

As his picture shows, his new space is still under construction, but will be completed soon. ArtLab of Kentucky is a public walkin 3D printshop and educational center for desktop 3D printing. Ben explains, "With our low cost materials, virtually any object can be made with our variety of BukoBot printers". They are available for in-house rental and purchase.

The photo shows the range of objects he can make. He will bring some and explain how they were made. What you don't see in the photo is the full body scanning machine that he can use to make statues

of people. Maybe you've heard of the latest craze of doing the actual bride and groom 3D figures for the top of wedding cakes. He's done those as well. Unfortunately, he can't lug that machine to CKCS in November, but Joe Dietz will be arranging a field trip for one of his Digital Photo SIG's in the near future.

Key Points




We will also review our CMW model portfolio and check on the progress of SQRL website login. And there will be time for questions, problem solving and more.



How to make a Panorama photo

To do this you have to stand in one place, and take three or more photos, making sure the photos overlap so the program can piece (stitch) them together.

Open Photo Gallery, find and select the three photos, and at the top click on CREATE, then click PANORAMA.

Mac & iPad Article

Mac sales 'blow-away' expectations, sales surge 21percent

For first time in three years, Mac replaces iPad as Apple's second-biggest revenue maker after iPhone

"The iPad tablet was supposed to signal the demise of the PC. Well, Apple's Mac line is having the last laugh."

C/Net reports in Apple's role reversal: 'Mature' Mac outpaces iPad in revenue

"Apple last quarter sold 5.5 million Macs, more than it's ever sold in any other quarter in company history."

 TÚAW reports in Long Live the Mac! Apple posts all-time quarterly record in Mac sales



"It was just an absolutely blow–away quarter. Our best ever," remarked Apple CEO Tim Cook as he reflected on what the company accomplished in the three–month period that ended in September.

<u>Huffington Post</u> wrote, "It's the return of the Mac."

<u>C|Net</u> noted, "The gains in the Mac line were particularly notable because worldwide personal computer sales are still declining."



<u>ZDNet</u> headlined a column by Adrian Kingsley–Hughes, "Why the Mac momentum may just be starting."

When Apple reported how it earned its revenue during this past July, August, and September, almost no one saw it coming. Strong Mac sales beat the forecasts by every Wall Street analyst polled by *Fortune*. Not one of the 32 financial experts that *Fortune* surveyed predicted higher sales than what Apple actually recorded.

Sales of the Mac soared. Apple sold a record 5.5 million Macs – up 21% from the same period last year.

Cook told reporters, "Being up 21 percent in a market that's shrinking – it doesn't get any better than that."

Apple sold more Macs during these three months than any other three-month period since the company began selling Macintosh computers in January 1984.

Apple watchers credit several factors, including:

- Extremely strong back-to-school sales. Cook told reporters they'd see a lot of new Mac notebooks if they visited college campuses. He said the back to school crowd voted and the Mac won. Apple's Chief Financial Officer Luca Maestri mentioned great demand in "the backto-school season for both desktops and portables with especially strong growth from MacBook Pro and MacBook Air." Apple ran its back-to-school promotion, giving gift cards to students and parents who bought Macs.
- Mac sales climb 46 percent in emerging markets. Apple says in China alone, Mac sales rose 54 percent over last year.
- Many, many schools use Macs. CNBC quotes a UBS managing director as saying the fact that schools have been using Macs for 10 to 15 years has "aided the product line" and "the ease of use of the Mac remains well ahead of Windows and will continue to benefit PC sales."
- **Price cuts.** In June, Apple introduced a less expensive, less powerful iMac. Earlier in April, Apple reduced the price of the MacBook Air model.
- Customers choosing Macs over iPads. Mac revenue was 25 percent higher than the iPads during the quarter ending in September. Apple CEO Tim Cook told reporters that he is fine with the fact that some folks opted to buy a Mac over an iPad. In other words, cannibalization is fine as long as Apple ate itself.

Adrian Kingsley–Hughes writes in his column for ZDNet, "With the holiday season coming up – which is typically another strong quarter for the Mac - sales are likely to remain buoyant despite the spotlight being more on the iPhone and iPad." Time will tell.

Bottom line: Should you upgrade to Yosemite?

Macworld recently ran a story using this headline.

No Word Processing SIG in November

This useful MS Word feature will allow you to quickly and easily generate and print sorted mailing labels for Christmas/Holiday cards, family newsletters, reunions, and business/charitable organization mailings. Address listings can be stored in a Word table, an Excel spreadsheet, and an Access database file.

