TWO OR THREE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED



To view a Jump List, RIGHT click the WORD Taskbar icon.

- At the top of the list are my 'Pinned' documents (they stay put), these I work on every day or two.
- Next you'll notice Recent documents, these are the other documents I have opened. (They
 change as I open more documents.)
- At the very bottom you can Close all windows in WORD at one time. This works the same way
 if you have a lot of Internet Web pages open.

This saves a lot of time.



Never, ever move Apple applications (such as Mail.app) to other folders.

If you're a Windows user, don't try moving a folder on top of another with the same name—Mac OS X will replace the entire folder.

What office program should I use?

This is a matter of choice. There are plenty of programs (and several office Web sites) out there for Mac users. Here's some available options:

Apple's iWork '09

Amazon.com is currently selling Apple's office suite for \$37. This is a very good price. Apple also offers iWork online (it's currently in beta stage which means it's not quite ready for prime time: https://www.iwork.com/signin/).

Kurt's note: If you decide to buy from Amazon, please first visit the CKCS Home page <<u>www.ckcs.org</u>> and click on the Amazon.com button on the lower left—hand side of the page. Your Web browser will open to Amazon.com but CKCS will get a small percentage of the money you spend at the site. As a non–profit, CKCS benefits from every purchase you make via Amazon.com.

iWork is a suite offering Pages (word processor), Numbers (spreadsheet), and Keynote (PowerPoint-type presentation program).

The really neat thing about iWork is that you can export any work created in its programs into Microsoft Office compatible documents. So if you're creating a document using Pages, you can easily convert it into a Word document so anyone using Word on a Windows or Mac machine can read it.

Now if the page contains numerous tables, graphics, photos, line art and other items, it may not convert to Word properly. But this is a great feature for most of us who don't publish newspapers on our home computers.

Microsoft Office 2008 for Mac Home & Student Edition

Amazon.com is currently selling Microsoft's latest Mac office suite for about \$116.00. This is also a very good price.

Office for Mac has been around for years and offers Word (word processing), Excel (spreadsheet), PowerPoint (presentation slideshow), Entourage (e-mail), and Messenger (instant messaging).

Be aware that if you use Messenger a lot, you'll want to download the latest version from VersionTracker < www.wersiontracker.com>, MacUpdate < www.macupdate.com> or Microsoft's Mac Website < www.mactopia.com>.

I don't understand. My parents taught me to be honest, but my teacher doesn't like it when I am. Today, my teacher asked us to tell her what famous person we admire most.


I told her, "Colonel Sanders". Guess where I am now...
