- 2. You will likely get a black square stating THIS CAMERA IS MISSING IN ACTION. That is because the camera is not turned on at that time.
- 3. In the upper corner of the address bar will be a symbol like a lock or maybe an e
- Click on that symbol and drag it to your desktop. It likely will say LIVE NOT FOUND – NEST Right click on those words and rename it to CKCS CAMERA
- 5. That is all there is to it.

Then next time you are unable to attend in person a workshop of interest just click on your desktop icon and once the camera is turned on, you may watch the projector screen LIVE. Adjust your sound accordingly.

While watching, you are encouraged to send an email to ckcslex@gmail.com – include a message with your name. Let us know you are watching and add any comment or suggestion you want.

Not all workshops are broadcast live. That is the decision of the workshop leader.

Time to uninstall Adobe Flash on your Mac?

Engineers scramble to patch vulnerabilities in the software

"The Flash plug-in is notorious for being riddled with security flaws and other shortcomings. Yet it's also one of the most popular pieces of software on the planet. What will it take to kill it?"— TechCentral in Why Adobe Flash Must Die, July 20, 2015

"Things have gotten worse lately as we've learned even more about how insecure Flash can be." — USA Today in How to bid Farewell to Flash, July 20, 2015



"Adobe Flash has come under fire yet again with the discovery of three new security holes that – if left unpatched – pose a big risk to your computer. In response, Mozilla earlier this week blocked Flash by default in its Firefox browser, one day after Facebook's security chief called for Adobe to kill Flash once and for all. Security firms such as Trend Micro recommended disabling Flash." — Standard Examiner in The Case for Disabling Adobe Flash, July 16, 2015

In one single week in mid-July, engineers with Adobe scrambled to patch 20 separate vulnerabilities in the company's Flash software.

It got to the point where security experts were urging desktop and laptop computer users to remove Flash from their machines.

AppleInsider wrote, "Flash has become

such an information security nightmare that

Facebook's Chief Security Office called on Adobe to sunset the platform as soon as possible and ask browser vendors to forcibly kill it off."

AppleInsider provided instructions on how to remove the Adobe Flash plug-in from Macs and even provided a link for the uninstaller.

Britain's Daily Mail wrote, "Leaked documents have revealed the program has a serious vulnerability that lets hackers take over anyone's computer."

The folks at Mozilla went so far as to block every version of Adobe's Flash Player from running in its very popular Firefox browser on Macs, Windows, and Linux systems.



"All versions of Adobe's Flash Player plugin are currently deactivated by default, until Adobe releases an updated version to address known critical security issues," Mozilla wrote on its support page.

These are some of the very reasons that the late Steve Jobs announced more than five years



ago that Adobe Flash would not run on Apple's iPad, iPhone, or iPod touch mobile devices.

In part, he wrote, "Symantec recently highlighted Flash for having one of the worst security records in 2009. We also know first-hand that Flash is the number one reason Macs crash. We have been working with Adobe to fix these problems, but they have persisted for years now. We don't want to reduce the reliability and security of our iPhones, iPods, and iPads by adding Flash."

Instead, Apple's mobile devices use HTML 5, which is built into every modern browser and doesn't require a plug-in.

Macworld's Glenn Fleishman wrote, "What would we lose if we lost Flash? At this point, not much. Jobs was slightly ahead of his time, as he was with all things. But the Internet of 2015 can go Flash—



free overnight–in fact, it mostly has already." He concludes, "No one will mourn Flash. It's already dead."

Brian Krebs wrote in his popular "Krebs on Security" blog, "If you were on the fence about removing or disabling Flash altogether, now would be a great time to reconsider. I recently blogged about my experience doing just that, and found I didn't miss the program much at all after a month without it." He adds, "In almost 30 days, I only ran into just two instances where I encountered a site hosting a video that I absolutely needed to watch and that required Flash

July Tech Night moved to the CKCS parking lot

The weather all day on July 13 had been mostly gloomy with rain off and on. However, it cleared up and dried out just in time for an outside Tech Night presentation all about drones. First, Jaime Simpson, the owner of Compu-Tech Solutions, began with a discussion in the workshop room about the nuisances of the use of drones and the regulations under which they may be used. After a question session, the group moved outside to see the drone fly above the CKCS parking lot.

