The other projects that he will discuss are two "Smart Cities" projects.

Smart Cities Project No.1 – Notifications: They are working on a system to provide text notifications to citizens regarding city activity on their block. Want to know if garbage pick-up day is changing because of a holiday, when to put out your leaves for collection, or when your street is going to be paved? Folks who sign up for city




notifications will soon be able to get advanced heads-up for a growing number of city services on their street.

Smart Cities Project No. 2 – Hey Big Lex! They are working with the University of Kentucky on a joint project using Amazon's Alexa system. This project is just taking shape, but he can give some insight into the potential uses they see for chatbots and virtual assistants to keep citizens and tourists informed.

A little bit about Scott: he joined the Mayor's office having earned a Master's degree in Public Administration from Harvard's Kennedy School of Government, which he earned at age 40 to embark on a new career in public service. Prior to that switch, Scott was in the private sector in New York City, where he built and sold a consulting company and was a senior executive with a publicly traded health care company. As a side project, Scott teaches a course titled *City Innovation* at the University of Kentucky.

Attend September's Tech Night to become up to date on the happenings and future plans for your city.


Genealogy and CKCS

Course/Workshop Descriptions

<u>Classes</u>

Word Processing... Learn the basics of Microsoft's Word with hands-on, step by step, exercises. Topics include: ribbon toolbars; page setup; selecting, editing & moving within a document; office clipboard; cut, copy & paste; spelling & grammar checking; character & paragraph formatting; tab stops & tables; manual page breaks, page numbers; numbered & bulleted lists; multiple columns; headers & footers; insert, resize & move pictures; find & replace; printing.

<u>Intermediate iPad</u>...* If you want to get more out of your iPad, this is your course. Learn what's beyond the basic use of the iPad. This class is designed for the iPad user who's comfortable with basics of the iPad screen, how to open and close apps, how to organize icons on the screen, how to maneuver around an iPad screen to get work done, multi-touch gestures, the home button, and iOS basics (the operating system powering your iPad). Students will become more adept at using their iPads, will learn about the cloud, and will be introduced to Pages and Numbers (two of the apps that are part of Apple's iWork suite).

Introduction to Photoshop Elements... In this course you will learn how to use some of the tools in Elements to do basic photo enhancements including quick fixes, cropping, cloning, spot healing, red eye removal, levels, and adding borders. We will also discuss photo considerations prior to printing, introduction to layers, converting images to black and white, enhancing and restoring old photos, adding text, using brushes, graphics, adjustment layers, templates, special features, filters, and creating a slide show.

<u>Environmental Photography</u>...* The first class will be spent in the class room discussing techniques to photograph on location. The second and third class will be spent photographing at different locations in Lexington. The fourth class will be spent reviewing and critiquing photos of the students.

<u>Point & Shoot Photography</u>...* This is an introductory photography class using Point and Shoot Cameras. We will show you how to take great pictures with the many built in settings on your camera. You will learn to shoot like a pro.

<u>Windows 10</u>... Learn how to navigate in Microsoft's Windows 10 operating system. You will install several free programs and learn how to use them, including a free word processor that is as robust as Word. We will look at computer security and how to back up your computer. Also, we will look at OneDrive, Microsoft's cloud storage system, and how to use it to share your pictures with friends and family.



<u>PaintShop Pro Advanced Digital Imaging/ Independent Work...</u> Students will build on tools they learned in the beginning class. They will also learn how to use layers, create collages, restore old photos, straighten images, perspective correction. Students can bring projects that they want to work on with guidance and assistance from the instructors. Students may be working on their own pictures, restoring their photographs, working with templates, making brochures and business cards or other projects.

Workshops

Posing People for Your Photographs...* With the holidays coming up soon, feel confident on how to line up and take family group photos. Also, learn how to pose individuals and couples anytime you are asked to photograph people. Your photography skills will improve those "once in a lifetime moments" you want to capture.

Sports & Action Photography...* Students will learn how to shoot sports and action photographs.

<u>Understanding Facebook</u>... Students will learn how to create, use, and maintain a Facebook page via the computer. Adding a profile picture and cover photo, finding friends, customizing your privacy settings, posting comments and photos, and other features will be covered.

<u>Secrets of the iPhone</u>...* Learn important (and hidden) functions of your iPhone. Learn how to download apps, move them, nest them and delete them. Learn how to get better photos with your phone, organize your pictures, and send them in text and emails. Texting messages and using Siri will also be covered. Participants should bring their iPhone passcode and their Apple password to access the App store.