Text is just too small to read

Have you ever received an email or an attachment with text that was so tiny that it was just too small making it hard-to-read? Recently I received an email like that, and the sender apologized for the tiny hard to read text.

I was able to read it easily using this tip. Click on the area of the text. Then hold down the CONTROL key while you turn the wheel on your mouse forward (away from you). This will enlarge the image making tiny text easy to read. Spinning that same wheel toward you while holding down the Control key makes the text smaller.

This works on most all word processing or email programs you might use. Give it a try.

However, beginning in September, Kroger made changes in the way the reward program works. The old white gift cards will no longer be part of the new system. That program is gone. The new program is based on the familiar KROGER PLUS card which has been around for years.




We now ask that you do two things if you wish to have your spending at Kroger generate automatic donations to CKCS:

- 1. If you have a card that looks like this picture, great! Most Kroger shoppers do have one because it provides discounts on numerous products. If you need a card, you can get one by going to the Kroger service desk and asking for one.
- 2. Use the Kroger website to register your Plus Card number and choose "Central Kentucky Computer Society" as your organization.
- 3. Here are detailed instructions for Step 2:
 - a. Go to https://www.kroger.com
 - b. Click on Community Rewards
 - c. Click on "Create an Account" to enroll
 - d. Enter your information: including email address and a new password for this account
 - e. Click Create Account
 - f. Enter your Kroger Plus card number it is on both the wallet card and the key ring card
 - g. Click "Enroll now for Community Rewards"

h. Enter our organization name **Central Kentucky Computer Society** or the CKCS number which is **11119**

Once you have done all this, if all is right, the next time you shop at Kroger you should see a comment on the bottom of your receipt that looks like this:

Your existing white Kroger Gift card can still be used to buy groceries until all the money you put on it has been used. Once it is empty, we understand you won't be able to 'load' it with more money. If that is correct, at that point the white card is basically useless.



Got another one



The rain was pouring and there was a big puddle in front of the pub. A ragged old man was standing there with a rod and hanging a string into the puddle.

A tipsy-looking, curious gentleman came over to him and asked what he was doing.

'Fishing,' the old man said simply.

'Poor old fool,' the gentleman thought, and he invited the ragged old man to a drink in the pub.

As he felt he should start some conversation while they were sipping their whisky, the gentleman asked, "And how many have you caught?"

'You're the eighth,' the old man answered.

Perhaps an unknown bit of history. Really interesting.

Tour boats ferry people out to the USS Arizona Memorial in Hawaii every thirty minutes. We just missed a ferry and had to wait thirty minutes. I went into a small gift shop to kill time. In the gift shop, I purchased a small book entitled,

"Reflections on Pearl Harbor " by Admiral Chester Nimitz.

Sunday, December 7th, 1941-

Admiral Chester Nimitz was attending a concert in Washington D.C. He was paged and told there was a phone call for him. When he answered the phone, it was President Franklin Delano Roosevelt on the phone. He told Admiral Nimitz that he (Nimitz) would now be the Commander of the Pacific Fleet.

Admiral Nimitz flew to Hawaii to assume command of the Pacific Fleet. He landed at Pearl Harbor on Christmas Eve, 1941. There was such a spirit of despair, dejection and defeat-you would have thought the Japanese had already won the war.

On Christmas Day, 1941, Adm Nimitz was given a boat tour of the destruction wrought on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese. Big sunken battleships and navy vessels cluttered the waters everywhere you looked.

As the tour boat returned to dock, the young helmsman of the boat asked, "Well Admiral, what do you think after seeing all this destruction?". Admiral Nimitz's reply shocked everyone within the sound of his voice.

Admiral Nimitz said, "The Japanese made three of the biggest mistakes an attack force could ever make, or God was taking care of America. Which do you think it was?"

Shocked and surprised, the young helmsman asked, "What do mean by saying the Japanese made the three biggest mistakes an attack force ever made?"

Nimitz explained: "Mistake number one: the Japanese attacked on Sunday morning. Nine out of every ten crewmen of those ships were ashore on leave. If those same ships had been lured to sea and been sunk-we would have lost 38,000 men instead of 3,800.

Mistake number two: when the Japanese saw all those battleships lined in a row, they got so carried away sinking those battleships, they never once bombed our dry docks opposite those ships. If they had destroyed our dry docks, we would have had to tow every one of those ships to America to be repaired.

As it is now, the ships are in shallow water and can be raised. One tug can pull them over to the dry docks, and we can have them repaired and at sea by the time we could have towed them to America. And I already have crews ashore anxious to man those ships.

