
Annual Picnic and Business Meeting set for Monday, June 13, at 6 p.m.

Plan to attend this annual event. We always have a great time. It is an opportunity to meet and socialize with other CKCS members and, of course, it is important to participate in the election.



Project Revitalization




TECH TALK

I subscribe to several computer magazines in order to keep up with our changing computer world. Also I scan the Internet seeking a solution to a problem I have, or one of our members has, and asks me for help.

On the Internet recently I ran across an article from the Malwarebytes Labs website. It answers many of the questions members ask me about on a regular basis. It is important enough that I have reproduced a portion of that article here. At the bottom is a link to the entire article on the Malwarebytes website.

By the way, I am a strong believer in using the Malwarebytes free program in conjunction with whatever anti-virus program you have. In fact, I pay extra for the PRO version of Malwarebytes because I think it is worth it. The article follows:



How to tell if you're infected with malware

Picture this: you start your computer and wait. And wait some more. When your desktop finally shows its face, things don't get any better. Your Internet is sluggish, your programs are taking forever to load, and your cursor is dragging 20 seconds behind your mouse. You might have tried to open too many programs at once. Or...

You might be infected.

Sometimes a malware infection is plain as day. Other times it's a silent killer. If you want to know whether or not your machine is sick, you first need to understand the symptoms. So let's take a look at the telltale signs.

Blatant signs of infection

You've got ransomware

This one's the most obvious. Ransomware authors want to make it perfectly clear that you have a malware infection—that's how they make their money. If you've got ransomware, you'll get a pop-up that tells you your files have been encrypted and there's a deadline to pay a ransom in order to get them back.

Browser redirects

You click on a link after doing a Google search on "my computer's acting strange." Link opens to a different page. You head back to your search results and try a different link. Same thing happens. Over and over you're redirected to a different site from the one you're trying to reach. That, my friend, is a malware infection.

Different home page

Say you set your home page to be your favorite sports news site. But for some reason, Yahoo.com keeps coming up. You also notice some new toolbars (rows of selectable icons) below your browser window that you can't get rid of. You could either have a major case of the forgets, or, more likely, you've got an infection.

Bombarded with pop-ups

We're talking: can't escape. Close one, another one opens. Or you're not even online, and you're getting pop-up messages on your system. Some sites admittedly have terrible ad experiences that feel like something nefarious is going on (but really isn't). Most of the time, if your screen is loaded with pop-ups, you're looking at an adware or spyware infection

Less obvious signs of infection*


Computer running slow
New, unfamiliar icons on desktop
Constant crashing
Web browser freezes or is unresponsive
Lots of bounced email

The most reliable hard drives?

BackBlaze survey shows one manufacturer outperforms all others

"BackBlaze's annual survey of a large sample of drives has come to represent a way for consumers to discern which brand and what model to buy."

— Gordon Mah Ung, executive editor of PCWorld, writes in Macworld: Who makes the most reliable hard drive? Latest BackBlaze survey claims to know. May 17

"It doesn't seem too churlish to suggest that self-builders and home users should probably take a good hard look at the HGST drives as their track record is so strong."

— Peter Bright, Ars Technica, HGST hard drives still super reliable, Seagates have greatly improved

61,590 spinning hard drives operating for more than one-billion hours.

That's a heckuva lot of use. The online backup company, BackBlaze, has been using all those hard drives to securely back up customers' data.

So it should know about which hard drives are reliable and which aren't.

The overall winner? Hitachi (Hitachi Global Storage Technologies), which has about a one percent failure rate over the last three BackBlaze surveys.

One Billion Drive Hours and Counting: Q1 2016 Hard Drive Stats

May 17th, 2016



For Q1 2016 we are reporting on 61,590 operational hard drives used to store encrypted customer data in our data center. There are 9.5% more hard drives in this review versus our last review when we evaluated 56,224 drives. In Q1 2016, the hard drives in our data center, past and present, totaled over one billion hours in operation to date. That's nearly 42 million days or 114,155 years worth of spinning hard drives. Let's take a look at what these hard drives have been up to.

The BackBlaze blog detailing its hard drive reliability stats



We need to add that Seagate has greatly improved its record.

You might remember that BackBlaze's 2015 survey that tracked hard drives for a year revealed Seagate drives failed at a far higher rate than other brands: 10.68 percent failure rate. (An alarmingly high rate for hard drives to stop spinning and die.)

The latest survey reveals much improved results – Seagate's failure rate dropped to 3.48 percent on a total of 36,863 Seagate hard drives utilized by BackBlaze.

