

### A lesson on photographing flowers Tuesday, May 28, 2013

This month we have a special treat with a presentation from Dr. Tom Barnes from the University of Kentucky. Many of you have heard of Tom for his excellent work with nature photography.

For this evening, Dr. Barnes will be talking to us about how to best photograph flowers. Dr. Barnes has been photographing the natural world for more than 25 years. His images have been used in publications around the world including Germany, Australia, Africa, England, Canada, Japan, Africa,

and the United States.

He is an award-winning photographer who specializes in nature photography in Kentucky and the United States. Tom has written and photographed three books and Kentucky's Last Great Places was nominated for the Kentucky Literary Award in non-fiction the year it was released. Another book, including Gardening for the Birds, was quoted in a review by American Gardener magazine as the first realistic book on attracting wildlife to the backyard that has been written.

### Making Sense Out of the Worst PC Sales Drop In History

The Rise of tablets and smartphones triggers PC sales plunge

"Even if they won't render the PC obsolete, the rise of tablets and smartphones certainly have made them less necessary in our day—to—day lives. They are no longer just an accessory to the PC. In many cases, they're a functional alternative." — Adrian Covert, *CNN—Money*; April 17, 2013



Travel with me, if you will, back to August 1995. Microsoft was about to introduce one of the most popular computer operating systems in history.

In New York, the Empire State Building lit up so that it displayed the new operating system's color scheme. The Rolling Stone's 1981 single, "Start Me Up", could be heard on TV sets all across America. The song was part of a Microsoft ad to promote its new Windows 95 operating system. "Start Me Up" referred to the "start" button in the new system.

By the end of 1995, Windows 95 had become the most popular desktop operating system. Windows 95 was everywhere.

Cybercafés bought scores of new PCs and advertised the fact that they ran Windows 95 inside.

Libraries across America purchased new Windows 95 desktop machines and invited patrons to "log on to the new Windows 95."

News accounts of the time even carried stories of young trick—or—treaters dressed up in Halloween costumes resembling a Windows 95 box—identical to the display found on countless store shelves.

Folks who had never played card games in their lives were learning how to play solitaire, preinstalled on Windows 95.

Shoppers stopping by office stores to buy printer ink spotted dozens of customers waiting to get a glimpse of this new operating system on shiny new desktop towers and laptop computers—part of a special display paid for by Microsoft.

By far, more computers in more places were running the Windows 95 operating system. Period. If the world of computers had a leader, Windows 95 was its king.

Then everything changed.

The bottom fell out of PC sales.

It was as if a midwestern tornado ripped through the computer world, destroying sales and crushing demand.



Headlines in April blared:

**Computer Sales in Free Fall** PC quarterly sales plummet, sharpest drop on record Global PC shipments plunge in worst drop in a generation PC sales plunge as consumers look to tablets, smartphones

That fourth headline is the key, according to market researcher International Data Corporation. It reported in late April that sales of Windows PCs plummeted 14 percent in the first three months of this year.

This is the single largest sales decline since IDC began keeping track in 1994.

Numerous news outlets reported that Windows 8, Microsoft's latest operating system, is not selling well. A senior IDC research analyst says new Microsoft operating systems normally boost PC sales, but the lukewarm reception for Windows 8 will probably mean an even larger drop in computer sales this year.

Adrian Covert, who writes for CNNMoney, says PC sales may be grim, but don't blame Microsoft. He doesn't hold the software giant responsible for the gigantic drop in PC sales. "...IDC Vice President Bob O'Donnell not only expressed disappointment that Windows 8 wasn't able to reverse the trend, but asserted that Windows 8 was the reason for the slowing market," he writes. "But the PC sales problem doesn't begin or end with Windows 8. Even if Windows 8 were the most well-received and critically acclaimed operating system ever, PC sales would probably slump," Covert concludes.

I suspect a combination of factors is at play. First, Windows 8 is quite different. Some die-hard Windows users are turned off simply because there's no Start button—a Windows staple as mentioned earlier.

