
How to avoid becoming a victim

Have you ever received a call from someone from "Microsoft" or some other familiar company, telling

you there was a problem with your computer and you need to take a certain action to correct it? If so, then you might have been the target of one of the latest scams going around. Heather Clary, Director of Communications for the Better Business Bureau of Central & Eastern Kentucky, Inc., will be the presenter at our May Tech Night. She is going to share some of the most common scams that have come to the BBB's attention. You may be aware of some of them, but there likely are some that will be new to you.

She will be discussing email "phishing" scams; pop-ups while surfing the Web; a phone scam that tries to trick computer owners into giving control of the machine to a caller alleging they are with "Microsoft"; and scams that use popular websites like Craigslist, CareerBuilder, and others, hoping you will fall for various scams.

In addition to scams, she will address data breaches and what that means to you. The list of companies that have reported data



She will provide some background information on the BBB, the free services they provide, and how the public can use the BBB to protect themselves. This is an important presentation that you can't afford to miss. Bring a friend as a guest. We will start at 7 p.m.

BACK TO BASICS

Email Basic Review

I am going to assume you already have an email address and are enjoying sending and receiving emails. But perhaps you are not aware of the fun and helpful options available in all email applications. Hopefully, something in this article will push your curiosity button and encourage you to "ask google" for more information. Although each email provider (app or program) may look different on your device (and even the SAME provider can look quite different on a Windows computer than on an iPad, etc.), all are capable of doing the following:

Entering people in your "TO:" box – If you just start typing the name of someone, your email will search your "contact list" or "address book" to find a match and list what it finds. Just click on the name you want. Be sure to keep your contact list of email addresses current. It is easy to click on a name which may have an OLD email address. If no name matches, you have to enter the email address yourself. Why not add that person to your contact list for next time?

Learn to use "group" email addresses. You can use your contact list to create a "group" email such as for a club or family group. This means you only have to enter the group name, and ALL the email addresses in that group will be placed in the "TO:" box for you. This is a great time saver. Of course, you need to keep the group current. It is easy to learn how to "add" or "delete" people from a group.

Clean out your "inbox" by deleting old emails, or keeping only the emails you want by moving them to a folder. Your "inbox", "deleted emails", "drafts", etc., are all folders or places – you can add your own folders to this list and move the emails you want to keep to them. I have a folder for STUG emails and for another club I belong to. This keeps the emails in my inbox to a minimum.

Learn to SEARCH for emails in any or all folders. You can search and find words in the subject line or in the emails themselves. You can search for all emails to or from a specific address too. This is helpful if you forget where you put an email.

Emails you delete will go to the "deleted emails" folder and they need to be deleted again from that folder to be deleted forever. Check to see if your email has an automatic delete setting for this folder. I have my email set to delete emails older than 90 days from my "deleted emails" folder. Do NOT keep thousands of emails! (Yes, there are people who like to keep everything, they call them "hoarders" and they have their own television show!).

Sharing photos using email is easy. You just "attach" the photo (or ANY file) to your email before you send it. Yes, you can attach more than one, but don't go crazy and attach too many, usually three or four is plenty. Photos take a lot more time to send than text.

Learn to access your email on another device. This is very helpful when you are traveling or need to use another computer to get to your email. You should always be able to access your email by going to your email internet webpage and entering your email account and password there. I highly recommend that you try this to be sure you can do it when you need to.




All emails provide many tools and options to help you. Most of them are easy to use, too. Please "ask Google" or use YouTube and watch a short video about your email and the possibilities it provides. There is always more to learn, and I hope this information will be helpful for you to find and use the tools you need for better emailing!

Course/Workshop Descriptions

Classes

Exploring the World of Photography... Topics covered will be: White balance, DOF (depth of field), Perspective, Stop Motion, Slow Motion, Aperture, Close-up ,and an introduction of basic filters: (Circular Polarizer, and Neutral Density). Our 4th week will include an introduction to Infrared photography. We will have some Circular Polarizer, Neutral Density, and Infrared filters for you to use.



<u>Computer Basics for the PC Using Windows 10</u>... Learn the fundamentals of using a Windows 10 computer. Learn to use various aspects of the Microsoft Word Processing program, including manipulating text and inserting graphics into a document. Basic filing and basic file management are introduced. The final class of this course deals with the basics of email and use of the Internet.

