It's Our Birthday


This September is a major milestone for CKCS. It's hard to believe that we are 30 years old this month... and we are still going strong.

Course Descriptions

Creative Graphics Using Printmaster... If you are involved in community activities, run a small business, want your own personalized holiday and greeting cards, or if you work with crafts, you'll love how this class can help you create the items you want and need. A small example of the types of projects you can create with PrintMaster includes greeting cards; envelopes and labels; calendars; certificates; newsletters, postcards; and photo projects along with lots of other projects.

Pages for iPad*... If you own an iPad, you'll want to own Pages for iPad. The word processor/desktop publishing app is the premiere application of its kind on the iPad. In addition, all Pages docs created on the iPad are immediately available on your iPhone, Mac, or iPod touch when iCloud is activated. You should know iPad basics (such as the Home button and using the touchscreen) to sign up for this class.

Windows 8.1...Learn how to navigate in Microsoft's new operating system, add new apps as well as use them. Also, learn how to use the Start and Desktop screens. Anyone taking this class should have a prior working knowledge of a Windows operating system.

Learning Camera Basics Levels 1 & 2*...We have designed this class to show in an easy and entertaining way how to use your camera in plain English. Learn basic skills on how to take pictures and what all of those dials and buttons are all about and how to use them. (Level 1 is required to take Level 2)

PaintShop Pro Beginning Digital Imaging ... students learn how to fix up their pictures using Corel's Paint Shop Pro. You will learn the tools used to crop, lighten/darken a picture, fix red eye, clone part of a picture out, add text and tips on how to scan old pictures and slides and lots more.

PaintShop Pro Advanced Digital Imaging ... students will build on tools they learned in the beginning class. They will also learn how to use layers, create collages, restore old photos, straighten images, perspective correction and lots more.

PaintShop Pro Digital Imaging Independent Work... students bring projects that they want to work on with guidance and assistance from the instructors. Students may be working on their pictures, restoring old photographs, working with templates, making brochures and business cards or other projects.

PaintShop Pro Advanced Digital Imaging and the Independent Work classes will be combined as space permits.

Beyond Basics...... have you ever saved a file on your computer only to find it next to impossible to find again? Then this class is for you. We will spend half our time talking about organizing your files, the other half on personal data security and computer maintenance.

Computer Basics...Learn the fundamentals of using a Windows 7 computer. Learn to use various aspects of the Microsoft Word Processing program, including manipulating text and inserting graphics into a document. Basic filing, basic file management, and how to use a thumb drive are introduced. The final class of this course deals with the basics of email and use of the Internet.

File Management...Provide an in-depth experience working with files and folders. This six-session course will cover using libraries to access files and folders, understanding the parts of a window, viewing and arranging files

Intermediate iPad*...If you want to get more out of your iPad, this is your course. Learn what's beyond the basic use of the iPad. This class is designed for the iPad user who's comfortable with basics of the iPad screen, multi-touch gestures, the home button, and iOS basics (the operating system powering your iPad)

Excel Spreadsheets... Learn the basic tools of this popular spreadsheet program—layout configuration; data type formatting; numerical calculations; fill tool to copy formulas; set the print area; links, charts, and format painter; freeze rows/columns, data sort, and auto-filter. Prerequisites: Computer Basics, Beyond Basics or equivalent experience.

* These classes meet in the main room and their class size is determined by the instructor. All other classes meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.

Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (This is at the discretion of the instructor.). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.

COSTS: All classes have a fee payable to CKCS of \$60 unless stated otherwise (see above). CKCS members get a 20 percent discount on all class fees.


Computer Mystery Workshop

There will also be time for questions, problem solving, and a few other things.



QUESTION AND ANSWER ABOUT MALWARE BYTES

QUESTION FROM JS:

Every time Malware Bytes runs on my computer, it tells me that I have potential threats that have PUP in their file name. I understand that PUP stands for Potentially Unwanted Programs. A screen shot of the one from this morning is below.



I always quarantine them. Can you tell me anything about this?

