- Voice Operated Assistants







CKCS members get a 20 percent discount on all class, seminar, and workshop fees.



TECH TIP Creating a screen shot

A tip that I learned in Mike Seiler's Windows 10 class that I have showed several people in the last few weeks is how to do a screen shot of what is on the computer monitor and then is automatically saved in a folder called Screenshots.

Press and hold down the **Win Key** and tap the **PrintScreen** Key at the same time.



There will be a dimming of the screen and the image will automatically be saved under This PC > Pictures > Screenshots.

TECH TIP Protecting your hardware during a natural disaster

As some of you may know, I live in South Florida and recently went through a major hurricane.

I felt it would be a good thing to explain how I handle my electronic equipment in such a situation. Natural disasters happen everywhere, and everyone needs to have some guidelines to protect his/her valuable and expensive equipment. Firstly, I have all my equipment (TVs, Computers, DVDs, Cable Box, etc.) on Uninterrupted Power Supplies (UPSs). Some people use surge protectors, but I prefer the battery backups. When I get a power outage or a natural disaster that causes the loss of power, I turn off all the equipment and the UPSs. This enables me to use the battery backups to charge essential equipment such as a cell phone.

The next step is to make sure none of my equipment is on the floor. This will help prevent water damage in most cases. I then wait until the power returns and I can use my equipment again. If my cell phone runs down, I use my UPSs to charge them, so I can stay connected if possible.

I hope this tip is useful for the next time you experience a major problem in your area. Of course, in Kentucky you should never get the direct hit from a hurricane, but the remains of one with the high winds and tornadoes are always possible. Perhaps these comments will encourage you to make plans appropriate for a local natural disaster.

Where is it safe to download and research software?

Many times a month I need to review a software product or download a free piece of software. With all the threats that are out there on the web, it is important to get accurate information and a clean download. Firstly, as I have said before, it is imperative that you have well-rated internet security running on your machine.

Once that is in place, how do I find a tool or application I may need? I subscribe to a few website newsletters which let me know what is happening in security, new hardware and software. I am very particular about where I get my information because there are many scams happening on the web. My main source of information comes from the following websites where I check regularly, or get their newsletters:

- Kim Komando www.komando.com She has a national radio program each week and publishes several newsletters. Her information is well researched and her recommendations and website information on downloads is safe.
- CNet www.cnet.com I use several ways of checking CNet's information daily. I have an app on my cell phone for the current information on the website. If I see an article I want to peruse, I click on it and read the article. I trust their information and suggestions. CNet also has an area on its website to get software through downloads. I use this service often.
- Ziff Davis Ziff Davis is a publisher of technology magazines which I read. The articles in the magazines are well researched and accurate. Some of the magazines he publishes include PC Magazine (www.pcmag.com), Computer Shopper (www.computershopper.com) and ExtremeTech (www.extremetech.com). Each of these sites offers an email newsletter if you are interested.
- Other Magazine Sites There are several other technology magazines I read and get information. They include PC World (www.pcworld.com), TechAdvisor (www.techadvisor.com.uk) and PC&Tech (www.pcauthority.com.au).
- Major PC Vendors I also trust major PC Vendors including Microsoft, Apple, Logitech, HP, Dell, Amazon, etc..

When I need a piece of software or hardware, I search in my browser for the class of item (i.e.: office utilities). After the search I first look for reviews or product comparisons from a source I trust. Then I use that information to make an informed decision.



Freddy Peralta, owner of KyTrade, said during the Tech Night on October 9, that he will be moving to Miami, Florida, to take care of his mother. Freddy has been a long-time supporter of CKCS in many ways over the past 27 years. He has contributed funds and promoted our organization with signs in his popular Lexington store. He has hosted several of our Dr. Fixit SIGs with his technicians on hand.

On this special occasion, possibly his last official program at CKCS, Freddy reviewed tips to improve computer speed and encouraged using a solid state drive. He stressed the importance of regular backups using Acronis and having MalwareBytes in addition to a virus protection program.

As part of his presentation, he brought his latest state-of-the-art computer, for members to see. It was a desktop tower with 64 GB ram, a 1 TB solid state drive with an i9 Intel chip 10 core. The powerful unit requires a 1,000-watt power supply. It had a 1080 ti chip. It is cooled by a liquid radiator of the kind you might find in a car. No, it was not cheap. The cost was in the \$5,000 range.

Freddy and KyTrade have been a corporate sponsor for CKCS for a very long time and probably several hundred CKCS members have been his customers over the years.

As he heads south to Miami, his business is for sale and he hopes one of the prospects he has will keep it going once he leaves. He is saying so long, but not good bye, as he indicated he will return to Lexington from time to time.
