

his past summer the CKCS Officers and Directors voted to withdraw from our relationship with SeniorNet. The reason was financial. The withdrawal requires that we remove all traces of SeniorNet from our advertising and class materials. This process is nearly complete.



The relationship between CKCS and SeniorNet lasted 16 years. During that time we estimate that we have taught over 5000 students. In the early years SeniorNet made available to CKCS financial grants from several companies that helped purchase computers, software, other equipment and class materials that we used in our classes.

In recent years, however, the grants have ceased and CKCS has purchased our own equipment and software. We have also written or revised all of the class materials trying to keep up with changes in systems and applications.

The relationship was very productive and enjoyable. And we are proud to have been the only SeniorNet chapter in Kentucky.

CKCS will continue to offer classes for computer beginners and intermediates in a range of subjects. We are always seeking volunteers to help with the classes. There are many jobs: from writing materials to teaching classes to maintaining the equipment.

All about Snow Leopard

Tips, Tricks, and News about the Mac's newest operating system

Snow Leopard (also called OS 10.6) is selling very briskly.

In fact, it's selling better than either Leopard or Tiger according to a firm called NPD Group, a market research company. Leopard (also called OS 10.5) is the Mac operating system introduced in October 2007. Tiger (also called OS 10.4) is the Mac operating system introduced in April 2005.

Snow Leopard went on sale in August 2009. Part of the reason it's selling so well might be price. Apple is selling it for \$29. A Family Pack (which can run on 5 machines) is \$49.

In mid–September, Snow Leopard was the #2 selling item in Amazon.com's software category. Snow Leopard's Family Pack was the #3 selling item.

A quick check of Amazon.com's Web site in mid–September reveals more than 30 books devoted to Snow Leopard. It's clear that the publishing world believes this operating system is a hit.

Snow Leopard is a new operating system but it's not a foreign creature to Leopard users. Apple says Snow Leopard is "evolutionary, rather than revolutionary."

In other words, if you're used to Leopard, Snow Leopard will feel like a comfortable shoe you've been wearing for some time. This despite the fact that under the hood, Snow Leopard is a dramatically different cat.

If you've begun using Snow Leopard and are searching for tips, here are some that might make your life a bit easier.

Here are some of my favorite Snow Leopard tips:

Put the date in your menu bar.

Ever since Mac OS X was first made available in March 2001, Mac users have been able to click on the clock in their menu bars to view that dav's date.

It came in handy when paying bills, scheduling classes, or just giving the user a quick way to glance at the date.

Now, the date can automatically appear in the menu bar—no clicking involved. To activate the menu bar date, open System Preferences. Click on the Date and Time

Date options: Show the day of the week Show date

icon. Click on the small box just left of "Show date." From now on, that day's date will appear just to the left of the clock in the menu bar.

Your laptop's battery is ill.


A small battery icon appears in the menu bar revealing how much juice is left. If the battery is failing, you'll get a message when you click on the icon that it needs to be serviced. There's also a small gray icon with an exclamation point to the right of the "Service Battery" message alerting you to problems. Get it checked out.

Substitutions.

No, we're not talking about substitute teaching here. Instead, we're talking about smart quotes, copyrights, and more.

When you use quotes, you want them to look like "rather than ". System Preferences allows you to change your settings so any time you use a quote, your Mac will display actual quotes rather than the mark used to denote inches.

In addition, when you type (c), a real copyright sign © will be shown. To activate these, go to System Preferences, click on the Language & Text icon. Then click on Text and you'll be able to put checkmarks in the box to the left of items you want to activate. You can also create your own shortcuts. The word processor you're using must support this.

WORKING WITH WORD(s)

During the word processing SIGS, we often discuss tips to help you edit your documents.


One helpful feature is to be able to return quickly to the last place you edited a document. For example, if you have been editing a multiple pages of text and then need to close your document for whatever reason, Word provides you a quick way to get back to where you left off.

The secret is **SHIFT + F5**. Once you open the document again Word remembers the last several places you edited. Touching Shift and F5 together, your insertion point will jump to your last place you did an edit.

TIP: If you are just reading the document and wish to pick up where you left off when you return, remember this feature doesn't take you to the last place you read, but the last place you did an edit. So if you are just reading the document just add a space and then a backspace to create an edit. Close your document, next time you open it use SHIFT + F5.

All about Snow Leopard continued

Tips, Tricks, and News about the Mac's newest operating system

Time Zone changes when you move your Mac.

