
TECH NIGHT, Monday, October 8, 2018, at 7 p.m.

If it's Connected, it needs to be Protected

If you have a computer or a tablet, or a smart phone, you know that it is important to keep those secure. Now we also have IoT (Internet of Things) creeping into our lives and we sometimes don't think of them as needing to be secure. If you aren't familiar with that term IoT, it's things like smart garage door openers, smart thermostats, smart energy plugs, smart speakers system.... The list goes on and on.

Join presenter Bob Gostischa as he explains the current dangers that face us on a daily basis. He will also share what he uses to keep his computers, smart devices, and other connected things that are a part of the IoT secure. This presentation will cover computers (Windows and Mac), tablets, phones, and IoT.


Norbert "Bob" Gostischa, a resident of New Mexico, had a successful career in banking, and now enjoys his retirement as an enthusiastic IT security expert, most notably for <u>Avast Software</u>. Avast is the creator of Avast antivirus software. The Avast website has a discussion and help forum where



Bob has been helping with security-related and general computer issues since 2004. He has contributed over 35,000 forum interactions.

The format for this presentation is going to be a bit different than our usual Tech Night. This will be a Webinar (a seminar conducted over the internet) using Zoom Software. The presentation will be live and interactive. Bob Brown, Joe Dietz, Larry Trivette, and Brooke Thomas were on hand to do a practice run with Bob Gostischa as shown in the picture below. 


President's Comments

National Cyber Security Awareness Month

October is National Cyber Security Awareness Month (NCSAM). It is observed every October and was created as a collaborative effort between government and industry to ensure every American has the resources they need to stay safer and more secure online. 2018 marks the 15th year of National Cyber Security Awareness Month. The theme each year is Stop. Think. Connect.

Listed below are some of the tips that NCSAM suggests. We've heard many of them before, but it doesn't hurt to review these tips at least once a year.

PERSONAL INFORMATION IS LIKE MONEY. VALUE IT. PROTECT IT.

- Use strong passwords to lock your tablet and phone. Securing your devices keeps prying eyes out and can help protect your information in case your devices are lost or stolen.
- Think before you act: Ignore emails or communications that create a sense of urgency and require you to respond to a crisis, such as a problem with your bank account or taxes. This type of message is likely a scam.
- When in doubt, throw it out: Clicking on links in emails is often how bad guys get access to personal information. If an email looks weird, even if you know the person who sent it, it's best to delete.
- Make passwords strong: A strong password is a sentence that is at least 12 characters long. Focus on positive sentences or phrases that you like to think about and are easy to remember (for example, "I love country music."). On many sites, you can even use spaces!



• Write it down and keep it safe: Everyone can forget a password. Keep a list that's stored in a safe, secure place away from your computer.

Share with care

- What you post will last forever: Be aware that when you post a picture or message online, you may also be inadvertently sharing personal details with strangers about yourself and family members like where you live.
- Post only about others as you would like to have them post about you: The golden rule applies online as well.
- Own your online presence: It's OK to limit who can see your information and what you share.






Digital Photography Special Interest Group

News to Use

Microsoft office 365

Corporations selling computer software more and more are going to a subscription model. Instead of picking a time to upgrade your software, companies are collecting an annual fee and providing periodic upgrades and corrections to the software you own over the internet.

Microsoft did that with Windows 10, except the operating system has continued to be free.

Now, Microsoft has done that with their Office programs which they call Office 365. Once you enroll, they annually withdraw from your bank the annual fee,



and during the year you receive upgrades and corrections plus some perks. For example, with Office 365 you get a full terabyte of cloud storage instead of the 15 MB you get with Windows 10. Also, you get a phone number for support for using your Microsoft products.

At the end of your annual subscription, you have the option to extend your subscription or discontinue it.

Previously, an Office 365 Home subscription, can be shared by five people on up to a total of ten devices.

Share with more people and devices

Microsoft has announced that starting October 2, 2018, six people will be able to use the subscription instead of five. Each person will be able to install Office on all their devices and be signed into five at the same time. That means they can use Office no matter where they are or what device they're on.