Advanced Techniques of Paintshop Pro... In this workshop you will learn some of PSP's advanced techniques. We will discuss customizing your workspace to be more efficient. We will demonstrate techniques on removing someone from a picture; different ways to make selections from your photos, how to capture more frames, tubes, brushes, etc. that don't come with PSP. We will also cover Smart Carver – a neat way to take something out of a photo, adding a sky to a photo. We will cover these and other advanced techniques as time permits.

Making Note Cards With Microsoft Word...Learn how to make your own ORIGINAL note cards using Microsoft Word! You will be taught how to set up a note card page, add graphics and/or photos, how to make sets of note cards or individual cards, and how to file them for future use. This is an opportunity to engage your imagination and have a fun time. Card stock will be provided by the instructor. Each student should bring a personal thumb drive loaded with photos to be used to create her/his personal note cards.



* These classes or workshops meet in the main room and their class size is determined by the instructor. All other classes meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.

Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (this is at the discretion of the instructor). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.

COSTS: All classes have a fee payable to CKCS of \$60 and Workshops have a fee of \$30, unless stated otherwise (see above).

CKCS members get a 20 percent discount on all class, seminar, and workshop fees.



September is a historic month

When it comes to the history of CKCS, the month of September is significant. On September 4, 1984, the Central Kentucky Computer Society became officially in existence. That's the date that David Reed and Arthur Abshire signed Articles of Incorporation and filed them with the Kentucky Secretary of State.

At the first meeting after that, Reed, who worked at the Lexington Herald Leader, was elected president and Abshire, an attorney, the treasurer. Invitations to attend were sent to 100. Sixty showed up and 58 joined and paid dues on day one. CKCS was Reed's idea. That was the start of it all. Here the organization continues 33 year later.

September has additional significance for CKCS. It was September 1, 2002, fifteen years ago, that we moved from 1300 New Circle Road to 160 Moore Drive, our present Lexington location. It looks like we will be here a while longer as the Board of Directors agreed to renew our contract with the building owners for another four years through October 31, 2021.

Troubleshooting a Windows update problem

Mike Seiler has the responsibility to keep all 18 CKCS computers in the classroom, workshop room and office area updated and working. He weekly checks to see that all the necessary programs and apps are ready for scheduled classroom, SIG and workshops instruction.

Our thanks go to him for his dedicated effort in this difficult chore.

Sometimes Windows updating does not work correctly. Windows will state there were problems installing the update and give you an error code (see Figure 1). Clicking the "Retry" button will go through the steps of downloading the update and trying to install it. Most likely you will receive the same Update error message. Fortunately, Windows has a troubleshooting program that can fix many of the errors that cause these problems.







How to Run the Windows Update Troubleshooter

1) While holding the Windows key down and hit the letter 'S' (Win + s). This opens the search window. Type "control panel" without the quotes. When you see "Control Panel" at the top of the search list press the ENTER key (or click on "Control Panel").







Be patient. It may take a while for the Troubleshooter to find all the problems. One of the computers I was working on took ten minutes to find and fix all the errors. The following screen (Figure 2) may appear indicating that you need to restart your computer. If it appears, click on "Next". Your computer will reboot.

8) Once the troubleshooter is finished you will see a window similar to Figure 3. Click the "Close" button. Now you are ready to try installing the update. If the window with the "Retry" button is still present (Figure 1), click the "Retry" button. It will start the updating process from the beginning. i.e. it will start by downloading the update.



I have had update problems appear on five different computer's in the CKCS computer lab (most of them had different error numbers). Using the Windows Update Troubleshooter fixed the updating errors on all of them.



Is an Apple car in our future?

Around 2005, I spent many hours listening to my iPod during my daily walks and exercise routines. While most people were listening to music in 2005, I was listening to technology podcasts that were related to Apple. Back then, most of the Apple pundits were discussing the possibility of combining a computer (i-pod) with a mobile phone. People laughed at this idea, thinking it would not be practical. This quickly became a reality! The first iPhone was introduced in January, 2007. As of this year, there have been over a billion iPhones sold.

Today, there are all kinds of rumors that Apple is working on a smart car. It seems like a natural progression for Apple to enter the car market. Steve Jobs considered developing an Apple car, but eventually decided to focus his energy on the iPhone.

Here are some of the rumors floating around about the Apple car:

In 2014, Apple began work on "Project Titan," an electric vehicle, but shelved this project to begin work on an autonomous driving system that would partner with existing car makers. These cars would most likely integrate a blend of iPhone, iPad, or MacBook, and emphasize driving safety with the use of Siri to warn drivers about weather or traffic conditions and other road hazards.