ANSWER BY BOB BROWN:

As I understand these PUP things, they can be (but rarely are) pretty terrible viruses. They usually are low grade advertising programs that just pester you and your computer.

They clog up your system with dozens of programs or copies of the same program trying to get machine time to fiddle with your web browsing to manage advertising.

I deleted over 50 PUPs from a neighbor's computer a couple of weeks ago and she says it runs a lot faster now. Her computer was taking more than five minutes to boot up from power-off. After deletion, it was just under two minutes - probably pretty close to what it was when brand new.

I always recommend deleting or quarantining them every time you can. And rerun Malware Bytes in a day or so to see if they are being recreated or re-installed by something in your computer. You may have downloaded something that is creating new PUPs frequently.

Prepare your iPhone, iPad or iPod touch for the new iOS 8

It's coming. Are you ready for it? A new iOS version is just around the corner.

All indications are that Apple will officially release iOS 8 this fall. That's the operating system running on Apple devices. Suppose you're currently running iOS 7 and want to upgrade your device to the newest OS. What's the best way to do that?



TechRepublic provides a list of five steps to get the job done:

- Remove unwanted data
- 2. Remove unwanted apps
- 3. Update the device
- 4. Create a full back up in iCloud & iTunes
- 5. Restore the backup (optional)

Will my iPad, iPhone, or iPod touch run iOS 8? Here's a list of supported Apple devices

Macworld UK notes on its web site: "Bear in mind, however, that the devices towards the lower ends of those sets will only get a partial share of the features in iOS 8. It's also possible that they will struggle with performance issues - the iPhone 4 was the oldest iPhone that could run iOS 7, and ran noticeably slowly compared to iOS 6."

What's new?

iOS 8 will offer a number of new features not currently available.

Here's how TechRadar sums up some new features:

Touch ID:
 TechRadar predicts this new feature will come to the iPhone 6, iPad Air 2, iPad mini 3, and



iPhone 5s later this year. TechRadar says, "All sorts of apps will be able to use the biometric scanning home button instead of pesky passcodes."

Camera time-lapse mode: "Believe it or not, the iPhone is consistently the most used camera
in the world," says TechRadar. "In iOS 8, the camera app is going to get even better,"
according to the web site. TechRadar says Apple included a time-lapse camera mode "in
order to help users capture extended moments and automatically speed up the video with a
higher frame rate."

Health App: Nike and the Mayo Clinic have teamed up to produce HealthKit. It will collect

Microsoft preps Windows 'Threshold' preview for late September

This news article by Mary Jo Foley appeared in CNET on August 15, 2014.

Microsoft is aiming to deliver a "technology preview" of its Windows "Threshold" operating system by late September or early October, according to multiple sources of mine who asked not to be named. (Joe's comment, "This is great news if true, but I always take Microsoft release dates with a grain of salt.")

And in a move that signals where Microsoft is heading on the "serviceability" front, those who install the tech preview will need to agree to have subsequent monthly updates to it pushed to them automatically, sources added.

Threshold is the next major version of Windows that is expected to be christened "Windows 9" when it is made available in the spring of 2015. Threshold is expected to include a number of new features that are aimed at continuing to improve Windows' usability on non-touch devices and by those using mice and keyboards alongside touch.

Among those features – according to previous leaks – are a **new "mini" Start Menu**; **windowed Metro-Style applications** that can run on the Desktop;



virtual desktops; and the elimination of the Charms bar that debuted as part of Windows 8. Cortana integration with Windows Threshold is looking like it could make it into the OS, as well.

(Joe's comment, " All of the above in Red are good, looking forward to elimination of the Charms bar, Cortana would be great, it is like Siri on the iPhone, you can talk to it and get oral answers.) (This web site link was provided by Jo Stratton, thanks Jo.)

I've asked Microsoft officials for comment. To date, Microsoft execs have declined to comment on what will be in Threshold, when it will be available, how much it will cost, or what it will be named.

