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What happens when you recycle old electronics in Lexington?

Here is your chance to learn what occurs when you take an old computer to the Lexington Electronics Recycling Center. When you do, you are helping the environment by reducing the pollution and expansion of our landfills and at the same time, allowing the city recoup recycling costs.

Chris Price from Global Environmental Service (GES) will bring us all up to date when he leads the CKCS Tech Night program on Monday, November 14, at 7 p.m. GES has the contract with the city of Lexington to receive and process all the electronics citizens bring in.

GES is based in Georgetown, KY, and recycles computers, CRT/LCD monitors, printers, circuit boards, fax and copy machines, hard drives, and laptops. They do not export their collections to

other countries where the lives of others are ruined.. Last year alone they exported 1,200 tons of steel, copper, and plastics, thousand of printers and phones and hundreds of shredded hard drives that could fill 20 football fields. How they do all this is an interesting story they will share with our members.

That is just part of the story they have to tell. Be at CKCS on November 14^{th} at 7 p.m.

If you need to recycle computers, printers, monitors, and other electronics, the Lexington Electronics Recycling Center (see pictures at right) is located at 1306 Versailles Road. Their hours on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. On Wednesday they are open from noon to 4 p.m. and on Saturday from 8 a.m. to noon.

Tech Night


Many of you have taken old computers and electronics to the recycle drop off center located on Versailles Rd. Did

Mac Article

An Apple trifecta arrives; Lion 10.7.2, iOS 5, and iCloud

Apple pushes Lion Update (10.7.2), iOS 5 for mobile devices, Safari and iTunes updates, Apple Lion Recovery update, plus iCloud

Updates aplenty greeted users of Apple's Mac computers as well as its popular hand-held devices in mid-October. First, folks who've upgraded to the latest Mac operating system (known as Lion) got two hefty upgrades totaling more than a gigabyte:



- The 10.7.2 update
- Lion Recovery Update

Apple says the 10.7.2 update includes a number of general operating system fixes that improve the stability, compatibility, and security of your Mac. These include a number of items involving full screen apps which were introduced in Lion:

- Enable dragging files between desktop and full screen apps
- Address an issue causing the menu bar not to appear in full screen apps

In addition, the update solved a problem whereby screen zooming stopped working, resolved an issue with Apple Mail while searching, while using Apple Mail to send email via a MobileMe mail account, and solved an issue where the Mac may not be able to immediately access a network after waking from sleep. In addition, the software update includes RAW image support for more digital cameras not already included in Lion.

Check out Apple's Support <u>Page</u> to see the list of all 10.7.2 update fixes and improvements. Fifteen separate fixes are shown, and those don't include updates to the Safari browser and iTunes.

The hefty Lion update also includes a feature called <u>Lion Recovery</u>.

Lion Recovery is new in Lion. It allows Mac users to hold down the Command and R keys during startup. This prompts the user to choose from common utilities:

- Run Disk Utility to check or repair the hard drive
- Erase the hard drive and install a fresh copy of Lion
- Restore your Mac from a Time Machine backup
- Use Safari to get Apple support online



Lion creates a "recovery" partition on your Mac's hard drive which can be used to boot up the machine in emergencies to repair the hard drive, reset passwords, or reinstall OS X Lion.

Lion users who download the 10.7.2 will also be able to access Apple's free cloud computing service called iCloud. Once it's set up on your Mac, iCloud automatically and wirelessly stores content on your Mac and "pushes" it to your iOS devices.



iCloud will store your email, calendars, contacts, Safari bookmarks, and Safari Reading List and push the data to your iPad, iPhone, or iPod touch.

So the same photo, bookmarks, or word processing document, for example, can be created on the Mac, stored in the iCloud, and then synced with another device, such as an iPad, so that it also

appears there. iCloud provides 5 gigabytes of storage space free, 10 GB for \$20, 20 GB for \$40, and 50 GB for \$100.