Second, a number of Windows users have had it up to here (I'm pointing to my neck) with viruses, spyware, pop-up windows, adware, crapware pre-installed on their new computers, and other crud. They're saying enough is enough. I suspect a certain percentage of those folks are buying a new iPad or Mac to replace an aging PC and saying goodbye to longstanding security headaches.

Third, every Windows user knows his or her PC needs plenty of maintenance to keep it up and running. I have known folks who keep their machines in tip-top shape. I have known folks who never defrag their hard drives, have no clue about updating virus definitions, and have a Windows Registry filled with more crud than a sewer system. An iPad is a very low-maintenance tablet. For most people, it just works. To folks tackling a never-ending list of Windows computer issues, the tablet spells r-e-l-i-e-f.

In mid-April, The New York Times headlined an article PC Sales Still in a Slump, Despite New Offerings. Nick Wingfield wrote, "Smartphones and tablets, while not perfect substitutes for PCs, are pulling dollars out of consumers' wallets that might have otherwise gone to laptop or desktop computers. People are simply more excited about those mobile technologies, with their touchscreens, than they are about buying conventional computers."

And what about the introduction of Microsoft's newest computer operating system? "In this environment, Microsoft introduced Windows 8 last October. The software, a bold redesign of the



company's flagship operating system, is tailored to run on tablets, traditional keyboard-and-mouse computers and hybrid devices that combine elements of both. But it seems that the changes Microsoft made with Windows were so extreme that they scared off buyers," adds Wingfield.

IDC has been tracking PC sales during the first three months of this year for the largest computer makers.

Hewlett Packard got hit with a whopping 24 percent sales drop. Dell, Acer, and Asustek, encountered double-digit declines in PC sales. Lenovo's sales were flat.

IDC reported that Apple was also hit.

Some potential Mac buyers apparently opted to purchase an iPad instead. IDC reported Apple's Mac sales dropped 7.5 percent during the first three months—retaining its place as the third largest U.S. computer maker behind HP and Dell.

Not everyone agrees. Another firm, which tracks computer sales, NPD Group, reports Mac sales climbed 14 percent in January and February, over the same period in 2012.

The discrepancy between those two reports isn't explained.

What is clear is that consumers are buying tablets and smartphones, while many thousands of Windows PCs are sitting on shelves.

Why aren't Windows 8 machines moving from store shelves into shopping carts? In a word, tablets. At least, that's the opinion of Covert. He writes, "The tablet market has grown rapidly since 2010, with the latest reports signaling the space is on its way to becoming a \$64 billion industry, with 150 million units expected to ship this year, according to ABI Research."

Covert adds, "Although PCs are still very much the best tool for work and other productivity-related tasks, tablets (and in many cases, phones) can now handle the vast majority of activities we need them for: Web browsing, email, messaging, music, video, social networking, etc. They're slimmer, lighter, and more versatile."

Covert goes on to say there's another factor dooming the PC: Most computers purchased within the last five years can still perform admirably today.

Slate echoes that sentiment in a piece it published in early April titled The Real Reason No One's Buying PCs Anymore: They've Gotten Too Good.

Will Oremus writes, "It's certainly true that people are increasingly spending money on new tablets and smartphones rather than new computers. But reports of the PC's demise are grossly exaggerated. If the PC is dead, what am I typing this on? If the PC is dead, what are office-workers all over the world sitting in front of all day while they work? The reason people aren't buying new PCs isn't that they don't need a PC. It's that, for the most part, they're getting along just fine with the one they already have."



Covert adds, "Trying to protect the top dog status of the PC now is like trying to preserve the status of vinyl records over CDs. They're superior in certain aspects, sure, but they're also significantly less convenient," he writes.

If this is true, What will the PC look like in the post–PC era? Early this year, tech writer Adrian Kingsley-Hughes wrote a piece with that headline for ZDNet. He wrote, "PCs are giving way to post-PC devices such as smartphones and tablets. Raw horsepower and terabytes of storage have given way to low power consumption and cloud storage. But PCs aren't dead, so what does this shift into a new era mean for them?"