When Microsoft was working on Windows 8, the company delivered three external "milestones" before making the operating system generally available in October 2012. First there was a Windows 8 developer preview, which Microsoft released on September 13, 2011, followed by a Windows 8 "consumer" preview on February 29, 2012. (Joe's comment, "When I installed Windows 8 "consumer" preview it wiped out all my programs and I had to reinstall them.")

The operating system was released to manufacturing on August 1, 2012. ("Installing the one released to manufacturing did not wipe out any programs and was the best one to install.")

These days, Microsoft's operating system team is on a more rapid release schedule, so I'd think there won't be five or six months between any Threshold milestone builds Microsoft plans to make available externally.

I had heard previously from my contacts that Microsoft was aiming to deliver a public preview of Threshold available to anyone interested toward the end of calendar 2014. I'm not sure if there's still a plan to make a public consumer preview available at that time or if this "technical preview" is the only "preview" Microsoft will release before Threshold is released to manufacturing.

Update: One of my contacts who has provided accurate information on Windows in the past said the Threshold tech preview will be public and available to all those interested.

New arrangement with Kroger helps CKCS big time!



Starting September 1, instead of the old Gift Card system, it uses the Plus Card which virtually everyone shopping at Kroger carries now. When you scan your PLUS CARD a small portion of all your purchases is donated to CKCS. August Tech Night – a lesson about Raspbery Pi


Members attending the CKCS tech night presentation on August 11 learned about a credit card size computer called Raspbery Pi, designed to connect to your TV and a keyboard. It is inexpensive costing in the \$35 to \$45 range depending on the model you choose. It is intended to be used with

items you have, such as a monitor, keyboard, mouse. It comes without a

case, but they are available for purchase if needed.

The device was demonstrated by Tony Cooper, the VP of Southland Computer Store, shown holding a complete Raspberry Pi computer. He projected pictures of more than a dozen interesting and unique devices programmers had built using the Raspberry Pi. The TV behind Tony was being run by one of the mini computers. It has no built in hard dive, but uses an SD card for booting and persistent storage. It can run on batteries but it is common to buy an AC power supply.

According to *Wikipedia* the single board computer was developed in the United Kingdom with the intention of promoting the teaching of basic computer science in schools.



It is an interesting device which may be purchased at the store or may be ordered online with added shipping costs and taxes.

Prepare your Mac computer for the new OS X 'Yosemite'

Now that you've updated your Apple device, time to upgrade your Macintosh to the latest version of OS X – called Yosemite. This is version 10.10 of the operating system that powers your Mac. Apple first introduced OS X (called Cheeta) in March 2001.

Will your Mac run Yosemite?

If your Mac currently runs Mavericks (OS X, version 10.9) made available for download in October 2013, it should run Yosemite.

Officially, here's the list of Macs that should run Yosemite:

- iMac (Mid–2007 or later)
- MacBook (13-inch aluminum, Late 2008) and (13-inch, Early 2009 or later)
- MacBook Pro (13-inch, Mid-2009 or later) and (15-inch, Mid/Late 2007 or later) and (17-inch, Late 2007 or later)
- MacBook Air (Late 2008 or later)
- Mac mini (Early 2009 or later)
- Mac Pro (Early 2008 or later)
- Xserve (Early 2009)

Tech experts predict that Apple will release Yosemite in late September or October.

A beta version of Yosemite has been available for months.

But most Mac users didn't want to load the

non–finalized version onto their machines because the software (like any beta software) had plenty of bugs.

The tech web site Mashable notes this is the biggest change for OS X in 13 years: "From the chrome on application windows and the Dock, to application and sidebar icons, almost everything has been redrawn and redesigned. Say goodbye to the lickable indicators and Aqua bubbles of the past — OS X Yosemite is decidedly more modern. Still, even though the interface has been updated, it still feels like a Mac. This is important because, as Microsoft learned with Windows 8, becoming too different can be jarring and upsetting to the end-user."

