Computer Techniques and Tools used with Digital Photography

There are a lot of computer tools that can help with your digital photography. **Joe Dietz** will share some of these at the September Tech Night. Specifically, he will show us how to resample, crop to size, batch process to rename and batch process to convert.

Resample – You just went on a fabulous trip and want to send a few pictures to your friends. You attach them to an email and hit send. The timer starts spinning and keeps on spinning. The computer may say too large to send (Or the person getting them has a computer that won't take such a large email.) What do you do? He will talk about how to resample them (or is it resize?)

Crop to Size – You have sent off a bunch of pictures to Walmart (or Meijer or Walgreen) and they come back with the image poorly positioned on the paper. (Maybe the top of a head or top of a building cut off) What do you do? He will talk about how to crop the image to the correct size before printing them or sending them to be printed.

Batch Process – Rename – You have just taken a bunch of great pictures and want them with a file name that reflects the trip. You don't want them named things like img 5778 or DSCF3991. You would like a name such as Africa 001, 002, and so forth.



Batch Process – Convert – You just took 50 pictures and want to create a slide show that you can give to folks. However, each picture that you took is large and multiply that times 50 and you will have a huge file. For a slide show you don't need very large resolution so let's try batch resizing the image from the original camera size (say 4800 x 3400) to a smaller size that will show up well on your screen (say 800 X 600).

Join us for Tech Night and learn how to avoid these problems with your photos. - ckcs







Block calls on your phones and other options

Whether cell phone or landline phone, we all receive many nuisance calls daily. It is a simple matter to block unwanted calls on most phones once you know how.

Let's begin with your home landline phone. I receive numerous junk calls every day. I use a Panasonic smart home phone system. Like most smart home phones, it permits you to enter your phonebook. You can also set the number of rings before the answering machine kicks in. The LCD on my phone will show me the name of anyone calling who is in my phonebook. Conversely, any name not in my phonebook will also show. The first time I receive a nuisance call I ignore it. My phone will record the name and number of all calls made and keep this information until I erase it. How do I block an unwanted number? I have choices.

My Panasonic will block up to 250 phone numbers. In my case, I use Spectrum (Time Warner) for my landline. You may go to the Spectrum website and block selected calls. You may also check the box that tells Spectrum to use Nomorobo.com. Nomorobo is a large database of nuisance calls. You will hear one ring, and the call will be blocked. For those of you who use other phone providers, you still may use Nomorobo provided the provider has a Simultaneous Ring feature that will ring your phone and Nomorobo at the same time. Furthermore, you may request Nomorobo to add phone numbers to its database by going to its website. Your provider, like mine, may also have a way to block calls on its website.

What about my cell phone? It is even easier to block unwanted calls. If you have an Android phone, just go to Recent Calls, select the phone number and then Details. Under Details you will see a choice to block the call. Depending on the Android version finding the Recent Calls Details varies.

What about you iPhone? Basically, it works the same way if you have IOS 7 or later. Open the phone app. Select the Recents tab at the bottom. Click the 'I' symbol next to the unwanted number, scroll down and tap Block this Caller. Confirm your decision. Microsoft cell phones work in a similar manner. Tap the phone app on the start screen, swipe to history, tap and hold the caller you want to block, and tap block number.

I also have one other option using my Panasonic phone system. You may link two cell phones to the Panasonic phone system. When linked via Bluetooth, the main Panasonic phone unit will show a lighted LED, one for each linked cell phone. When a cell phone call comes in, it will ring on your Panasonic landline system as well as your cell phone. Likewise, you may use the Panasonic system to call out on either of your cell phones. When you finally drop your landline system, the Panasonic Phone system, in my case with five phones around the house, will be a godsend. With unlimited cell phone service becoming extremely cheap, this is an option. Now you can answer or call over your cell phone network from any phone in the house. Even more, the Panasonic system has much better sound.

Hopefully, when you have activated some of the features I mention here,, you will have some peace and quiet.

Course/Workshop Descriptions

<u>Classes</u>

Introduction to Photoshop Elements for Windows PC...In this introductory course we will learn to use the tools of this program to do basic photo enhancements including quick fixes, cropping, cloning, spot healing, red eye removal, levels, and adding borders. We will also discuss photo considerations prior to printing, introduction to layers, converting images to black and white, enhancing and restoring old photos, adding text, using brushes, graphics, adjustment layers, templates, special features, filters, and creating a slide show.

Exploring the World of Photography*...Topics covered will include, white balance, DOF (depth of field), aperture, shutter speeds to blur motion and stop motion. We will show how to photograph close up with the lens you already have. We will demonstrate close up and micro photography techniques with other lenses. You will learn how to correctly use common filters (polarizers and ND - neutral density). We will introduce you to infrared photography with your camera using our filters.

Weeks 1,3, and 6 will be held in the classroom and weeks 2, 4, and 5 will be held on location. The locations are the Arboretum, Henry Clay's home and Jacobson Park. You should bring filters if you have them. Filters will be available for the class to use for those who do not have filters. Bring your camera with fully charged battery, memory card, thumb drive and your camera manual.