Mistake number three: Every drop of fuel in the Pacific theater of war is in top of the ground storage tanks five miles away over that hill. One attack plane could have strafed those tanks and destroyed our fuel supply.

That's why I say the Japanese made three of the biggest mistakes an attack force could make or God was taking care of America."

I've never forgotten what I read in that little book. It is still an inspiration as I reflect upon it. In jest, I might suggest that because Admiral Nimitz was a Texan, born and raised in Fredericksburg, Texas -- he was a born optimist. But anyway you look at it--Admiral Nimitz was able to see a silver lining in a situation and circumstance where everyone else saw only despair and defeatism.

President Roosevelt had chosen the right man for the right job. We desperately needed a leader that could see silver linings in the midst of the clouds of dejection, despair and defeat.

Yosemite (also known as OS X 10.10) is a free download for Mac users and is available via the Mac App Store.

Writer Christopher Breen: "For the last several iterations of the Mac OS, Apple has moved away from a computer focused digital hub strategy where your Mac held and commanded your data and you attached other devices to your computer to sync its data with them (and vice versa). In recent years, Apple has turned instead to a stuff—centric scheme. In this case your Mac is just another device (although an important one) that has access to your files. What you're largely concerned with is being able to work with those files, regardless of whether you're using a Mac, an iOS device, or accessing them via a web browser. The cloud is a key component in that it provides the means for making your data available to all these points of entry, and transparently so."

Breen says under Mavericks (the operating system for Macs that Apple made available in 2013) and Mountain Lion (Apple released this version of the operating system for Macs in July 2012), iCloud was designed to sync much of your data.

Yosemite is changing that. He says the newest operating system is designed to play better with data outside Apple's control.

In addition, Apple is making it easier for you to work with your data no matter what device is available to you.

Breen cites three features that accomplish this:

Spotlight – Mavericks takes this Mac standard to another level. While Spotlight has been a Mac feature for many years, Yosemite actually puts Spotlight on steroids. "With Yosemite, Spotlight will

Are early adopters guinea pigs?

Some folks who've downloaded and installed Yosemite, the newest operating system for the Mac, have been burned.

Some, but not all, report serious problems staying connected to the Internet via Wi–Fi (wireless connections.)

By the time you read this, Apple might have issued a fix and the problem will be history.

But the issue points out the real hazards of upgrading to a brand new operating system version.

Apple mum as Mac owners tussle with Yosemite over Wi–Fi problems, writes Macworld, describing ongoing Internet issues plaguing some early adopters.

This begs the question – are early adopters guinea pigs? In addition to internal testing of Yosemite at Apple's campus in California, Apple gave away as many as a million copies of beta versions of Yosemite for average folks to test it and report problems on their Macs.

Still, problems persist despite numerous beta updates to these users. Those of you with iPads, iPhones, and iPod touches might remember that Apple pulled iOS 8.0.1 the same day it issued the update after some iPhone 6 and iPhone 6 Plus units stopped working properly after owners updated to 8.0.1.

Apple quickly issued iOS 8.0.2, and finally, 8.1, which apparently solved the problems.

I, for one, am waiting to upgrade to Yosemite.

Mavericks (OS X 10.9) works just fine on my 2 ½ year old MacBook Air.

I hope to replace my almost four—year—old Mac mini with a new model sometime in November. By that time, odds are virtually certain that Apple will have solved the Wi–Fi problems and issued at least one, and possibly, more updates to OS X 10.10.

now incorporate and provide previews of results from the Internet, including Bing search results, map data, news headlines, Wikipedia entries, Apple store content listings, and movie showtimes. The net result means more efficient searching and fewer trips to your web browser to find the information you desire," writes Breen.

Notification Center widgets – "Open Notification Center, scroll to the bottom, click on Edit, and you see a collection of widgets available to you, including Calculator, Stocks, Weather, and World Clock. These are a fine start, but like the Dashboard widgets before them, Notification Center widgets can be developed by third parties, which could make some very valuable information available to you with a single click," says Breen.

iCloud Drive – Breen writes, "Now you can store files in the cloud that were created by any appeither by moving them from within the Finder via the iCloud Drive entry that appears in a Finder window's sidebar or through a Save dialog box."



New Mac minis arrive; Apple knocks \$100 off base price

If you're a regular reader of this column, you know that my favorite Mac model is...

The Mac mini.

"People love the Mac mini. It's a great first Mac or addition to your home network, and the new Mac mini is a nice upgrade packed into an



incredibly compact design," said Phillip Schiller, Apple's sernior vice-president of Worldwide Marketing as he spoke to reporters in late October.