The online tech magazine, Wired, has taken the time to profile some of the major changes in OS X Yosemite's mainstay apps. Here is Wired's take on some of the new offerings:

Wired: Take a tour of Mail's Best New Features

"For users that were frustrated with Mail in Mavericks, Yosemite may have the Mail you've been looking for. And for those that didn't use the client in the past, features like Markup and search may be enough to make you a convert. Full performance and third party compatibility issues are still yet to be seen, since Yosemite won't be finalized until later this fall, but from the preview, it's definitely a step up."

Mac users who use iPhoto or Aperture need to know that an app called Photos is coming to the Mac. Photos won't arrive until early 2015.

What does that mean for diehard users of Apple's iPhoto or Aperture? First off, Apple has already announced that it's no longer updating Aperture. In late June of this year, Apple indicated that it would cease development of Aperture and concentrate on Photos.

Here's how imore.com describes the transition: "Next year, after the new Photos app for Mac is released, Apple will remove iPhoto and Aperture from the Mac App Store. You'll still be able to keep and run your old copies, but Apple will no longer be updating or improving them. However, at some point in the future, they'll be outdated enough you'll want to move on."

In addition to the new apps, OS X Yosemite has a much more translucent look. Apple has updated OS X so that it looks more modern.

OSXDaily describes the new Desktop this way: "The general desktop appearance of OS X Yosemite looks modernized, bright, flatter, and generally pretty fancy."

The Dock and menu bars have changed too. "The OS X Yosemite Dock is flatter and looks borrowed from some cross between OS X Tiger and/or iOS 8, removing the three-dimensional shelf appearance and opting for a squared transparency instead. The menu bar, drop down menus, and system menus in general have

received a new look and a new font. The new font is generally thinner and modern looking, closely matching the default font of iOS 7 & 8, Helvetica Neue," writes OSXDaily.

Speaking of Yosemite's new translucent appearance, "the appearance of things will change depending on the color of that which is layered behind it," adds OSXDaily.

What else is new?

Apple reveals some of the upcoming changes in OS X Yosemite on a special web site dedicated to the new operating system made for the Mac.



Redesigned

The site is quick to point that out Yosemite has been redesigned and updated: "...we looked at the entire system refined it app by app. Feature by feature. Pixel by pixel."

Safari

Safari is said to be a faster browser, offering speedier web browsing under Yosemite, taking advantage of a new "Nitro JavaScript engine and support for the latest web standards." Safari's toolbar has been streamlined and uses the Favorites view popular on the iPhone and iPad.

Mail

A feature called MailDrop has been added to the Mac's built in email program, Mail. From Apple's Yosemite web site: "When you're signed in to iCloud, Mail Drop lets you send large files like videos, presentations, even a folder of images without having to worry about your service provider's limitations. With Mail Drop, when you send a large attachment, it's automatically uploaded to iCloud. If your recipients use Mail, they'll receive the attachment just as they do today. If they use another app or webmail, they'll receive a link to download it."

Messages

The Mac's real-time texting app, Messages has been updated to allow Mac users who have an iPhone to text using SMS, the standard method of sending texts by cell phone. In addition, all of the SMS messages now also appear on the Mac. Messages users on the Mac may also record a short audio clip of their voice and send it using Messages.

iCloud Drive

One of the biggest changes in Yosemite is Apple's new way of providing iCloud.

If you wanted to save a file in Apple's cloud system using Mavericks, you needed to open an app (such as Pages, Numbers or Keynote), create your document and then save the file in iCloud.

Yosemite changes all that.

Now, it's much more like Dropbox or SpiderOak's Hive folder on the Mac Desktop.

You no longer need to open a Pages file, for example, to access your Pages documents stored in iCloud.



Apple has built iCloud Drive right into your Mac's Finder. Apple says, "iCloud Drive works like any other folder on your Mac. Just drag and drop any files into the folder. They're always available, and changes you make offline are synced when you connect to the Internet."

Phone Calls

Yosemite allows users to make and receive iPhone calls on their Macs. Apple says, "So if you're working on your Mac and your iPhone rings in another room, you can leave it there and still take the call."