Is Windows 10 Driving you Crazy?...Learn how to navigate in Microsoft's newest operating system by changing the Windows 10 Start Screen to make it more user friendly. You will install several free programs and learn how to use them, including a free word processor that is as robust as Word. We will look at computer security and how to back up your computer in case a disaster should occur. Also, we will look at OneDrive, Microsoft's cloud storage system, and how to use it to share your pictures with friends and family

Flash Photography (\$30)*...Learn how to use your built-in flash, an external flash and a soft box to take better pictures. The first class will be instructional, the second class will be to review your work and provide corrective assistance. Bring your camera with fully charged battery, memory card, thumb drive, your camera manual, and a flash, if you have one.

Photo Stitching (\$30)*...Learn how to use your post processing program to stitch 2,3,4 or more photos together to make one panoramic photograph. The first class will teach you how to stitch the photos. We will be demonstrating using Adobe Elements and PhotoShop. The second class will be spent reviewing your work and providing technical assistance. Bring your camera with its battery fully charged, memory card, thumb drive and your camera manual.

Computer Basics for Windows 10...Learn the fundamentals of using a Windows 10 personal computer. Learn to use various aspects of the Microsoft Word Processing program, including manipulating text and inserting graphics into a document. Basic filing and basic file management are introduced. The final class of this course deals with the basics of email and use of the Internet.

Organizing Your Computer Files for Windows 10 (\$30)...This class will enable the student to understand how Windows 10 personal computer filing works, set up a plan for organizing files, move files from one storage device to another, use nifty time-savers in moving a large number of files at once and understand how to make and use folders. CKCS Computers will be used for Lessons 1 & 2. Each attendee should bring his/her own laptop or a flash drive containing personal files for Lesson 3. Each person will have a chance to practice on his/her own files before leaving the class. A flash drive is required for class.

Get More Out of Your Mac...You use your Mac computer every day, but you probably only use a fraction of the shortcuts and tips that are built into your Mac's operating system. This course will teach you basic tips and shortcuts to help you become more productive and get work done faster. These tips work with the latest Mac operating system versions including High Sierra. Sierra, and El Capitan. This six-week course will help you become more proficient in using your Mac. There are dozens of settings you can turn on or off, System Preferences that can be customized, and shortcuts that make using your Mac more enjoyable. Students need a basic knowledge of the Mac operating system and how to use a mouse, trackpad or trackball to utilize the screen commands

<u>Workshops</u>

Fixing Up your Photos (and Other Things) Using FastStone Digital Imaging (Windows PC only)...Do you want to fix up and work on your pictures without paying a lot of \$\$\$\$ on a digital imaging program? We'll look at FastStone. FastStone is an extensive digital imaging program that is free and does a wide variety of things. In this workshop, you will learn how to dress up your pictures, crop, brighten or darken, create contact sheets, create a slide show that can include music and lots more. We will show you how to download the program along with a great syllabus.

Secrets of Your iPhone*...Learn important (and hidden) functions of your iPhone. Learn how to download apps, move them, nest them and delete them. Learn how to get better photos with your phone, organize your pictures, and send them in text and emails. Texting messages and using Siri will also be covered. Participants should bring their iPhone and know (or bring) their Apple ID and password.

Posing Individuals and Groups*...Learn the correct way to take individual, couple, small and large group photos. Learning how to pose your subjects will make your pictures look professional.

<u>Making a Photo Book using Shutterfly</u>...In this workshop the attendees will learn how to prepare pictures for a photo book, how to transfer pictures to the Shutterfly workspace, and then organize the pictures from the front to the last page of the book. Finally, we will go through the steps to ordering the book and applying coupons to reduce the price. For this scenario, attendees will use pictures supplied by the instructor. We will be using a program called Shutterfly.

<u>Understanding Facebook</u>...Students will learn how to maintain a Facebook page on the Windows PC. The Profile page and Home page will be explained. How to find friends, make a

post, edit and respond to posts, prioritizing news feeds, checking privacy settings, unfriending and blocking friends, and deleting and deactivating your Facebook account are some of the features covered.

<u>30 + Tips to Using the Internet*</u>...Whether you are working on a word document, a digital image or other project, you probably will be using the internet to gather more information, capture images or find explanations on how to do something. We will be using Google Chrome to explore ways to find things on the internet and of how to exclude things from a search, to how to search for specific words or string of words. We will cover handy things like the snipping tool, using the internet as a dictionary, Thesaurus, calculator and lots more.

Secrets of Your iPad*...Learn key information about many pre-installed apps on your iPad. Learn some important functions in settings, how to arrange, nest, download and delete apps. Sending emails and texts will be covered. Taking better photos, making folders, and sending them will be demonstrated. Face-time will be included if time permits. Participants should bring their iPad updated with the latest operating system and know (or bring) their Apple ID and password.

* These classes or workshops meet in the main room and their class size is determined by the instructor. All other classes meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.

Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (this is at the discretion of the instructor). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.

COSTS: All classes have a fee payable to CKCS of \$60 and Workshops have a fee of \$30, unless stated otherwise (see above).