Your Mac can change the system's clock when you travel to a different time zone.

The first time you use your Mac running Snow Leopard, click on System Preferences, and then click on the Date & Time icon and then

Set time zone automatically using current location Time Zone: Eastern Daylight Time Closest City: Lexington, KY - United States

Time Zone. Make sure the city shown is in the proper time zone.

Put a checkmark in the small box next to "Set time zone automatically using current location." Then when you move, your Mac's clock will change with you.

Minimize windows into application icon.

If you're familiar with Tiger and Leopard, you know that you can minimize an open file by clicking on the yellow dot on the upper left-hand corner of the document (or use the keyboard shortcut by holding down the Command key and typing M).

The document will drop down to the righthand side of your Dock. If you have plenty of documents minimized, it could get crowded down there on your Dock.

Minimize windows into application icon

With Snow Leopard, you can now minimize documents by sending them into the application that created them. So, for example, if I want to minimize a Word document, it won't drop down to the right-hand side of the Dock. Instead, it will disappear into Word's application on the Dock (a blue "W.")

To retrieve a document, simply right click (or hold down the Control key and click) on the application program's icon on your Dock and select the document you want to retrieve.

To activate this new feature in Snow Leopard, open System Preferences and click on the Dock icon. Then put a checkmark in the blue box next to "Minimize windows into application icon."

If you ever want to revert back to the method used in Tiger or Leopard, just click the blue box so the checkmark goes away. The old minimize method will reappear.


Screenshots now are stamped with the date and time.

In the past, when you took a snapshot of your Mac's screen, files would be named Picture 1, Picture 2, and so forth.



Now with Snow Leopard, the file name reflects the date and time you took the screenshot. This can be very useful if

you need to keep track of multiple screenshots.



Remember, Command + Shift + 3 takes a snapshot of your entire screen.

Command + Shift +4 provides crosshairs for you to draw a box around something on your screen. When you let up on the mouse after drawing a box, you'll hear the sound of a camera shutter. Then the file appears on your Mac's Desktop.

How strong is that network?

Suppose you want to connect to a wireless Internet network but you don't know which one has the strongest signal. With Snow Leopard, the answer is a click away. If you've clicked on the Network icon in System Preferences and put a checkmark in the box next to "Show Airport Status in Menu Bar," you'll see the Airport icon to the left of your clock. Click on that icon and you'll see a list of available WiFi networks. To the right of the network names is an icon showing whether a password is required to connect and network strength. The icons with dark, filled lines provide a glimpse of strong WiFi networks available.

QuickTime X

Use the camera and microphone built into your Mac (or a third–party unit) to shoot videos and save them in QuickTime X format. This is built into Mac OS X 10.6 so no additional software is needed to shoot video. In addition, the user can take videos of his or her screen to show another Mac user how to perform a certain task.

Dock's contextual menus get a makeover

Right click (or if you have a one—button mouse, control + click) on a Dock icon and you'll see a visual change. Mac | Life Magazine describes the appearance as a black bezel. The menus now have a black shiny appearance which you might find more appealing.

Quicker Time Machine Back-ups

Apple has speeded up backups in Snow Leopard. In addition, Time Machine will tell you how much time is left before the backup is complete.



Trash

Put back

If you accidentally put an item in the Trash, preparing to delete, with Snow Leopard you can use the "Put Back" contextual menu. Open the Trash and right-click the item you want to remove from the Trash. Choose Put Back and the item will move itself out of the Trash. Of course, for many years you've been able to drag an item out of the Trash but this allows the user to utilize a contextual menu to get the same effect.

Customize Apple Mail sidebar

Organize the icons on the left-hand side of Mail just how you want them. This blue area displaying vertical icons (Inbox, Outbox, Sent, Trash, etc). is called the sidebar. Now you can click and drag an icon to put it where you want it in the sidebar. Pretty neat.

Upgrading Trouble?

I installed Snow Leopard on several different Macs and had no trouble.

All of the machines were running Leopard and I opted to install Snow Leopard using a custom install. I made sure that Rosetta was installed.

Rosetta is invisible technology that you normally don't see running. It allows you to run programs written for the PowerPC processor on Macs using the Intel chip. Of course, Snow Leopard will only run on machines with an Intel processor.

So if you're running older programs that were designed to run under PowerPC, make sure you customize and install Rosetta.