Apple's least expensive Mac doesn't get much respect compared to other machines, especially when compared to the much more expensive iMac. (The Mac mini went two years without an update by Apple. It's clear the small machine is not a priority. What is also clear is that people are buying the Mac mini. So it is making money for Apple.)

I mean, after tech writers got a chance to learn more about the new Mac minis they were aghast that a user couldn't upgrade the RAM without voiding the machine's warranty (as they could with earlier Mac minis.) In addition, the hard drive is apparently a bear to access. Also, quad-core processor options are no longer available.

The solution? BTO. That doesn't stand for Bachman Turner–Overdrive, the 1970's group that unleashed several hits when I was in high school.

It stands for BUILD TO ORDER. And when buying a Mac mini, the best way to go about it is by ordering a BTO model from Apple's online store and picking it up at your local Apple Store (or having it delivered to your own door.) In other words, make sure you buy enough RAM and the correct hard drive (or Fusion Drive or Flash storage) before the machine arrives.

Techradar pro did a hands—on review of the new Mac minis. It reported, "You now get two Thunderbolt 2 ports on the rear, meaning it can connect to external peripherals at ludicrously fast speeds, but otherwise it's still a very nice, very unassuming aluminum slab."


Techradar's early verdict: "We're glad to see the Mac mini get a proper upgrade at last. The low-end option is limited in power, but it's cheaper than ever."

"It remains the sharpest looking all—in—one you can buy, and the amazing 5K display will likely keep you so mesmerized you'll hardly notice



anything else about the system," writes *C*/*Net* as it describes Apple's new iMac introduced in late October.

Mashable headlines a story, "Apple Retina 5K iMac Has a Screen That Can Stop Traffic."

TechCrunch says, "Apple's newest iMac has the best display ever on a computing device. Let's just get that out the way right at the start: You won't find a better screen anywhere else, period...Apple's price of admission for 5K goodness is steep, with prices starting at \$2,499 (plus additional fees for custom configurations) but it's worth every penny."

Wired handed the new iMac a nine out of ten rating: "Nearly flawless; buy it now."

Phillip Schiller, Apple's top marketing executive, told a crowd of reporters when Apple introduced the new 27–inch machine in October, "This is the world's highest–resolution display." The new 5K iMac offers 5120–by–2880 pixel resolution.

This is the most expensive iMac Apple has ever sold, costing \$700 more than a similar 27–inch iMac without the Retina display.

The web site, BGR, noted that 80 of the original 1984 Mac displays would fit into a single 5K display.

New iPad Air 2 is thinner, faster, and comes with touch ID

In mid–October, Apple introduced two new iPads – an iPad Air 2 and iPad mini 3. The company also dropped the price of previous generation models by \$100.

Apple put a faster processor (an A8X chip, a variation of the chip in the iPhone 6 and 6 Plus) in the iPad Air 2, in addition to an anti–reflective coating and better graphics.

Who's watching you as you connect over public Wi-Fi?

"Maybe Better If You Don't Read This Story on Public WiFi" is how the Dutch article appearing on medium.com began. It didn't get any better after that.


"We took a hacker to a café and, in 20 minutes, he knew where everyone else was born, what schools they attended, and the last five things they googled," writes Maurits Martijn, in a Dutch article translated into English from *De Correspondent*.

The writer met a 34–year–old named Wouter Slotboom in an Amsterdam café. Slotboom was carrying a small black device in his backpack. That device was connecting to laptops, tablets, and smartphones used by customers in that Dutch café.

You can imagine the rest of the story. Security went out the door. A tuts+ article (with link below) tells how to use a VPN (virtual private network) on your Mac.

"Your Mac is a safe computer out of the box, but as soon as you connect to a network, you're vulnerable to local attacks. The problem is that OS X doesn't protect against the most minor threats, like local network packet interception. For that, you'll need to download a few tools," says Tuts+.

It continues, "First, you'll want to find either a virtual private network or a proxy. The former, abbreviated *VPN*, will use your Internet connection to talk to a new, virtual version of



the local network. It creates a direct tunnel, of sorts, between you and the VPN server, which then talks to servers on the Internet on its own. When people try to see what you're doing, all they can perceive is your transmission of data to and from the VPN's server. Any other activity is hidden behind the walls of the service."

Probably one of the best–known VPNs for both the Mac and Apple devices is Cloak. To use Cloak, you need to sign up for a Cloak account. There is a 30–day free trial and plans start at \$2.99 per month.

Another popular app for both Mac and iOS is TunnelBear. This VPN app gives 500MB of free data each month. Pricing varies depending on the account you use if you decide to opt for a paid account.