Members watched as Jaime used a sophisticated remote control which has a TV screen which monitors the high-tech drone camera and a built in GPS which can automatically bring it back to a position near the remote in case it gets out of sight of the operator.

The pictures on this page were taken during the flight.

The drone kept the full attention of all members and may have resulted in a few strained necks.





The view from the drone's camera was recorded on an SD card and after the flight, the group returned to the workshop room to view the drones 'camera- eye view' of the flight.

The amazing thing is that the movie the drone takes is so stable (almost looks like it was on a tripod) even though the drone often automatically



sways adjusting for wind currents.

You may view two versions of the actual drone flight, thanks to the work of two of our talented members.

Mike Sieler took the 12 minute long version of the drone camera video and edited it into four segments (about four minutes total). Click here: http://ldrv.ms/1GGuTv2. This view will only be available until July 31. These videos take several seconds to 'load' so be patient.

Bob Brown put eight minutes of the flight on YouTube, divided into two segments; click here for that view: https://www.youtube.com/channel/UCTzuaNtHSE41GyV28EGZtyQ. The FAA limits drone flights to a maximum of 400 feet. In the FLIGHT 2 video, the drone climbed to an estimated 100 feet for a view of traffic on Nicholasville Road and many parked autos on the Don Jacob's lot.



If you like Windows 7, you'll LOVE Windows 10

The familiar Windows Desktop is back, only better.

These are **my** Windows 10 screens. I have been using Windows 10 Beta since October 1, 2014. Most of us will receive the **Windows 10 Home** version. **Your** Windows 10 Desktop will look like this only it will have **your icons** on the Windows Desktop and **your icons** in the Taskbar. It will be very familiar to you and so user friendly.


In the Taskbar you will have 2 or 3 new icons which will make computing must faster and easier. 1. On the bottom left is a microphone icon. Click on it and type in the Search Box or ask Cortana a question. The next icon is called Task View and will show Apps that are open.



Windows 10 has a Desktop Screen, just like Windows 7 – only better. Windows 10 can boot straight to the desktop.



Internet Explorer is taking a backseat to a new Web browser **EDGE**, **which is faster than a speeding bullet**. You can talk to Microsoft's Siri-like **Cortana voice** assistant and she talks back. If you ask her, "Who is your daddy?" she may answer, "Bill Gates".



This is **Windows 10 Start Screen**. It has a list of your most used apps, most visited folders and recently added software. If this list is not there, click on the 4 lines at the top left.

Bottom left, click on the four lines or All apps and you will see all your apps in a single list. Right click an App and select Pin to Taskbar, Pin to Start.

To toggle between the Windows Desktop Screen and the Start Screen, hit the Window key on the Keyboard or left click the Start button on the left side of the Taskbar. You might notice that both screens have the Taskbar.

You can still use your old programs like Windows Live Mail, Photo Gallery, Quicken, Word, and so on just like always.

Microsoft will automatically send out the latest fixes and updates to users throughout the month and not just on Tuesdays.

When you first download Windows 10, do a Windows update.

Windows 10 will receive security fixes for ten years.

The photos are on exhibit at the Senior Citizens' Center on Alumni Drive.



Backup! Backup! Always backup!


About two weeks ago, I chose to download to my Lexington computer a program from the Internet that I have used before on another computer I own in another city. As is my custom, I always try to be careful to study the source to be sure I am downloading only the program I want and not an attached program I do not want. Although I was careful, I managed to download a malware called **RANSOMWARE**.

This is embarrassing to admit because I sort of consider myself an experienced computer user and not one to make a mistake like that. After all, I have been working with computers for at least 30 years. (I had to do a bit of research to confirm it has actually been at least 30 years.)

My first thought was that I might be in real trouble because from the earliest days I have used my computer to do and to track my banking, plus I have hundreds of files I used to teach word processing and also six years of issues of the CKCS monthly newsletter I have produced for online.

