Workshop & Seminar Descriptions

File Management Class Description

Have you ever saved a file on your computer only to find out later that you could not remember where you put it and could not find it after searching for it? Then this class is designed for you. We will give you a deeper understanding of how to organize your documents and photos so that they are easier to retrieve. We will also assist you in organizing your own computer files. **Flash drive required (also called USB or Thumb drive)**. This course will use the Microsoft Windows 10 operating system.

Photoshop Elements Workshop -Quick & Easy Ways to Enhance Your Photos

We will cover basic digital improvements or enhancements that can be made to your photos before printing using Photoshop Elements. These will include cropping, adjusting, lighting and color, color cast, adjusting skin tone, red eye removal, straightening, spot healing, etc.

A flash drive is required. It will be used to download the Instructor's handouts and sample photos.



Photography – Shooting Up Close*

Learn to take photos of the world with close up photography. Use your camera to see and record very close up views of your everyday surroundings. You do not need to spend a lot of money on expensive lens.

Secrets of the iPhone*

Learn important (and hidden) functions of your iPhone. Learn how to download apps, move them, nest them and delete them. Learn how to get better photos with your phone, organize your pictures, and send them in text and emails. Texting messages and using Siri will also be covered. Participants should bring their iPhone passcode and their Apple password to access the App store.

FastStone Photo Manipulation Class

Do you want to fix up and work on your pictures without paying a lot of \$\$\$\$\$ on a digital imaging program? Well, take a look at **FastStone** which is a fairly extensive digital imaging program that is free and does lots of stuff. In this workshop, you will learn how to dress up your pictures, crop, brighten or darken, create contact sheets, create a slide show that can include music and lots more. We will show you how to download the program along with a great syllabus.

Secrets of your iPad*

Learn key information about many preinstalled apps on your iPad. Important functions in settings, how to arrange, nest, download and delete apps, sending email and texts will be covered. Taking better photos, making folders and sending them will be demonstrated. FaceTime will be included if time permits. Participants should bring their iPad passcode and their Apple password to access the App store.

* These seminars meet in the main room and their enrollment size is determined by the instructor. The workshops meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.

Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (this is at the discretion of the instructor). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.

Course Descriptions

Excel... Learn the basic tools of this popular spreadsheet program—layout configuration; data type formatting; numerical calculations; fill tool to copy formulas; set the print area; links, charts, and format painter; freeze rows/columns, data sort, and auto-filter. Prerequisites: Computer Basics, Beyond Basics or equivalent experience.



Intermediate iPad*...If you want to get more out of your iPad, this is your course. Learn what's beyond the basic use of the iPad. This class is designed for the iPad user who's comfortable with basics of the iPad screen, multi-touch gestures, the home button, and the iOS basics , the operating system powering your iPad.

Windows 10...Learn how to navigate in Microsoft's new operating system, add new apps as well as use them. Anyone taking this class should have a prior working knowledge of a Windows operating system.

Adventures in Photography*... This class will alternate between presenting photographic techniques in a classroom setting, then practicing the discussed techniques in the field. During field practice, the instructors will be working with every student to implement the techniques covered in the classroom.

Getting the Most Out of Your iPhone*. Learn how to use the Apple iPhone. Beginning with basic features: receiving and making calls, adding entries to your contacts list, receiving and sending text messages, reading your email, taking photos and more. Then, learn how to use the preinstalled applications that come with your phone.

PaintShop Pro Advanced Digital Imaging/ Independent Work...Students will build on tools they learned in the beginning class. They will also learn how to use layers, create collages, restore old photos, straighten images, perspective correction. Students can bring projects that they want to work on with guidance and assistance from the instructors. Students may be working on their own pictures, restoring old photographs, working with templates, making brochures and business cards or other projects.

Getting the Most Out of your iPad*... Learn how to use the built-in Apple apps on your iPad. Personalize and organize your apps, take better photos and organize them. Acquire information about settings, using the keyboard, emailing and texting. Get tips on using the calendar, notes, reminders, and iBooks.

Computer Basics... Learn the fundamentals of using a Windows 10 computer. Learn to use various aspects of the Microsoft Word Processing program, including manipulating text and inserting graphics into a document. Basic filing and basic file management are introduced. The final class of this course deals with the basics of email and use of the internet.

macOS Sierra Tips & Tricks... Apple's newest operating system for its Mac computer is called macOS Sierra. This class is designed to show you the tips you could be using to save you valuable time and effort. Whether it's using the web, email, Apple's Pages or Numbers apps, or the operating system, you could be getting more out of your Mac by using these tips and tricks. We'll show you how.