Apple's MobileMe service, which iCloud replaces, will disappear June 30, 2012.

The Web site, *Gigaom*, <u>writes</u> about setting up and restoring from an iCloud backup.

In mid–October, TidBit's Kirk McElhearn wrote about syncing iOS devices wirelessly with iTunes 10.5.

One day later, ZDNet columnists <u>wrote</u> about the biggest requirement for Mac users setting up iCloud: time. The article mentioned that iCloud could potentially revolutionize cloud computing for the average consumer with Mac products, but it won't happen immediately. Why? Because it will take time to set up Macs and Apple gadgets so they work with iCloud.

Tech Night -- October Barney Miller showed modern electronics for your home

At the CKCS October 10th Tech Night presentation, Barney Miller, at right in picture, and George Castro, discussed home integration of systems such as one unit that would turn on and off all of your lights on an individual basis, raise and lower the shades and adjust the temperature. Imagine sitting in your car outside your home on some dark night, opening your iPhone and with a few clicks



unlocking the door, turning on the lights you need and then exiting your car when all is set. Or the plumber calls you while you are away from home and says he is at your house waiting to fix your pipes. You pull out your phone and with a few clicks, your door opens and the plumber goes to work. When he leaves, you click again to be sure the doors are locked.

These are a few of the things that you can do with household system integration - all from your iPhone, iPad, smart phone or computer.

Barney also talked about movie streaming from a wireless network, adding speakers to your TV (most integrated TV speakers are cheap and poor quality). They discussed security systems and things like medical alert systems.

Barney is the owner of the Barney Miller Electronics, Inc. at 232 East Main in Lexington. He extended an invitation to members to visit his store downtown and check out the equipment he has on display there.







INTERESTING BIT OF RAILROAD HISTORY

Train Station Watches Were Just the Beginning

If you were in the market for a watch in1880, would you know where to get one? You would go to a store, right? Well, of course you could do that, but if you wanted one that was cheaper and a bit better than most of the store watches, you went to the train station! Sound a bit funny? Well, for about 500 towns across the northern United States, that's where the best watches were found.

Why were the best watches found at the train station? The railroad company wasn't selling the watches, not at all. The telegraph operator was. Most of the time the telegraph operator was located in the railroad station because the telegraph lines followed the railroad tracks from town to town. It was usually the shortest distance and the right-of-ways had already been secured for the rail line.

Most of the station agents were also skilled telegraph operators and that was the primary way that they communicated with the railroad. They would know when trains left the previous station and when they were due at their next station. And it was the telegraph operator who had the watches. As a matter of fact they sold more of them than almost all the stores combined for a period of about 9 years.

This was all arranged by "Richard", who was a telegraph operator himself. He was on duty in the North Redwood, Minnesota, train station one day when a load of watches arrived from the east. It was a huge crate of pocket watches. No one ever came to claim them.

So Richard sent a telegram to the manufacturer and asked them what they wanted to do with the watches. The manufacturer didn't want to pay the freight back, so they wired Richard to see if he could sell them. So Richard did. He sent a wire to every agent in the system asking them if they wanted a cheap, but good, pocket watch. He sold the entire case in less than two days and at a handsome profit.

That started it all. He ordered more watches from the watch company and encouraged the telegraph operators to set up a display case in the station offering high quality watches for a cheap price to all the travelers. It worked! It didn't take long for the word to spread and, before long, people other than travelers came to the train station to buy watches.

Richard became so busy that he had to hire a professional watch maker to help him with the orders. That was Alvah. And the rest, as they say, is history.

The business took off and soon expanded to many other lines of dry goods.

Richard and Alvah left the train station and moved their company to Chicago -- and it's still there.

IT'S A LITTLE KNOWN FACT that for a while in the1880's, the biggest watch retailer in the country was at the train station.

It all started with a telegraph operator:

Richard Sears and his partner Alvah Roebuck!