Fonts

Ever since Apple introduced the first Mac in 1984, desktop publishers, artists, and creative types have embraced that computer. Fonts have always been a major part of the Mac because the manner in which typefaces appear are important to those individuals.

Now, Yosemite updates your Mac's fonts throughout the system.

Apple says, "For some, the choice of a font may not be a big deal. But to us, it's an integral part of the interface. In OS X Yosemite, fonts have been refined systemwide to be more legible and consistent

across the Mac experience. You'll notice a fresh, new typeface in app windows, menu bars, and throughout the system. And it looks absolutely incredible on the Retina display."

Notification Center

The way your Mac alerts you to what's going on each day has also changed in Yosemite. Notification Center on the right—hand side of the screen offers a summary of events occurring daily.

"It gives you a concise summary of the day's upcoming events, reminders, and birthdays. It even summarizes tomorrow's events. In addition, you'll get quick access to important information with widgets like Calendar, Weather, Stocks, World Clock, Calculator, and Reminders. And you can customize what you see by adding more widgets from the Mac App Store," says Apple's web site.

Apple, for the first time, allowed a million users to test drive the beta version of Yosemite before it's released this fall.

Those users were not required to register as a developer. Apple was hoping to get feedback from average consumers to see what worked and what didn't before a finalized version of Yosemite was released this fall. User feedback will be used to improve Yosemite before it is officially released to the public.

If you've been using a Mac for any time at all, you'll definitely see that Yosemite is different.

As TechCrunch put it — "Yosemite is a dramatic shift for OS X, and one of the most comprehensive overall changes for Apple's desktop OS since its inception. The changes permeate the look and feel of the OS, and offer up a host of new features, with perhaps the most notable among those being the new Continuity features that corral iOS devices and Macs even closer together, with functionality flowing between the two on a number of tasks that make sense for both platforms to share seamlessly."

Mac sales surge after Apple cuts prices, increases RAM, and improves value











A screen shot from Apple's online store reveals the various Mac models that the company sells both at its web site and through its brick and mortar stores.

Apple has seen its sales of Macintosh computers surge.

This past summer, Apple reported that Mac sales climbed 17.6 million to a record 4.4 million units sold during the June quarter.

What's behind the rising sales? Many credit these factors:

- A new, lower priced entry-level iMac, Apple's all—in—one desktop. In June, Apple introduced a new \$1,099 iMac, That undercut by \$200 the price of the previous entry-level iMac.
- MacBook Air laptops with faster processors, and lower prices. Apple cut \$100 off the prices.
 The base 11.6-inch screen model now starts at \$899. MacBook Airs are now the most affordable laptops that Apple has ever produced.
- Prices cut by \$100 on the top-of-the-line 15-inch MacBook Pro with Retina display laptops, while base RAM is boosted to 16 GB.
- Non-Retina display MacBook Pro laptop now sells for \$1,099 a \$100 price drop.

More Mac tidbits: In China, Mac sales skyrocketed by 39 percent. The MacBook Air is now Apple's most popular computer.

A Wall Street Journal blog headlined its article, Apple's New Product Hit: the Mac.

Computerworld's Gregg Keizer wrote in late July, "Apple's Mac sales came in significantly higher than the forecasts of every Wall Street analyst polled last week by *Fortune*. The company beat the 3.9 million average of nearly three–dozen analysts by 12 percent; none of the 34 financial experts surveyed by *Fortune* had placed a higher bet than what Apple recorded."

Even tech web site, ZDNet is writing about the Mac's popularity in a column called, *How Apple took over the only segment of the PC market that still matters*.

Finally, Business Insider published this in late August: "Apple's Mac business has consistently outperformed the consumer PC business for years now, growing slowly, but steadily, racking up sales

and profits for Apple despite competing with much cheaper, comparable commodity devices from companies like Lenovo, Dell, HP, and Samsung. In this way, if you want to really predict Apple's future, the Mac is the most important product to look at."