You might remember back in 2011, Apple replaced 1 TB Seagate hard drives in specific 21.5—inch and 27—inch iMac models. The hard drive replacement program was targeting those iMacs because Apple determined the hard drives could fail under certain circumstances.

In a later replacement program for iMacs sold between Dec. 2012 and Sept. 2013, Apple replaced 3 TB hard drives.

What I found most interesting is this: The weakest performance in the latest BackBlaze survey are hard drives made by Western Digital. The strongest performing hard drives are made by Western Digital subsidiary HGST (Hitachi Global Storage Technologies.) I could find no explanation.

While you weren't looking, Firefox browser tops Microsoft browser share

Raise your hand if you use the Firefox web browser. It turns out a lot more of us are using it than earlier thought.

Firefox has now surpassed Internet Explorer and Edge browsers in terms of total users across the world. While Google's Chrome browser is No.1 by a wide margin, Mozilla's Firefox browser took 15.6 percent of all worldwide desktop user browsing in April, reports StatCounter.

StatCounter analyzes which web browsers are used to view three—million different web sites and then crunches the numbers.

Google's Chrome browser has nothing to fear, though. As Ars technica reported in mid–May,



May Tech Night featured the Surface Pro 4 ... "The Tablet That Can Replace Your Laptop"

If you didn't attend the May Tech Night presentation on May 9, you missed a terrific program!



Attendance was sparse probably because a heavy summer storm hit the area just an hour before the program's 7 p.m. scheduled start; however, the rain did subside about 30 minutes beforehand. About 20 braved the weather to attend.

Summit Patel, the business manager for the Microsoft Store in Fayette Mall, was our guest presenter. He gave a fast moving, free flowing presentation covering the new Surface Pro 4 computer/ tablet/ laptop and the latest version of Windows 10.

Summit (in picture at left) connected the Surface Pro wirelessly to the CKCS projector and put the tablet through its paces to show the high points of the current Windows 10 operating system using just the Surface Pen which comes with the unit. He did bring a keyboard which magnetically attaches to the unit making it look

more like a full-fledged laptop.

The computer/tablet used for demonstration had an i5 processor and 8GB of RAM and handled the demonstration efficiently and was fast. The computer/tablet and the pen were passed among all in attendance to get the feel of the devices.

The magnetically attached keyboard, which also serves as a protective cover, is available as a separate purchase. The Surface Pro also has a convenient 'kickstand' built-in, which is particularly useful when used as a laptop.

Microsoft offers an 'essential bundle' which include the type cover, and extended service plan for two years, an Office 365 package and more.

Summit said he enjoyed the time with our group and offered to return another time to discuss antivirus and other programs Microsoft offers.

The Surface Pro 4 has an 8 megapixel camera which Summet Patel used to take a photo of the group and then displayed that on the projector screen. Pictures taken on the tablet was automatically synchronized to his smart phone. He suggested using Microsoft Outlook on both the tablet and phone to also synchronize mail, calendar, photos and music to all your devices.

Low Self Esteem Support Group will meet Thursday at 7 P.M. Please use the back door.





"However, neither browser (Internet Explorer or Edge) threatens the market leader —Google's Chrome continues to command two–thirds of the market."

People are passionate about the web browsers they use.

As someone who calls himself or herself "Bikkelz" responding to the Ars Technica article:

"Most browsers are pretty good nowadays, Edge is actually technically a very good browser. I prefer Vivaldi, Firefox and Safari for privacy and/or battery usage reasons. Chrome belongs to the Google juggernaut, if you don't want to be tracked across all devices you own it loses a lot of appeal. I use Safari on every Apple device, Firefox on anything else."

As you might suspect, Safari is by far the most–used browser on Apple products, including Mac computers, iPads, iPhones and iPod touch devices.

Studies have shown that, overall, Safari is faster on Macs than other browsers, although Firefox is my "go to" browser on the Mac because, at least on my machines, it loads faster and is much more responsive. Go figure. When it comes to browsers, the old adage definitely is true: Your mileage may vary.

On my iPad and iPod touch, Safari is by far my most used browser. It seems to be much peppier on those Apple devices than the iOS version of Firefox (although I do have Firefox installed on Apple's mobile devices.)