Apple's mobile operating system is called iOS and it powers popular hand-held devices: the iPad, iPhone, and iPod touch (in addition to Apple TV).

iOS is derived from Mac OS X, which is based on UNIX.



In mid–October, Apple released the latest version of iOS, called iOS 5. The update offers a number of new features including <u>iCloud</u> and Notification Center; new apps including Newstand and Reminders, and more than 200+ new <u>features</u>.

One of the biggest changes is the Notification Center. Apple says iOS 5 users may now track all kinds of incoming messages, including emails, text messages, current weather, a stock ticker and more in the Notification Center.

Another change includes iMessage.

Apple says users of iOS5 can now send unlimited text messages via Wi–Fi or 3G signal from an iPad, iPhone or iPod touch to anyone with one of those devices. IMessage is built into the Messages app on iOS 5 devices.

One of the biggest changes involves the ability to activate and set up iOS 5 devices right out of the box without needing a Mac or Windows

PC. Users may now download free iOS software updates directly to their iPads, iPhones and iPod touches.



Mac and iPad sales highest in history; iPod sales drop

Sales of Macs and of the popular tablet computer known as the iPad are the highest in history as Apple reported profits for a three–month period ending September 24th.

Apple sold nearly 4.9 million Macs, a 26 percent jump over Mac sales during the same period in 2010. This was the first time Apple sold more than 4 million Macs in a single quarter.

A recent Gartner survey of personal computer sales revealed that Apple's third place PC market is growing, nibbling away at number two, Dell.



Portable Macs now account for 74 percent of Mac sales. Meanwhile, Apple sold nearly 1.3 million desktops, which is a company record.

Fortune.com's Philip Elmer–DeWitt <u>described</u> Mac sales this way: "Everybody seems to agree that in a PC market that would otherwise be shrinking, the Mac is one of the few computer lines keeping it afloat, especially after the July refresh of two of Apple's most popular models, the MacBook Air and the Mac mini."

Apple management also reported that six million copies of Lion, the newest Mac OS X operating system, had been downloaded since its release in July.

During the three months ending September 24th, Apple said it sold more than eleven–million iPads, a 166 percent climb over the same period last year.

iPhones also sold briskly. Apple reported selling more than 17–million of its smartphone during the period. That's a 21 percent increase over last year.

Some analysts were not too pleased; they predicted that Apple would sell between 18 million and 20 million phones. A company official said rumors of a new iPhone may have reduced sales. (A new iPhone did go on sale in late October—sales of the iPhone 4S aren't included in the 17-million figure.)

iPod sales continue falling. Apple sold 6.6 million iPods during the period, that's well below the 9.1 million it sold during the same time last year.

About one-half of all iPods sold were the iPod touch model. Despite the fall in sales, Apple says the iPod remains the top-selling MP3 player in countries around the world where it's available.

The new iPhone 4S debuts

24 hours after it began selling, online sales of the new iPhone 4S surprised analysts' predictions and put smiles on the faces of retailers, including Sprint, which began selling the iPhone for the first time.

The iPhone 4S with Siri sold one–million units online the first 24 hours, and four–million after the first weekend of sales in stores. <u>Beatweek</u> Magazine claims the strong sales confirm the late Steve Job's vision.

<u>Digital Trends</u> reported, "Sprint's iPhone gamble has begun to pay off. The wireless provider announced today that its offering of Apple's iPhone 4S 'resulted in Sprint's best ever day of sales in retail, web and telesales." The article adds, "According to its earning report, Sprint gained a net total of 1.3 million wireless subscribers during the third quarter, which is more than it achieved in the past five years."



Even though the iPhone 4S resembles its predecessor, several

articles have confirmed that it's different. One of the most discussed new features is Siri, or a personal assistant program for iOS (the operating system powering the iPhone, iPad and iPod touch.)

Siri allows the user to ask questions, and then it responds in so-called natural language (which means it actually sounds like a human talking, rather than a computer.)