Ransomware is a malware program that takes over your computer and encrypts every file therein (all documents, all pictures, spreadsheets, financial stuff, etc.) so you can't open or access them. When I realized what was happening, I tried unsuccessfully to stop that download but I was too late so that became mistake No.1.

In my case I got a blue screen. The blue screen kept me from accessing anything and suggested that I should call a number for Microsoft to get assistance. I did that – that was mistake No. 2. The

woman I spoke with I am confident had no relationship with Microsoft but was part of the team working with the creators of the ransomware program. She explained that the files could not be unlocked – there was no solution and I needed to call another number she provided where they would be able to 'unlock' the files providing I send a check - (no credit cards). She said she thought the charge was either \$249 or maybe she said \$299, I don't recall which. Anyway, I had no intention of calling that second number.

Even in the earliest days of my computer experience, everyone learned quickly the importance of backing up computer data

because back then, computers would often just 'crash' with no good reason at all, and whatever you were working on would be lost.

Now-a-days the importance of backing up your data is not so much for crashes but because of the evil 'hackers' out there that are out to steal your data and damage your computer with a virus or worse. Sometimes, just to show that they can do it. The backup program I have used for several years, which I strongly recommend, is **ACRONIS TRUE IMAGE**.

The bright side of this story, I didn't have to pay money to anyone. Why? BECAUSE USING ACRONIS, I HAD A COMPLETE BACKUP OF ALL MY FILES, INCLUDING THE PROGRAMS. I backup to a portable hard drive which I store safely in a fireproof file box.

Not being totally familiar with how to use the restore feature of Acronis worked, I went to KyTrade and Freddy spent some time with me to simply restore my 'C' drive using my Acronis backup. I learned Kentucky Trade uses Acronis all the time. I thought I had to reformat the drive first, but found that was not necessary. So it was basically simple and we were successful in restoring my files. There was one problem – my last backup I had was almost 60 days old (that was mistake No. 3) but my hat is off to Freddy as he was able to capture separately even those recent 'encrypted' files, so actually I lost nothing.

Freddy did offer a suggestion which I liked. He suggested that I install a second hard drive on my computer and schedule Acronis to do <u>automatic backups</u> every week on Mondays and also do a complete backup once a month on the first day of each month – all in the background. I accepted his suggestion so I now have a new alternate drive (one terabyte) just for that purpose. Yes, that alternate drive is in the computer and could be affected just like the main drive if attacked again but perhaps not. If that alternate drive is not involved in an attack those backups would likely be more current, since backups are done on a regular basis and automatically.

Regardless, using my Acronis, I still periodically do a separate backup on the portable drive I store in the fireproof file box. That fireproof box travels with me when I am out of town for any length of time to use a computer I have in another city.

So I had a favorable outcome – but ONLY because I had a full backup. It would have been nice if it had been a more recent backup.

The moral of this story is BACKUP YOUR COMPUTER REGULARLY. If you don't own a copy of Acronis, my recommendation is get one and use it. At KyTrade, the latest 2015 version of Acronis sells for about \$45 for one PC (one license) and \$95 for three licenses. If you show your CKCS membership card, you get a 5 percent discount. JUST DO IT! BACKUP, BACKUP, ALWAYS BACKUP!



A FOOTNOTE: In my research for this article, to determine how long I had been working with computers, I ran across the fact that in 1990 I purchased a laptop that operated at a laughably slow speed, it had just a 48 MB hard drive and very little ram compared to those available today. That laptop was identified as a Compaq LTE286. I don't know what LTE stood for but it certainly did not mean light because that unit must have weighed 7 or 8 pounds – it seemed a lot more than that – and worse, I paid right at \$4,000 for it, (that is \$7,300 in 2015 dollars). I remember that several years later I tried to sell it for almost nothing and could not even find a taker. I ended up throwing it into the trash – it didn't even get a chance to become a good doorstop!

(an instructional video for a home gym that I could find nowhere else, and a live-streamed legislative hearing). For these, I opted to cheat and load the content into a Flash-enabled browser inside of a Linux virtual machine I have running inside of VirtualBox. In hindsight, it probably would have been easier simply to temporarily re-enable Flash in Chrome, and then disable it again until the need arose."