Google Chrome ends support for older versions of OS X Firefox to end support for OS X 10.6, 10.7 and 10.8 in August

Running Snow Leopard? How about Lion or Mountain Lion? If you're using an older Mac running those legacy versions of the Mac operating system, you'll have to find a different web



browser than Google's Chrome. Google has announced that it will no longer support OS X 10.6, 10.7, or 10.8.



As the tech web site Ars technica writes, "If you're still using one of those operating systems, you have a couple of options. One is to upgrade to a newer OS, assuming your hardware can handle it...Your second option is to switch browsers, some of which still support these legacy operating systems."

In addition, Mozilla, the developer of Firefox, used by millions of Mac users, has announced beginning this summer, it will stop supporting these old versions of OS X: Snow Leopard, Lion and Mountain Lion. (Mac–savvy computer users know that these are Apple's code names for OS X 10.6, 10.7, and 10.8.)

VentureBeat writes, "Mozilla correctly notes that "all three of these versions are no longer supported by Apple" and that "unsupported operating systems receive no security updates, have known exploits, and are dangerous for you to use." If you want to continue getting Firefox updates, the company thus recommends upgrading your Mac."

So while you might be running an old version of OS X on an older Mac, it might not be wise. As the earlier paragraph points out, Apple has not updated these operating systems and are "dangerous for you to use." I definitely would not pay bills electronically, conduct online banking, or perform other security conscious tasks using one of those older versions of OS X.

In case you're wondering, VentureBeat points out that those three older versions of the Mac operating system have a combined market share of 0.83 percent. So while millions more Mac users are running OS X 10.11 (El Capitan, the latest version of OS X), 10.10 (Yosemite), or 10.9 (Mavericks), there are still folks out there actively using old versions of OS X.

We're Number Four! Apple TV is fourth most popular streaming media player

Quick. Name the best–selling streaming media player hooked up to more TV sets in the U.S. than any other. Amazon Fire? Google Chromecast? Roku?

The answer is Roku.

New numbers from Parks Associates, which studies streaming media player sales, shows Roku beat out Amazon, Google and Apple in 2015 sales.

MacRumors reports, "While Apple TV remains in fourth place among the four major brands, it had the largest increase in unit sales year-over-year, primarily due to its long-awaited new version, launched in 4Q 2015. Its share of sales in 2015 was 50 percent higher than its share in 2014. Amazon also had a substantially higher share of unit sales in 2015."

Apple TV sold 20 percent of all streaming media players during the period from the first quarter of 2015 to the first three months of 2016. Roku sold 30 percent, while Amazon and Google both sold 22 percent of streaming media players during the period.

Parks Associates says Apple trails because it only sells one device while the others sell both both boxes and small sticks. In addition, the three other companies all sell less expensive streaming devices as an option than Apple.

36 percent of all households with broadband Internet now have some type of streaming media player. By 2019, an estimated 86–million streaming media devices are expected to be sold worldwide.

Do you really need Mac anti-virus?

Plenty of Mac users don't run any anti-virus software on their machines. Should they be running some type of software?

Ask Google and the answer is clear. Most tech web sites recommend that Mac users run some kind of anti-virus software.

The British version of Macworld sums it up this way: "Do Macs get viruses? Do Macs need antivirus software? The short answers are yes, and yes but it's a bit more complicated than that."

The article adds: "Macs are more secure - or less insecure at least than their Windows brethren for two reasons. On the technical



side, OS X is a Unix-based operating system. As a Unix-based operating system OS X is sandboxed. It's like having a series of fire doors - even if malware gains access to your Mac, it is unable to spread to the heart of the machine. Macs are not unhackable, but they are more difficult to exploit than Windows PCs."

The chances of your Mac becoming infected by a Mac virus are slim.

The real issue here is Windows viruses which have no impact on your Mac should your machine come in contact with one.

But you could accidentally spread a Windows virus to a Windows user and infect their machine. To me, it's similar to a parent who never comes down with strep throat but can spread the illness to his or her child.

My favorite Mac anti-virus happens to be free – it's called Avira – and it's from Germany. Some web sites say that Avira can slow down the Mac as it's running in the background but I've never noticed any impact.

Note that any Mac anti-virus app you install on your machine should be downloaded from the software developer's web site and not from the Mac App Store. Because of the way Apple controls its App Stores, fully functional anti-virus software that works in real-time is not available from the Mac App Store.

When your bank breaks its own Web site with a needless update

I've done business with a certain large bank based in New York City for many years. You've no doubt heard the name. You'd recognize it immediately. I don't use the bank's checking or savings accounts. I don't use its ATM cards. But I do use its credit card.

