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MICROSOFT TO RELEASE WINDOWS 7 **ON OCTOBER 22**

Microsoft has confirmed that it will release **Windows 7** on October 22, 2009. The date will put

Windows 7 on store shelves a full three months earlier than originally planned. It follows Microsoft's recent announcement that Windows 7 would ship "in time for the holidays" They have seven versions, Windows 7 Home Premium will be the best for most of us, just like Vista Home Premium was.

Windows users in the U.S. will be able to preorder Windows 7 Home Premium at a discounted preorder price of only \$49.99 from June 26 until July 11. That's less than half what people will pay if they wait until Oct. 22, the day it becomes available from local store or online. Windows 7 Home Premium will be offered

for \$119.99 starting on October 22. If you purchase a new PC now, a Windows 7 upgrade will be offered free.


VISTA TOP FEATURE #3 WINDOWS PHOTO GALLERY

Left click on a Photo and Windows Photo Gallery comes up, at the top click on Fix and without going to a special program, you can Adjust Color, Adjust Exposure, Crop, Fix Red Eye, etc. If you want to reduce the size of the photo, like it is 980 KB and want it to be around 100 KB, at the top right click on Menu then click on IrfanView if you have it installed, (it is a free program), if not, GOOGLE IrfanView and download it.

Show step-by-step instructions to burn a CD using Windows Photo Gallery

In Windows Photo Gallery, highlight the photos you wish to burn and at the top click on Burn and follow instructions.

HOW OLD IS GEORGE NOW?

Keeping track of the ages of your family and relatives can be a challenge, but it doesn't have to be. In fact it is easy if you use an Excel Spreadsheet which in my case I call FAMILY BIRTHDATES AUTO COMPUTE.

By putting a special formula where you want the age computed, each time you open your spreadsheet, the ages shown will automatically be CURRENT ages, based on the date and time setting in your computer.

In the example below: here is the formula to be placed in the cell: **C2** it must be exact including all quotes. Don't leave anything out.

=IF(B2<>"",INT((NOW()-B2)/365.24),"")

When you accept that formula in C2, that person's current age will show in C2. Fill that formula down in Column C for all the names and birthdates you enter.

WHAT ABOUT A DEATH?

When a relative becomes deceased. simply remove the formula after his/her name (column C) and type in the age at the time of death.

You may want to put the date of death in column D and then in Column E type the above same formula (above) except based on the date in column D. Then column E in the table will show how many years since the person died.

TRACK MARRIAGES TOO

You may want to create a separate section

to track the wedding anniversary numbers, on the bottom of your spreadsheet, just place the date of the wedding in column B, column C will list the number of years the couple has been married.

Try it, you will find the little spreadsheet to be most useful, and maybe you might be able to use a few of your brain cells for some other purpose.

Kenny G and David Benoit perform "Don't Know Why" through my Logitech stereo speakers attached to my Mac mini. Wow. Radio as it should be.

And thanks to iTunes, I can listen to my heart's content. Many stations display the song title and artist as iTunes plays the music so if you hear something you like, you can quickly write down the details.

Traditional radio may be gone forever in my life. But live radio from all over the world has replaced it. Thank you iTunes!

Snow Leopard Coming In September

Apple announced in late spring that its new operating system for Leopard users (version 10.6, also called Snow Leopard) would go on sale in September for \$29. Macworld notes that Snow Leopard will only run on Macs sporting an Intel processor. Older Macs with a PowerPC processor will be left in the dark. A family pack of 5 Snow Leopard licenses for folks with multiple Macs will cost \$49. Apple made the announcement in early June at its Worldwide Developer's Conference (WWDC). This is a yearly

WINDOWS LIVE ONE CARE GOING OUT MICROSOFT SECURITY ESSENTIALS COMING IN





Last month, Microsoft released a limited beta version of MICROSOFT SECURITY ESSENTIALS, a free antivirus application for users of Windows XP, Vista, or 7. The new program will replace WINDOWS LIVE ONECARE the basic security needs of home users, and its easy-to-use interface

appears to be taking the right approach to the task. It is a limited release and apparently they need no other 'testers' of the beta product, as a recent check would not let new persons to sign up.