He says, "The shift from PCs to post–PC devices is a lot more than just replacing desktops and notebooks with smartphones and tablets; it's a change in how we interact with, and even bond with our devices. One of the most significant differences is that post–PC devices are more intimate, and we are far less likely to share them with others. A PC may have numerous users, but a tablet or smartphone is likely to have only one."

His article cites several ways in which he believes a post–PC device will differ from today's PC:

- Raw horsepower is no longer important
- Low energy is the new benchmark
- Your new hard drive is a cloud
- Small is the new big
- Simple is the new complex
- Upgrades will be a thing of the past
- Goodbye, PC gaming

What about the appearance of a post–PC device? He predicts it will be:

- Small
- Quiet
- Power efficient
- Rely on wireless for connectivity and cloud for storage
- Not user upgradable
- Cheap
- Disposable

He concludes, "While the PC isn't dead, the PC as we know it doesn't have long left before it is replaced by something that is very different to the PC that we know and love."

### Members learned the latest malware and how to avoid them

It was a full house to hear Craig Mayfield and Joey Police talk about their area of expertise – Internet Security. They deal with it on a daily basis. Craig is an Independent Technology Consultant for various businesses in the Central Kentucky area. Joey is the Chief Technology Officer of Greer Companies based in Lexington. Both are members of CKCS.

Their message on this night was clear. There is software that you can use to help you avoid having your computer infected by malware, worms, trojans or scare ware, but like with the flu you can take a flu shot but that doesn't mean it is okay to go out and lick a handrail or a door knob. Keep this in mind when you are surfing on the web.

They gave the following tips on how to limit your risks:

- Website Blocking Open DNS, ISA 0
- **Update Windows** 0
- Update Adobe Flash and Reader 0
- Use Script Blocker like "No Script" for Firefox 0
- Do not use Internet Explorer 6. Best to use updated IE10, Firefox, Chrome, etc. 0
- Use a 64 Bit Operation System Windows XP 64, Vista 64, or Win 7/8 64 bit 0

They also outlined **steps for removal**.

The "Quick" Way

- 1. Download and Run Combofix in Safe Mode
- 2. Download and Run Malwarebytes QuickScan



- 3. Check Proxy server settings in Internet Explorer/Firefox
- 4. Check Hosts file

### The Best or "Better" Way

- 1. Download and Run Combofix under infected user account. If the computer is on a Domain this may require booting into safe mode and running as administrator and running a second time as the infected user account.
- 2. Download and Run a Full scan of Malwarebytes
- 3. IE check Proxy Server settings
- 4. Check Hosts file if infected and cannot be unlocked you must use an unlocker utility to delete the file
- 5. Sfc /purgecache to purge the windows system files cache
- 6. Sfc /scannow to check windows files
- 7. Update Adobe products Acrobat and Flash
- 8. Update Windows
- 9. Update IE or Firefox
- 10. Reset IE/Firefox settings
  - a. Check Antivirus settings

Using this system, when returning to the newsletter, the viewer doesn't have to wait each time until the large PDF newsletter file reloads.

### HISTORY OF KENTUCKY

For those of you who live in Kentucky, you might find this interesting. And for those of you who don't, YOU might also find this interesting.

