# PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

CKCS is announcing another benefit of membership: A service to erase data files from disk drives being prepared for disposal or donation.



## CKCS Disc Erasing Service

### Why?

If you have a computer that you want to dispose of or donate, a common worry is that data left on your disk drive may be read and misused by someone who handles your old computer. There have been many cases in the news of this very issue.

### What to do?

Simply deleting all files can be a little difficult to do and may not be effective since restoring deleted files is fairly simple in some situations. A more thorough erase of the disk drive is advised but also not necessarily easy to do.

CKCS has acquired a device that connects directly to a disk drive and erases every sector of the drive replacing old data with a fixed data pattern. It is also very fast.

This process erases all files, including Windows and applications.

This effectively removes the possibility that a general user could recover old data files using common tools. However, if you are in trouble with the FBI or the CIA, do not count on this service to erase files beyond their ability to recover.

### How do you take advantage of this CKCS service?

If you are a member in good standing, bring your disk drive to the CKCS Resource Center on any Friday between 10AM and 4PM. It helps if you can remove the disk drive from the computer and just bring the drive. But, if you need help with that, bring the cabinet or the laptop and we will try to do it for you.

Once the drive is accessible we can connect to it and run the erase procedure. In most cases the whole process takes less than one hour. If there is a backlog we may not be able to complete the erasing until the following week. You may leave the drive and we will call when it is ready.

### Does this always work successfully?

No. While it has been successful in nearly all our practice attempts, we have discovered a few cases where the eraser device did not work as expected and we don't know why. You must be prepared for disappointment. So far we have not discovered any case where the device appeared to work correctly but left data on the disk. All failures have been recognizable.

# DON'T LIKE YOUR APPLE KEYBOARD OR MOUSE? REPLACE THEM. THAT'S WHAT I DID.

Can you name the two most overlooked parts of your Mac?

Answer: Two devices you use more than any other—keyboard and mouse.

Apple's latest keyboard and mouse versions spark strong opinions. Most folks belong in one of two camps: they love 'em or hate 'em.

Let's say you buy a new iMac. Open the box, take out the machine and start attaching the keyboard and mouse. You get an Apple keyboard (with keys some say resemble Chiclets, a gum I loved in my childhood) and Mighty Mouse (no, it's not a bar of soap, but instead a white two-button mouse with a teeny-tiny scroll button on top).

If you want to upgrade, you can buy an Apple wireless keyboard and a wireless Mighty Mouse. The latter two use Bluetooth, which connects both devices to your Mac without the need of a small USB receiver.

I bought the latest version of Apple's Wireless Keyboard last year at Lexington's CompUSA before that nationwide electronics chain shuttered its doors.

As Wikipedia notes, the keyboard appears much thinner than earlier models and is encased in aluminum. There's no keypad on the right side of the keyboard.

I thought I would absolutely love using the keyboard. That never happened. Instead, the romance never developed. I could never get totally accustomed to the keys.

So here's what I did.

I ditched them.

Okay, I didn't really get rid of my Apple Wireless Keyboard and Mighty Mouse. I still use them periodically.

But I began a search for replacements which I could use daily.

My search began using these Web sites:

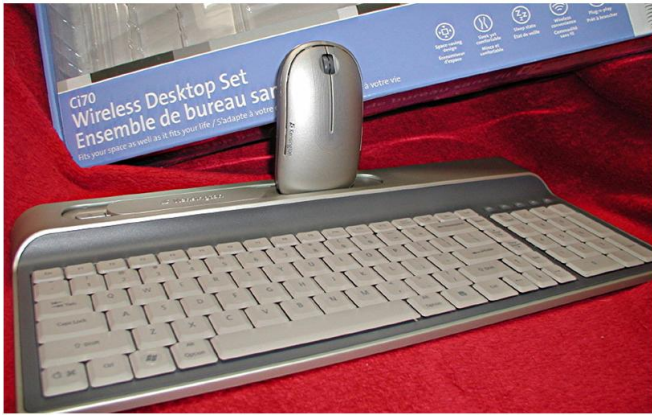

### Amazon.com

Type “mac keyboards mice” without the quotes in Amazon.com’s search blank. Then scroll down the page. Find something that interests your fancy? Click on its link.

Then scroll down to the bottom of the page and read what Amazon buyers are saying about this product. Sure, some of the reviews are not valid. But others are. You can get an overview of what buyers are saying. You also get to see what’s selling well there.

For example, the Logitech Cordless Wave Desktop Set is the #1 selling Mac-compatible keyboard/mouse sold at the Amazon site.

### MacUser (The British magazine)

Go to [www.macuser.co.uk/](http://www.macuser.co.uk/) and click on “Reviews Archive” under Product Reviews on the left-hand menu under the “Search For:” bar. Then click on Input Devices under “Browse by Category.” I spotted one Mac Logitech keyboard and a Mac Microsoft keyboard desktop set (keyboard and mouse) there. You get to see both got a “4” rating out of “5” mice. I clicked on Microsoft Wireless Laser Desktop 7000 to read the review. The MacUser reviewer puts the Desktop 7000 through its paces and ends with “It’s not cheap, and far from perfect, but we like it nonetheless.”