When it comes to car technology, Apple definitely wants to do more than just combine iPads or iPhones and have Siri give warnings about traffic conditions. Apple has the much-needed software expertise to design a car and is already working with car companies on "**CarPlay**", the iPhonecentered car information/entertainment system. Apple has a global network of stores, possesses unlimited resources and innovative ideas, and has the ability to understand what consumers want. This combination could completely change the way we buy cars in the future.

In early 2017, Apple began testing a self-driving car on the California highways outside of San Francisco. So either option is a possibility – developing a self-driving iCar, or testing out autonomous technology for other car manufacturers to develop. The actual design of the vehicle is still up for



debate. Some say it will be a car, others a minivan. Some say driverless, others say electric, or both.

It was reported by *MacRumors* that Apple bought a number of car-related domain names including apple.car, apple.cars and apple.auto, although these registered domains could be for Apple's in-car system, CarPlay. According to *AppleInsider*, Apple has found the perfect top secret testing facility in which to build the Apple car prototypes - a World War II naval base near San Francisco.



Perhaps the clearest sign of Apple's interest in the car industry is the number of new hires that have occurred in recent years. Apple seems to be getting engineers from Tesla, Samsung and other major carmakers.

It's going to be a while for an Apple-branded car, but from everything that has been going on in the last few years, the Apple car is definitely in our future.

The first car that I drove was a 1959 Ford, shift on the column, on which my grandmother taught me how to drive. I only drove on country roads and on farm lanes. Rolling forward in time, PLEASE place me in line for the purchase of an i-Automobile, and have it delivered by an iFemale who can instruct me on how to drive this vehicle.

TECH TIP Would you like an Automatic Shutdown shortcut icon on your desktop, or task bar or start menu? There is a special one available just for you.

This works for Windows XP, Vista, 7, 8 & 10. It saved time. Highlight and Control+C to copy this: shutdown -s -t 01. Right click your desktop and select New. Click on Shortcut. In the textbox, do Control V to Paste. Click on Next, then click on Finish. Then right click on the icon on your desktop, you may pin it to the start menu or to the task bar or both if you wish.

TECH TIP A Keyboard shortcut to scroll down a page in web browsing.

The next time you reach the bottom of the screen while reading, just hit the space bar to jump to the next page.

Tip from Readers Digest Sep 2017. More tips offered on page 49 of that same RD issue

TECH TIP It is easy to view and switch among multiple open documents or apps on your computer. Holding down the ALT key with your thumb, tap the TAB key and every open document will be displayed in miniature side by side as shown in the image below. The square around the second item indicates it is 'selected.' Continue to tap the TAB key and the next open doc or app is selected. When you release the ALT key the selected document opens full screen. It is quick and simple. In the image below, when I touched the ALT + TAB it showed that I had five windows open; a newspaper, Google search; a word doc; Skype and the Snipping Tool. The Google search is selected so should I release the ALT key, it would become full screen. Try and practice this tip. It is a very useful feature.



TECH TIP Icons not big enough on your desktop? Just click on the desktop, then hold down the control key while you turn the wheel on your mouse forward.



Answer: Netflix has three plans. So, for a single person who doesn't intend to share his password and login with friends, the basic, one-screen-at-a-time plan will work great. AUGUST TECH NIGHT REVIEW

LPL has lots to offer genealogy researchers

Denise Shanks, a librarian from the Lexington Public Library, attracted a good crowd of CKCS members, including a handful of guests as she gave a great overview of the

Ancestry Library Edition (LE) at Tech Night on August 14. She explained that this database is only available while you are at one of the public library branches, but she was able to demonstrate by using screen shots to show what information this database gives you. The list was comprehensive: vital records, census records, message boards, military records, immigration records, land and tax records, directories of cities and businesses and graves. She advised that ancestry staff and volunteers are adding resources all the time to this collection of records. A recent revamping of the program has made it even easier to research family history.

In addition to Ancestry LE, Denise showed other databases that you can search online while at home at your computer. She provided a handout on helpful websites. She was able to demonstrate a live search of "HeritageQuest" and "Find-a-Grave".



Librarians at any of the branches can help you with Ancestry LE and how to use the various databases.

Additionally, The Kentucky Room at the Central Library can help with specific family history questions. Another service is their "Book-a-Librarian" where you can get a 45-minute session of one-on-one help. Her advice to the newcomers to genealogy

was to start with yourself and work backwards through the generations. ckcs

- » If somebody call you about the "problems of your computer" simply hang off; they are not legitimate people so do not even waste your time even threatening them.