When the full version is released, it will be easy to get started with Microsoft Security Essentials. When you launch it for the first time, the program will download and install Microsoft's most up-to-date virus definitions and then scan your system. Once installed, the software keeps current by automatically downloading new virus definitions daily via Windows Update.

The Microsoft Security Essentials interface is clear-cut and cleanly designed. At the top of the window, you'll see your computer's protection status--protected, partially protected, or unprotected. Everything else appears in four tabs: Home (which shows you an overview of your settings, and has a Scan Now button), Update (where you can manually update your virus-definition files), History (which logs all of the malware cleaned from your system) and Settings (self-explanatory).

You'll likely spend most of your time on the Home tab; "set it and forget it" aptly describes Microsoft Security Essentials. The default settings are appropriate for most users, though I would have expected Microsoft Security Essentials to offer some of the options-- to scan removable drives and to check for updates before scanning your system, for example--on the first run-through.

Regrettably, some of the settings are a bit cryptic. For example, on the Settings tab under 'Default actions', Microsoft Security Essentials defaults to 'Microsoft Security Essentials' recommended action' for all of the options--without identifying the recommended actions. You have to poke around in the help system to find out what the recommended actions are.

In addition, I was initially confused because Microsoft Security Essentials doesn't mention within the app that Windows Update automatically installs new virus definition files. As a result, you might suppose that you must constantly install new virus definition updates manually. A simple note on the Update tab would be a welcome clarification.

Whether this software can help Microsoft corner the PC security market remains to be seen, but Microsoft Security Essentials is a user-friendly antivirus app that should cover the basics for most users. A TIP FOR DEDICATED COUPON CLIPPERS

Spending more money than I have to on anything drives me crazy. That's why I am especially fond of the secret code words, sometimes called "promotional codes," used by Web retailers. Know the code and you save money. Otherwise, you pay full price.

On most Web sites, there is a place during the checkout process to enter a promotional code. Type in the code and your total amount due is automatically adjusted.

> Getting the promotional codes is easy. There are several web sites that do nothing but accumulate and list promotional codes to use when shopping online.

These promo code gathering sites let you find codes by category or by the online retailer's Web site name. Sometimes, more than one code is listed for a site.

You normally cannot enter more than one promotional code. It pays to figure out if you're better off taking the discount or the free shipping. It's been my experience that free shipping is normally ground, or 7 to 10 days. If you need your purchase quickly, forgo the offer for free shipping.

Some places to look for these promo codes include Coupon Cabin, Coupon Craze, Current Codes, CoolSavings, and KeyCode.

How do these sites get the codes? Promotional codes are distributed by the retailers. Many people who are regular customers of these stores get the codes by e-mail or regular mail. The retailers may hope to achieve viral marketing, as the recipients pass the information on to friends.

Posting of codes on sites helps attract customers. People who shop with the codes may spend more on other things.

Many sites offer coupons, in addition to codes. The coupons look just like the coupons you receive in the mail. But you don't have to worry about holding onto the paper coupons you receive. Instead, when you're ready to eat out, for instance, you just check the coupon sites.

In fact, I lunched at an Italian restaurant last week with a friend. We used a buy-one-get-one-free coupon printed from the Internet. The food was excellent and the price inexpensive.

Although most online coupons are in color, there's no need to print them that way. You'll save the same amount of money if you print the coupon in black-and-white. When using a coupon in a restaurant, don't expect to save on the tip. Always calculate the server's tip using the full price. That's the right thing to do.

Many coupon sites tailor the coupons to your ZIP code. So the restaurants that are included should be near your home. That's true of other businesses, too.

With these kinds of offers available, you'd be foolish to shop online or eat out without at least checking to see what's on the Internet for the taking.