After all of this reading, reviewing, and searching what did I do? I bought the Kensington Ci70 Wireless Desktop Set from the Amazon Web site. It comes in two colors—Titanium and Black. I chose Titanium.

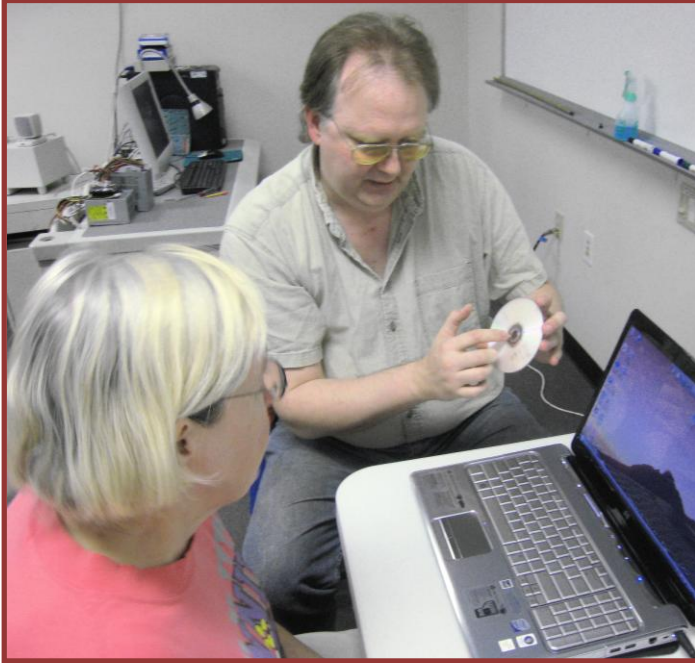
There a few quirks, but overall I’m very pleased with my purchase. Since this keyboard is designed for both the Mac and Windows, there’s a windows key I don’t use. And the Command key (sometimes called Apple key) is on the far left of the keyboard, not just to the left of the space bar where it normally is. But I love the so-called scissor action feel of the keys. And the two-button mouse can be stored in the keyboard’s built-in docking station when not in use.

From time to time I still use the Apple Wireless Keyboard and Mighty Mouse. But I now use the Kensington Ci70 Wireless Desktop Set most of the time. And the new keyboard and mouse remind me daily just how vital these overlooked tools can be. If you’re unhappy with your keyboard, mouse, or both, find replacements you can live with.

Note: If you buy a Kensington or Logitech keyboard, mouse or desktop set (keyboard and mouse), make sure you download the company’s Mac software. This will activate additional buttons to make the hardware work as it’s supposed to.

Talk about a time saver. When you can't remember where you filed something, Start Search will find it pronto.

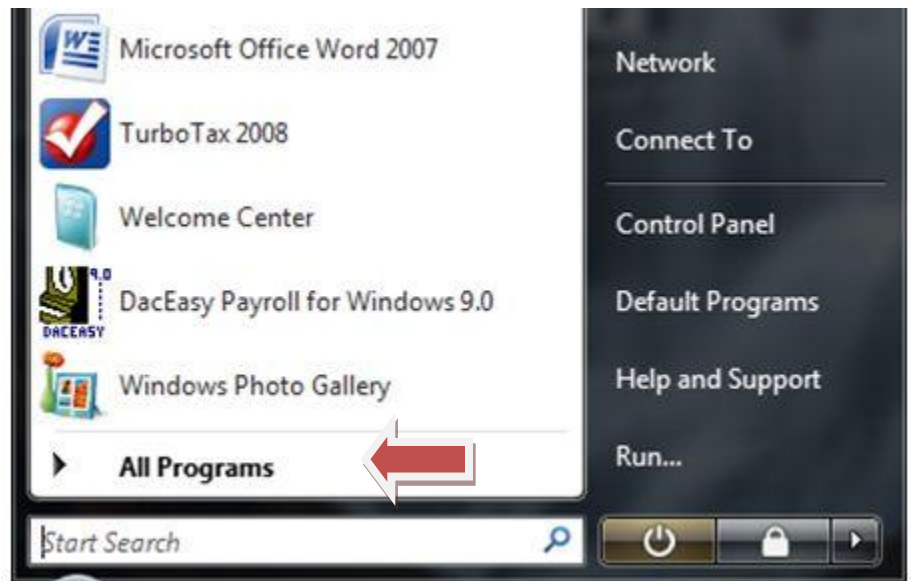

I let them know that the biggest bang for the buck for improving a computer's performance is increasing the amount of memory (RAM) in the PC. There are also many other memory resellers that sell reasonably priced memory. Just be sure that what you order is compatible with your machine by using the tools online to check your machine's manufacturer and model or by checking the label on the RAM that is currently in your machine.

He used a teapot to show how easy it is to post an item for sale. Bill provided numerous tips and tricks in selling stuff on what is promoted as the World's Online Marketplace -- EBay.