<u>Beginning Digital Imaging Using Corel PaintShop Pro 2018 for PC</u>...In this series of classes the students will learn how to enhance their pictures using an exceptional digital imaging program. They will learn the steps of how to crop, brighten, lighten, and generally clean up their pictures for better presentation. We will discuss cloning and making selections from their pictures. We will also cover how to properly scan your old photographs and slides.

<u>Get More Out of Your iPhone*</u>... Learn important (and hidden) functions of your iPhone. Learn how to download apps, move them, nest them and delete them. Learn how to get better photos with your phone, organize your pictures, and send them in text and emails. Texting messages and using Siri will also be covered. Participants should bring their iPhones updated with the latest operating system and know ,or bring. their passcode, Apple ID, and password.

<u>Is Windows 10 Driving you Crazy?...</u> Learn how to navigate in Microsoft's Windows 10 operating system. You will install several free programs and learn how to use them, including a free word processor that is as robust as Word. We will look at computer security and how to back up your computer. Also, we will look at OneDrive, Microsoft's cloud storage system, and how to use it to share your pictures with friends and family.

Workshops

<u>Beginning Genealogy*</u>... Do you feel like a novice in genealogy? Then this workshop is for you. You will learn some of the basics in researching your family roots.

<u>Secrets of Your iPad*</u>... Learn key information about many pre-installed apps on your iPad. Learn some important functions in settings, how to arrange, nest, download and delete apps. Sending emails and texts will be covered. Taking better photos, making folders, and sending them will be demonstrated. Face-time will be included if time permits. Participants should bring their iPad updated with the latest operating system and know (or bring) their Apple ID and password.

<u>Understanding Facebook</u>...Students will learn how to maintain a Facebook page on the Windows PC. The Profile page and Home page will be explained. How to find friends, make a post, edit and respond to posts, prioritize news feeds, check privacy settings, unfriend and block friends, and delet and deactivate your Facebook account are some of the features covered.

<u>30 + Helpful Tips to Using the Internet*</u>...Whether you are working on a word document, a digital image or other project, you probably will be using the internet to gather more information, capture images or find explanations on how to do something. We will be using Google Chrome to explore ways to find things on the internet, how to exclude things from a search, and how to search for specific words or string of words. We will cover handy things like the snipping tool, using the internet as a dictionary, thesaurus, calculator, and lots more.

* These classes or workshops meet in the main room and class size is determined by the instructor. All other classes meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.



Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (this is at the discretion of the instructor). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.



CKCS newsletter writers get added coverage







One dongle to rule them and in the darkness, bind them

When you get a wireless mouse, keyboard, or any other of a myriad of wireless devices, what is common is that they all come with their own dongle. Most operate within the 2.4 GHz range and are mated to that device. Lose the dongle and you might as well kiss it goodbye. Ever noticed, on some of these devices, a tiny orange asterisk tattooed upon its surface?





The orange asterisk symbol stands for Unifying Receiver, one of the dirty little secrets of peripheral manufacturers. Why have all your USB ports taken up with dongles when only one is required, the Unifying Receiver?

Logitech introduced its Unifying Receiver back in 2009. At first, it was only for Logitech's line of devices, and it was limited to keyboards and mice. Many manufacturers have quietly included the same function on their peripherals. One of the pieces that make this magic work is the Logitech Unifying Software (http://support.logitech.com/en_us/software/unifying).

The software acts the same as a Bluetooth pairing, mating the device to the receiver. To set up this paring you first download the software. Then plug in the Unifying Receiver to a USB port and allow its driver to load. Finally, you run the software. When you run the software, there is a prompt that will ask you to turn each device (mouse, keyboard, etc.) off and on. If the device is compatible it is paired to that one receiver. To add other devices later, you run the software again and follow the prompts. Right now, it is still limited to six devices per receiver. This is a space saver for systems that are port limited providing the device is recognized as compatible.

A Logitech Receiver will pair up to six Logitech and non-Logitech peripherals, provided they both have the symbol. A Microsoft Receiver will pair most devices...but not Logitech."

I have not seen any compatibility lists, but I can confirm from a tech standpoint that most peripherals that have the symbol pair without issue. I have a user at work that has a Logitech Unifying Receiver with an Asus keyboard, a Logitech mouse, and a Wacom drawing tablet. The limiting factor seems to be if your OS sees the device as an HID (Human Interface Device). For someone using many wired HIDs and wanting to switch to wireless to open USB ports the Unifying Receiver can come in very handy.