For more than two decades, I've used the bank's credit card to make purchases. Then I pay off the balance every month using the bank's Web site. It's free, convenient, and easy...until now.

And, for me, it's broken.

In early May, the bank altered the appearance of its Web site.

I'm not talking about security updates. Those are done constantly updated without the user ever noticing it. Every Web browser uses what are called security certificates to make sure you connect securely to a Web site that requires it. This is to keep prying eyes at bay when you make purchases, bank online, comb your medical records, or perform other activity which demands a secure connection.

What I'm talking about is a Web site redesign. The appearance is altered. It looks different. And, for me, it's broken.

I can no longer pay my credit card online using the bank's Web site. Multiple times, I've tried using Safari, Firefox and Google's Chrome browser to transfer funds from a checking account to pay off the credit card. Immediately after the bank re—designed its Web pages, Chrome worked. Now even that browser doesn't work. (Neither the latest versions of Safari or Firefox have ever allowed me to pay my credit card after the bank's Web page re—design.)

I first called the bank's customer service hotline three weeks ago to report the problem (Your call is important to us.) When I noticed the browsers were still not working properly the next week, I called again. Then I used the bank's "live chat" option to report the problems yet again. As I write this, I have called yet again to report the problem. It's still not resolved.

After speaking with an initial customer service rep, I get booted up to a tech support chap named "Sam," who seems to understand my problem since he says he's heard it from others. I suspect the problem lies in the Javascript coding of the bank's payment page.

I tell him again that I am unable to pay my credit card using Safari, Firefox or Chrome on a Mac running OS X El Capitan. He asks me which version of El Capitan I'm using. (Finally, in my mind, he's asking the right questions.)



I tell him I installed the latest update (10.11.5) just a few weeks ago. He tells me that it was probably about the time that Apple issued an update for his iPhone. I tell him, that's exactly right. Apple normally issues operating system updates for both its mobile devices and the Mac on the same day.

I tell him that the credit card payment page correctly shows my checking account details where it's supposed to, but a calendar allowing me to choose when I want to pay the bill and fields further down the page asking for a routing number and checking account number are blank. I am not able to type in numbers because these are supposed to be autofilled without human intervention.

He asks me twice if the calendar appears on the page. I tell him no, it's just white space. I ask him if the bank uses Adobe Flash which I've deleted from my Macs. He tells me yes. I think to myself, "Yipes, that's a potential security threat because Flash is the Swiss cheese of Internet security." I do run Flash as a Chrome plug—in, but it's no longer installed in the Mac's System Preferences. Chrome uses a special, "sandboxed" version of Flash which is supposed to be more secure than a system—wide installation.

I also tell "Sam" that I have never been able to use the "Pay My Credit Card" function with either Safari or Firefox after the bank screwed—up, um, I mean, re—designed its Web pages.

I make sure he knows which version of Chrome I'm using since that's the browser which allowed me to pay my credit card initially but is now broken. "Sam" offers to help me pay my credit card balance over the phone since I cannot get any browser to work as its supposed to with the newly re—designed bank Web site.

I ask him if I could use the bank's mobile app on my iPad to bill off my credit card and he tells me that seems to work fine. Maybe I should go that route?

The point of all this? Why oh why does one of the largest banks in the land put its customers through such needless headaches?

Why was the bank's Web site appearance updated when it functioned perfectly for years and is now broken?

Folks, this is not progress. This is not an improvement. This is madness.

Does the bank's management at the upper levels have a clue? Do they even care?

I'll keep you posted. Stay tuned.

Siri Might be Coming to the Mac

Apple–oriented Web site, MacRumors, reported in late May that Siri might just be coming to the Mac with the next version of OS X – due to be released probably sometime this fall.

"Rumors have indicated Siri integration will be one of the key features coming in OS X 10.12," writes the Web site. "In the menu bar, there's a simple Siri black and white icon that features



the word "Siri" surrounded by a box, while the full dock icon is more colorful and features a colorful Siri waveform in the style of other built—in app icons. Clicking on either of the icons

brings up a Siri waveform to give users a visual cue that the virtual assistant is listening for commands, much like on iOS devices when the Home button is held down," adds MacRumors.

The article adds that Siri integration in the Mac is still in the early stages,

but it would appear that the personal assistant would be able to answer many of the same queries and complete many of the same duties that it does on Apple's mobile devices. "Opening apps, conducting web searches, controlling HomeKit, sending text messages, reading emails, setting calendar events, and more," reports the Web site.

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