September door prize winner

Each month, one attendee at the CKCS Tech Night meeting gets to choose a prize among three that are offered. In September the winner was CKCS member Hsiang Fan and he chose the Amazon Fire TV Stick, which is a streaming media player with Alexa voice remote that enables one to stream over the internet TV channels, movies and more.



Course/Workshop Descriptions

Classes

Is Windows 10 Driving you Crazy?...Learn how to navigate in Microsoft's newest operating system by changing the Windows 10 Start Screen to make it more user friendly. You will install several free programs and learn how to use them, including a free word processor that is as robust as Word. We will look at computer security and how to back up your computer in case a disaster should occur. Also, we will look at OneDrive, Microsoft's cloud storage system, and how to use it to share your pictures with friends and family

Flash Photography (\$30)*...Learn how to use your built-in flash, an external flash and a soft box to take better pictures. The first class will be instructional; the second class will be to review your work and provide corrective assistance. Bring your camera with fully charged battery, memory card, thumb drive, your camera manual, and a flash, if you have one.

Photo Stitching (\$30)*...Learn how to use your post processing program to stitch 2,3,4 or more photos together to make one panoramic photograph. The first class will teach you how to stitch the photos. We will be demonstrating using Adobe Elements and PhotoShop. The second class will be spent reviewing your work and providing technical assistance. Bring your camera with its battery fully charged, memory card, thumb drive and your camera manual.

<u>Computer Basics for Windows 10</u>...Learn the fundamentals of using a Windows 10 personal computer. Learn to use various aspects of the Microsoft Word Processing program, including manipulating text and inserting graphics into a document. Basic filing and basic file management are introduced. The final class of this course deals with the basics of email and use of the Internet.

Workshops

<u>Posing Individuals and Groups*</u>...Learn the correct way to take individual, couple, small and large group photos. Learning how to pose your subjects will make your pictures look professional.

<u>Making a Photo Book using Shutterfly</u>...In this workshop the attendees will learn how to prepare pictures for a photo book, how to transfer pictures to the Shutterfly workspace, and then organize the pictures from the front to the last page of the book. Finally, we will go through the steps to ordering the book and applying coupons to reduce the price. For this scenario, attendees will use pictures supplied by the instructor. We will be using a program called Shutterfly.

<u>Understanding Facebook</u>...Students will learn how to maintain a Facebook page on the Windows PC. The Profile page and Home page will be explained. How to find friends, make a post, edit and respond to posts, prioritizing news feeds, checking privacy settings, unfriending and blocking friends, and deleting and deactivating your Facebook account are some of the features covered.

<u>30 + Tips to Using the Internet*</u>...Whether you are working on a word document, a digital image or other project, you probably will be using the internet to gather more information, capture images, or find explanations on how to do something. We will be using Google Chrome to explore ways to find things on the internet and of how to exclude things from a search, to how to search for specific words or string of words. We will cover handy things like the snipping tool, using the internet as a dictionary, Thesaurus, calculator, and lots more.

<u>Secrets of Your iPad*</u>...Learn key information about many pre-installed apps on your iPad. Learn some important functions in settings, how to arrange, nest, download and delete apps. Sending emails and texts will be covered. Taking better photos, making folders, and sending them will be demonstrated. Face-time will be included if time permits. Participants should bring their iPad updated with the latest operating system and know (or bring) their Apple ID and password.

Details:

* These classes or workshops meet in the main room and their class size is determined by the instructor. All other classes meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.

Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (this is at the discretion of the instructor). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.

COSTS: All classes have a fee payable to CKCS of \$60 and Workshops have a fee of \$30, unless stated otherwise (see asterisk above).

CKCS members get a 20 percent discount on all class, seminar, and workshop fees.

Store Your Recipes In Word

I had a dear sister-in-law named Margaret, now deceased, who never owned a computer, probably because I don't think she ever typed anything. Just the same, my older brother, more than once, suggested that she buy a computer to join the modern world. Finally, she asked, "What would I use one for?" Searching for a quick response, he said, "You could keep your recipes on it". This brought a huge laugh from her and the rest of the family as well. Margaret seldom ever cooked, either.