Reports: 'In-store' pickup coming to Apple Stores

Apple is reportedly rolling out a program that allows customers to order merchandise from the <u>online</u> <u>Apple Store</u> and then pick it up at their local brick and mortar Apple Store. Accounts from <u>Macworld</u>, <u>MacRumors</u>, <u>clnet</u>, <u>Übergizmo</u>, and other Apple news outlets indicate Apple has started the program in San Francisco and is rolling it out to its various Apple Store locations.

In addition, the report indicates that Apple's stores will begin accepting returns of online orders, thereby saving the customer the hassle of shipping an item back to Apple. Reports say that Apple experimented with in-store pickups back in 2009 when it allowed customers to use the "Reserve and Pickup" option on its Web site over the Christmas holiday.

Solar power farm may help run Apple's iCloud-iTunes datacenter in North Carolina

Apple's giant North Carolina datacenter may be partially powered by solar power, according to <u>reports</u> in the *Charlotte Observer*. A county economic development chief told the *Observer* he's had no communication with Apple about the plans. But Scott Millar told the newspaper, datacenters, like the one Apple runs in Maiden, North Carolina, to power its iCloud, iTunes and other services, need large amounts of power to run its servers and keep them cool. An <u>item</u> in *Electronista* says Apple strives to build green facilities, including locations in Austin and Sacramento, and Cork, Ireland.

Qualys BrowserCheck looks for security risks in your Web browsers

One of the easiest ways for virus and spyware operators to get into any computer is through the Web browser.

Out–of–date plug–ins (such as Flash, Shockwave, and Java) are especially problematic. In fact, the bad guys target these plug–ins.

Watch how many times Adobe patches its Flash software, and many of those upgrades are to make the plug-in more secure.

Enter Qualys BrowserCheck.

This Web-based tool checks for out-

of-date versions of Mac OS X, Apple Safari, Adobe Shockwave Player, the Java plug-in, QuickTime plug-in, Shockwave Flash, and other software. It then alerts you if there's a newer version available for download.

Qualys checks for up-to-date plug-ins in Apple Safari, Google Chrome, Mozilla Firefox, Opera, and Camino Mac browsers. It also checks for out of date browser software.

I checked all of the browsers installed on my Mac and it revealed that I was using an old version of Opera. I clicked on the blue "Fix It" button to the right of the Opera icon. (Opera is available through the Mac App Store and also via the <u>Opera</u> Web site.)

I simply downloaded a newer version of Opera to solve the problem.

A device that changed how we listen: the iPod celebrates ten years

It's hard for most of us to believe, but the most popular MP3 player began selling on November tenth back in 2001.

The first iPod had a claustrophic 5GB capacity, worked solely with the Mac and contained just a FireWire connector. ipod news network (ipodnn) takes you on a travel through time as it <u>recalls</u> the first iPod.

Study: Youths prefer Macs, iPads, iPhones, Cheerios, Oreos, Sprite and Hershey's Candy Bars

Here's a story for the kids. A new 2012 Harris <u>poll</u> reveals that youths between 13 and 24 prefer Apple products when it comes to computers, tablets, and smart phones. It also shows that plenty of youngsters prefer Cheerios to other cereals, Oreo cookies to competitors, Sprite soda to others, and Hershey's milk chocolate candy bars to other sweet treats.

What's interesting for Apple is that it might just provide a snapshot of what's to come. A press release provided to the *Sacramento Bee* newspaper quotes Jeni Lee Chapman, the executive vice– president of Harris' Brand and Communication Consulting, as saying, "To have this kind of significant edge among 13–24 year olds signifies that Apple has built a powerful equity base among their customers of today and their customers of tomorrow."

In other categories, Minute Maid is the favorite fruit juice, ABC–TV is the favorite broadcast television network, and Nintendo Wii is the highest-ranking gaming platform.