- \*The first town in the United States to be named for the first president was Washington , Ky. It was named in 1780.
- \*1792 Kentucky was the first state on the western frontier to join the Union
- \*In the War of 1812 more than half of all Americans killed in action were Kentuckians.
- \*1816 (first promoted) Mammoth Cave, with 336+ miles of mapped passages, is the world's longest cave. It is 379 feet deep and contains at least 5 levels of passages. It's second only to Niagara Falls as the most popular tourist attraction in the US. It became a National Park on July 1, 1941.
- \*The first American performance of a Beethoven symphony was in Lexington in 1817.
- \*Begun in 1819, the first commercial oil well was on the Cumberland River in McCreary County.
- \*Kentucky is the state where both Abraham Lincoln, President of the Union, and Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederacy, were born. They were born less than one hundred miles and one year apart.
- \*1856 The first enamel bathtub was made in Louisville.
- \*In 1873, Louisville druggist, John Colgan, invented something that you can find in just about every grocery store in the world; chewing gum.
- \*1883 The first electric light bulb was shown In Louisville. Thomas Alva Edison introduced his invention to crowds at the Southern Exposition.
- \*1887 Mother's Day was first observed in Henderson by teacher Mary S. Wilson. It became a national holiday in 1916.
- \*The radio was invented by a Kentuckian named Nathan B. Stubblefield of Murray in 1892. It was three years before Marconi made his claim to the invention.
- \*Pike County, the world's largest producer of coal, is famous for the Hatfield-McCoy feud, an Appalachian vendetta that lasted from the Civil War to the 1890s.
- \*1893 'Happy Birthday to You', probably the most sung song in the world, was written by two Louisville sisters Mildred and Patricia Hill.
- \*Late 19<sup>th</sup> century Bibb lettuce was first cultivated by Jack Bibb in Frankfort , Kentucky
- \*1896 The first (known) set of all male quintuplets was born in Paducah .
- \*Carrie Nation, the spokesperson against rum, tobacco, pornography, and corsets, was born near Lancaster in Garrard County.
- 1926 A Hot Brown is a hot sandwich originally created at the Brown Hotel in Louisville, Kentucky, by Fred K. Schmidt.
- \*.1934 Cheeseburgers were first tasted at Kaelin's Restaurant in Louisville.

\*1937 - The first Wigwam Village Motel, with units in the shape of a 'teepee', was built by Frank A. Redford in Cave City.

The "Old Fashion" drink was created in Louisville KY.

- \*The world's largest baseball bat, a full one hundred twenty (120) feet tall and weighing 68,000 pounds, can be seen at the Louisville Slugger Museum in Louisville (Jefferson Co.).
- \*Chevrolet Corvettes are manufactured only in Bowling Green .
- \*Covington (St. Mary's Cathedral-Basilica of the Assumption) is home to the world's largest hand blown stained glass window in existence. It measures an astounding 24 feet by 67 feet and contains 117 different figures.
- \*The world's largest crucifix, standing at sixty feet tall, is in Bardstown (Nelson Co.).
- \*Fort Knox holds more than \$6 billion worth of gold the largest amount stored anywhere in the world.
- \*The JIF plant in Lexington is the world's largest peanut butter producing facility.
- \*Kentucky has more resort parks than any other state in the nation.
- \*Middlesboro is the only United States city built inside a meteor crater.
- \*Newport is home to The World Peace Bell, the world's largest free-swinging bell.
- \*Pikeville annually leads the nation (per capita) in consumption of Pepsi-Cola.
- \*Post-It Notes are made exclusively in Cynthiana, KY.
- \*Shaker Village ( Pleasant Hill ) is the largest historic community of its kind in the U.S.
- \*Christian County is 'wet', while Bourbon County is 'dry'. ('wet 'sells liquor; 'dry' does not)
- \*Barren County has the most fertile land in the state.
- \*Lake Cumberland has more miles of shoreline than the state of Florida
- \*Kentucky is best known for its beautiful blue grass.
- \*Cumberland is the only waterfall in the world to regularly display a Moon bow. It is located just southwest of Corbin.
- \*Thunder Over Louisville is the opening ceremony for the Kentucky Derby Festival and is the world's largest fireworks display.
- \*The only monument south of the Ohio River dedicated to Union soldiers who died in the Civil War is located in Vanceburg.
- High Bridge, located near Nicholasville, is the highest railroad bridge over navigable water in the United States ...
  - \*The Cathedral Basilica of the Assumption in Covington has 82 stained-glass windows including the world's largest hand-blown one. The window measures 24 feet wide by 67 feet high and depicts the Council of Ephesus with 117 life-sized figures.
  - \*The Lost River Cave and Valley Bowling Green includes a cave with the shortest and deepest underground river in the world. It contains the largest cave opening east of the Mississippi.
  - \*The Kentucky Derby is the oldest continuously held horse race in the country. It is held at Churchill Downs in Louisville on the first Saturday in May.
  - \*Kentucky is the horse capital of the world.