This story came to mind when a classmate said she had found a recipe online for pumpkin nut bread. She wanted to save it. She did not know how to move it to her computer and wondered if there was a computer program for recipes. There may be one, but I told her how I organize my favorite recipes in my computer – I keep them all in a simple Word document titled "RECIPES". I offered her these step by step instructions.

- 1. If you haven't already done so, create a document named RECIPES.
- 2. Go to the web site and find your recipe.
- 3. Using the mouse, click and drag to highlight only the recipe. Be sure you start at the top left edge of the recipe, then drag until what you have is only the recipe. (A better way to highlight is to click at the start of the recipe, hold down the CONTROL + SHIFT keys and use the four arrow keys to highlight exactly what you want to save and nothing else).
- 4. Press Control + C and that copies the highlighted text to your clipboard.
- 5. Take what you have copied (it is on your clipboard) and paste it into your word document by pressing Control + V.
- 6. Edit your recipe text maybe making the title bold and a bit larger than the rest of the text.
- 7. Save the word document. It is now among your favorite recipes.

I put each recipe on a separate page by putting a "page break" at the bottom of the recipe (create a page break by holding down the control key and tapping the ENTER key once). This provides you a blank page on which to put your next recipe.

When I want to use a recipe, I just print that one page; thereby, I have a fresh copy to follow as I cook. If I spill something on the recipe, that's no problem because I generally discard those sheets and just reprint them the next time I am ready to use that recipe another again.

Give this a try. By the way, it is easy to improve a recipe on your master document for the next time.

The recipe my classmate wanted to save was for "Quick Pumpkin Nut Bread – a delicious recipe handy for the upcoming holidays"



Quick Pumpkin Nut Bread

1 egg, slightly beaten3/4 cup solid pack (canned) pumpkin1/2 cup milk1 t. nutmeg1 cup chopped pecans

1 pkg. Cinnamon Streusel Bread Mix

Combine egg, pumpkin, milk and nutmeg in large bowl. Add pecans, bread mix, and cinnamon streusel packet (from bread mix,) and mix thoroughly (set aside glaze packet from bread mix box).

Pour into greased and floured 9X5X3 loaf pan. Bake 350 degrees until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, about 50 minutes. Drizzle glaze from bread mix over top of loaf, if desired. Cool completely before slicing.

Can be made into muffins. Spoon into greased/floured muffin tins and bake 350 degrees until done, about 15 minutes.



September Tech Night Review

At September's Tech Night on September 10, Joe Dietz showed us some easy computer techniques to work with our photos. Everyone these days are taking photos and emailing them. Many times,

the size of the pictures exceed the size limits set by many email providers for a single email, so Joe showed us how to resample them. He also clarified the difference between resizing and resampling.

Using the free photo editing program FastStone, he demonstrated how to resample several photos at one time as a batch for use in a slide show or to email. Using the same software, he showed how to rename a group of photos in a batch to something you will recognize. He demonstrated just how easy it was to crop photos to the right size for printing at a photo store or at home.

- » Upgrade your hard drive to a SSD (Solid State Drive): now 120GB and 250GB SSD drives cost under \$100.00; the SSD positive impact on the performance of a computer is simply unbelievable.
- » Do Image Backups of your computer: of the whole computer (OS, programs, settings, everything) and no only your documents and personal files; use Acronis Backup Software to do monthly (and weekly) completely unattended image backups of your computer to a second hard drive (a USB connected one but preferable an internal one).
- » Use MalwareBytes software to protect against malware: and better yet use the Premium version (only \$15 per computer per year);
- » Windows 10 is GOOD and free (for existing Windows 7 and Windows 8 computers)! Welcome back to the Windows 7 like interface that most everybody feel at home with. Please be also aware that Windows 10 expand the amount of information obtained by Microsoft from your computer usage (more on it can be read at many places online including http://www.polygon.com/2015/7/31/9075531/windows-10-privacy-how-to).
- » Make sure that you are visiting the website that you really want to visit; there are many misleading sites that try to trick you into believing that they are the intended legit site ... but they are not! Be careful with the spelling of the name of a site; be careful with the first "findings" of the search engines; most times they are no findings but (many times deceptive) advertising.
- » If somebody call you about the "problems of your computer" simply hang off; they are not legitimate people so do not even waste your time even threatening them.