CKCS members get a 20 percent discount on all class, seminar, and workshop fees.

Yes, MetroNet did visit CKCS in August

Two representatives from Lexington's newest internet service provider, MetroNet, made a presentation during Tech Night on August 13 about plans to make Lexington a "Gigabyte City". They were Tana Williamson, the marketing coordinator, and Robert Bartley, the direct sales associate manager for Kentucky.

I am glad I attended, for I learned several things.

- (1) A lot of people are interested in what is on the horizon for Lexington. We had a full house of members and guests to hear what MetroNet had to say. Fortunately, we had enough chairs for everyone.
- (2) Although much effort is underway to lay fiber optic cable all over the city, the job won't be competed for about three years.
- (3) I was surprised to learn that already some Lexington citizens are online with the high-speeds fiber internet.
- (4) The plan is to provide every homeowner the opportunity to have up to a gigabyte of internet speeds over fiber wires that will be installed directly to their devices, in their house.

MetroNet will offer four levels of internet. 100MB download / 25MB upload; 200MB / 75MB; 500MB / 100MB and 1 gigabyte (1000 megabytes) download / 250MB upload speeds. Initially, new subscribers who order 100 megabytes of fiber service will get one gigabyte of service for a period of six months, to allow the customer to get the feel of what a gigabyte speed is like. They believe, after the trial period the customer won't want to go to a slower speed. A full gigabyte speed will be priced at less than \$100 a month.

With these speeds, multiple users are able to download and upload, share files and stream audio and video all at the same time with no effect on performance. And no buffering!

Their primary interest is the internet, as they will also offer customers TV and phone service at what they call "pass-thru prices" they charge what it costs them for the channel package you choose. All major movie channels will be available. Of course customers may choose to get their TV stations over internet devices they own, such as Play Station View, YouTube TV; DirecTV Now, Apple TV, Roku, etc.

There is no contract to sign. There will be local offices and the call center will be in Lexington.

BACK TO BASICS

Software (Apps) Upgrades

Software – those programs and apps that you use every day – almost every one of them will require you to upgrade or download a newer version sooner or later. Some apps get updated very frequently, especially the more popular ones. In this article we hope to soothe your fears and give you some helpful tips when doing your upgrades.

You are, hopefully, happily using your device when you get a notice on Windows (lower right corner notification area of your desktop screen) or on your iPad or iPhone (a red circle appears on your "App Store" icon with a number) that updates are waiting for you to download. Almost always you will want to download them – that is, perform the update – soon.

Updates contain "fixes" to the software that the owners of that software would like to make available to you, so that's a good thing. I also believe that updates also contain new advertising that will display while you are using the app. So, it is a mixed blessing, but you still should install the update anyway.

If you are NOT getting these notices to update, your device may have the option turned on which "auto-updates" your apps for you. Many people may wish to turn on this option.

<u>In Windows 10</u>, you can use the search bar in the bottom left to search for "Windows Update Settings," when there, select "Advanced Options" and then look to make sure that "Automatic" is selected.

For iOS devices (iPad, iPhone) tap the Settings icon on your home screen, then scroll down to and select "iTunes & App Store". Scroll down to "AUTOMATIC DOWNLOADS" which then lists the things you may select from – the "Updates" button/slide should be green to have your updates downloaded automatically.

To install updates on your iPad or iPhone, touch the App Store icon and then touch "Updates" at the bottom of the screen. You will see a list (one or more) of the updates that are needed. You can touch each "update" box to do each one individually or you can touch the "update all" box to do them all. A blue circle will fill in gradually to show you the update is being installed.

To install an update in Windows, just click in the notification box that appears and follow the instructions. What I find much easier for me is to use the free utility program/app Glary Utilities. Running Glary Utilities will tell you what needs to be updated on your Windows computer and will allow you to download each update, one at a time. Glary prevents you from searching for the right website and hoping you are downloading the correct update.

Applying updates as they become available is a good idea. Someday maybe they will have an update to my brain that I can download, wouldn't that be nice?

- documents and personal files; use Acronis Backup Software to do monthly (and weekly) completely unattended image backups of your computer to a second hard drive (a USB connected one but preferable an internal one).
- » Use MalwareBytes software to protect against malware: and better yet use the Premium version (only \$15 per computer per year);
- » Windows 10 is GOOD and free (for existing Windows 7 and Windows 8 computers)! Welcome back to the Windows 7 like interface that most everybody feel at home with. Please be also aware that Windows 10 expand the amount of information obtained by Microsoft from your computer usage (more on it can be read at many places online including http://www.polygon.com/2015/7/31/9075531/windows-10-privacy-how-to).
- » Make sure that you are visiting the website that you really want to visit; there are many misleading sites that try to trick you into believing that they are the intended legit site ... but they are not! Be careful with the spelling of the name of a site; be careful with the first "findings" of the search engines; most times they are no findings but (many times deceptive) advertising.
- » If somebody call you about the "problems of your computer" simply hang off; they are not legitimate people so do not even waste your time even threatening them.