COMPUTER TIP

Let your computer read to you.

If you use Microsoft EDGE as your browser, you are able to have a PDF file, such as this newsletter, read aloud to you, word for word. Open the page you want read and highlight the text. In the upper right-hand corner of the EDGE browser page are three dots. Click on those and select READ ALOUD. It will read the highlighted text and continue right on reading the rest of that page and the following pages until you stop it. You stop the read aloud feature by clicking the REFRESH symbol to the left on that same line as those three dots. REFRESH is an arrow pointing in a circle. I haven't found a Read Aloud feature on Google Chrome, which I also use from time to time. This feature may be activated on any web page you visit.

Other browsers like Firefox, Apple Safari, etc., may have a similar feature but I don't know about those since I don't use them. **Tip by Jerry Heaton**

COMPUTER TIP

How to determine your current Windows 10 version number

- Click the Windows 10 Start button (left-most taskbar icon). 1.
- 2. In the left-side pane, click the **Settings** (gear icon) button.
- 3. In the Windows Settings screen, click **System** (first option).
- 4. In the left-side pane, under System, click About.
- 5. In the center pane, under Windows specifications, view the **Version number**.

Cure desktop clutter

If you have more than four rows of icons on your desktop, you probably have too many for efficient use. Desktop icons should only be something used

often. The icon idea is to put a program or project up front, so you don't have to spend a lot of time looking for it. Quick access is the key! If you have several dozen icons there, the ability to find something quickly is much less likely. We usually start with just a few, but they tend to grow in number as we install a new program. Every program writer thinks his/her program is the absolute most important one, so they hang another icon on your desktop.

So here is what I recommend you do. Look over the icons on your desktop and identify the ones you haven't clicked on in weeks or maybe months. Right click somewhere on your Desktop. Select NEW, then click on FOLDER, name the new folder Misc. or Stuff. Then hit Enter.



Now, left click and drag your least used icons into this one folder. Leave only the frequently used icons in view. Those rarely used icons are still available to you should, later on, you need one of them.

Get to work!. You will be glad you did!





Unlocking the secrets of your ancestry and genealogy

April's Tech Night found a crowd of people interested in learning more about the very popular DNA kits available on the market. Many in the audience had done one of the DNA tests. Pat Settles, above, a self-described DNA "test junkie," gave an overview of his experiences with the various kits and joked that he had spent quite a bit, buying different kits, trying to decide which was best.

He has used several, including AncestryDNA, 23andMe, and explained the different reasons people choose one over the other. Some are autosomal, some use the YDNS chromosome and others the mtDNA. FamilyTree DNA has been reported as best for serious genealogy, YDNA and mtDNA tests. AncestryDNA seems best for cousin matching and most geographic regions for ethnicity. MyHeritage strong suit is autosomal testing on a budget. 23andMe is best for genetic health screening, not genealogy. LivingDNA appears best for roots in British Isles.

Also, for a relatively small cost, you can share the test results with another company and get more results. To get more information beyond the basic information, be aware there are more fees.

Individually, the tests are relatively inexpensive and go on sale usually around family holidays like Mother's Day, Father's Day, and Christmas. Those are the best times to buy, especially if you are like Pat and want to try several of the kits.

A few Funny Pages / Useful Information

Interesting Scientific Discovery

Researchers for the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority found over 200 dead crows near greater Boston recently, and there was concern that they may have died from Avian flu.

A bird pathologist examined the remains of all the crows, and to everyone's relief, confirmed the problem was definitely NOT Avian flu. The cause of death appeared to be vehicular impacts. However, during the detailed analysis, it was noted that varying colors of paint residue that appeared on the bird's beaks and claws it was determined that 98 percent of the crows had been killed by impact with trucks, while only 2 percent were killed by an impact with a car.

MTA then hired an ornithological behaviorist to determine if there was a cause for the disproportionate percentages of truck kills versus car kills. He very quickly concluded the cause.

When crows eat road kill, they always have a look-out crow in a nearby tree to warn of impending danger. They discovered that while all the lookout crows could shout "Cah", not a single one could shout "Truck."