If you simply cannot live without Flash on your Mac, AppleInsider recommends using Google's Chrome browser for Mac since it uses a special version of Flash that runs inside a sandbox. Updates for that version of Flash are delivered by Google.

Another possibility is the Safari plug-in ClickToFlash which forces the user to click on a Flash video to activate it.

AppleInsider adds, "If you insist on keeping Flash installed and won't use ClickToFlash, at the very least make sure Flash can update itself automatically by enabling automatic updates in System Preferences —> Flash Player. Then perhaps you should take a long, hard look at your life choices."

For the record, I have uninstalled all copies of Adobe Flash from my Macs.

Apple introduces new iPod touch models iPod nano and shuffle also refreshed

People often ask me why I don't own an iPhone. The answer is simple. I don't want to pay the

expensive monthly fees to use the phone in addition to additional expensive monthly fees to use the data portion (email, web browser, weather apps, etc.)

Instead, I own an iPod touch.



It has been compared to Apple's iPhone – without the phone.

With an iPod touch, you need a WiFi connection to use the Internet. There's no Verizon, AT&T, T–Mobile, Sprint or other cellular service available.

If an app works on the iPhone, there's a pretty good chance that same app will work on the iPod touch (as long as it's not an app connected to the phone portion of the iPhone.)

With that in mind, Apple has just updated its iPod touch (and introduced new iPod nanos and shuffles also).

In addition to new colors, the sixth–generation iPod touch sports a 64-bit A8 chip (the same chip as the iPhone 6), an M8 motion coprocessor for fitness tracking, an improved 8-megapixel rear camera, a bigger battery, more storage available (up to 128 GB through the Apple Store), and double the RAM (1 GB – same as in the iPhone 6.)

Apple offers new colors for the iPod nano and iPod shuffle. The specs in both of these iPods remain the same as before.


Microsoft updates Office for Mac Office 2016 for Mac first overhaul in 5 years

Redesigned and rewritten versions of Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Outlook and OneNote for Mac users

are now available in a new version of Office for Mac—for those with an active Office 365 subscription (which costs \$9.99 a month for the Office 365 Home version.)

A separate, standalone version of Office 2016 for Mac will be available in September.

Office 365 is Microsoft's brand



of software subscriptions connected to the company's cloud storage service known as OneDrive.

Pricing for the standalone version of Office 2016 for Mac hasn't been released.

Microsoft's corporate vice—president for the Office Client Applications and Services team, Kirk Koenigsbauer, made the announcement in early July on the company's Office blog: "Today we are taking a big step forward for Mac users—Office 2016 for Mac is now available in 139 countries and 16 languages. Based on feedback from the great Office community, we've made major updates to each of the apps, and we couldn't be more pleased to deliver it first to our Office 365 customers."

A mid—July review by Mac News Network provides an overview of one of the most used Mac Office apps—Word. "If you have to use Microsoft Word at work, go get this now and be delighted with it. If you don't have to, if you're looking for a great word processor, it's just a little harder to recommend Word quite so readily. It's harder, and it's also very unfair, as 30 years of using various versions of Word have left us with biases against it. Word earned those biases, it's just difficult to think about going back to relying on it, even though Microsoft Word 2016 is the best and the shiniest version ever."



Ed Bott. who writes for ZDNet. says, "Mac users have always been an important market for Microsoft, especially in the early days of



Office. Excel, after all, was one of the original killer apps for the Macintosh, and it's about to celebrate its 30th birthday. Excel for the Macintosh debuted on September 30, 1985, nearly two years ahead of Excel for Windows. That might have been the last time an Office for Mac program was arguably better than its Windows countertop. In recent years, Office for Windows has been the one that gets all the resources and all the new features first, with the Mac version typically behind by at least a year...With Office 2016 for Mac, available for Office 365 customers today, Microsoft has finally turned the tables. This version of Office for the Mac is arguably an improvement over its Windows counterpart, at least in some measures."

While Bott has had issues in the past with Office for Mac, he says this about the new Office 2016 for Mac version: "I haven't run screaming from this version of Office-far from it. Instead, the entire experience feels familiar and...productive."