Making Note Cards With Microsoft Word... Learn how to make your own ORIGINAL note cards using Microsoft Word! You will be taught how to set up a note card page, add graphics and/or photos, how to make sets of note cards or individual cards and how to file them for future use. This is an opportunity to engage your imagination and have a fun time. Card stock will be provided by the instructor. Each student should bring a personal thumb drive loaded with photos to be used to create her/his personal note cards

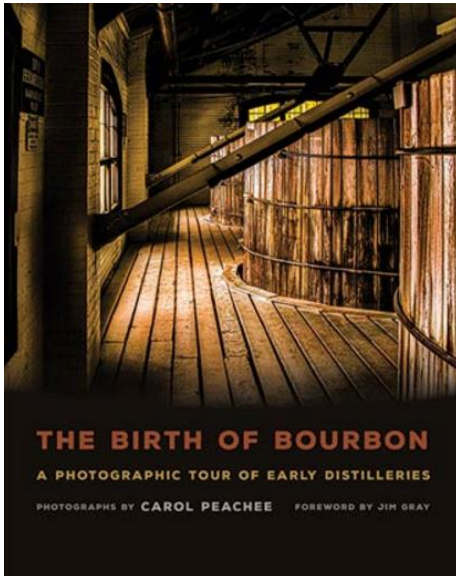
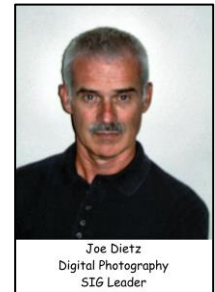

On April 25 we have a guest speaker – photographer and bourbon enthusiast Carol Peachee. Carol will talk to us about her adventures in photography and old abandoned distilleries. From Carol’s webpage; In “***The Birth of Bourbon***”, award-winning photographer Carol Peachee takes readers on an unforgettable tour of lost distilleries as well as facilities undergoing renewal, such as the famous Old Taylor and James E. Pepper distilleries in Lexington, Kentucky. This beautiful book also includes spaces that well-known brands, including Maker’s Mark, Woodford Reserve, Four Roses and Buffalo Trace, have preserved

as homage to their rich histories. Using a technique known as high-dynamic-range imaging – a process that produces rich saturation, intensely clarified details and a full spectrum of light, Peachee reveals the vibrant life lingering in artifacts from worn cypress fermenting tubs to extravagant copper stills. This lavish celebration of bourbon’s heritage will delight whiskey aficionados, history buffs and art lovers alike.” Carol will have a slide show and will talk about her book – *The Birth of Bourbon* published in 2015 by University Press of KY.

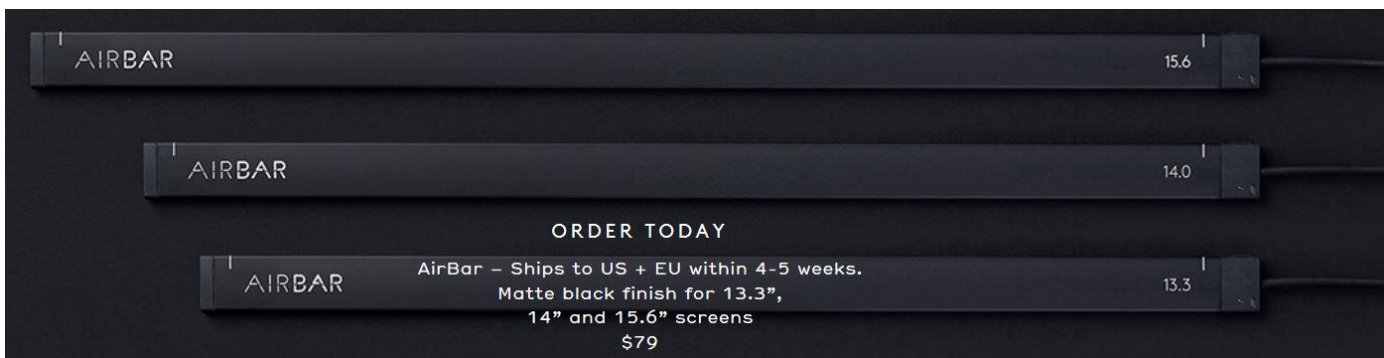
COMPUTER TIP: Do you wish you had a touch screen model laptop?

From FedEx: We have received reports of fraudulent emails with the subject line "FedEx: Delivery Problems Notification." These emails can contain links which, when clicked, will connect the user to a site which then infects their computer.

These links can point to any number of infected websites all over the globe. Some of these sites may look like fedex.com, while others do not.

If you receive a message matching the description below, do not open the email or click on the hyperlink. Delete the email immediately or forward it to abuse@fedex.com.

FedEx does not send unsolicited emails to customers requesting information regarding packages, invoices, account numbers, passwords or personal information.

The best tech support in the business?

Laptop Mag's Tech Support Showdown pits Apple against nine other firms

When it comes to tech support, a [showdown](#) pitting Apple against nine other high tech companies puts the company in the top spot.

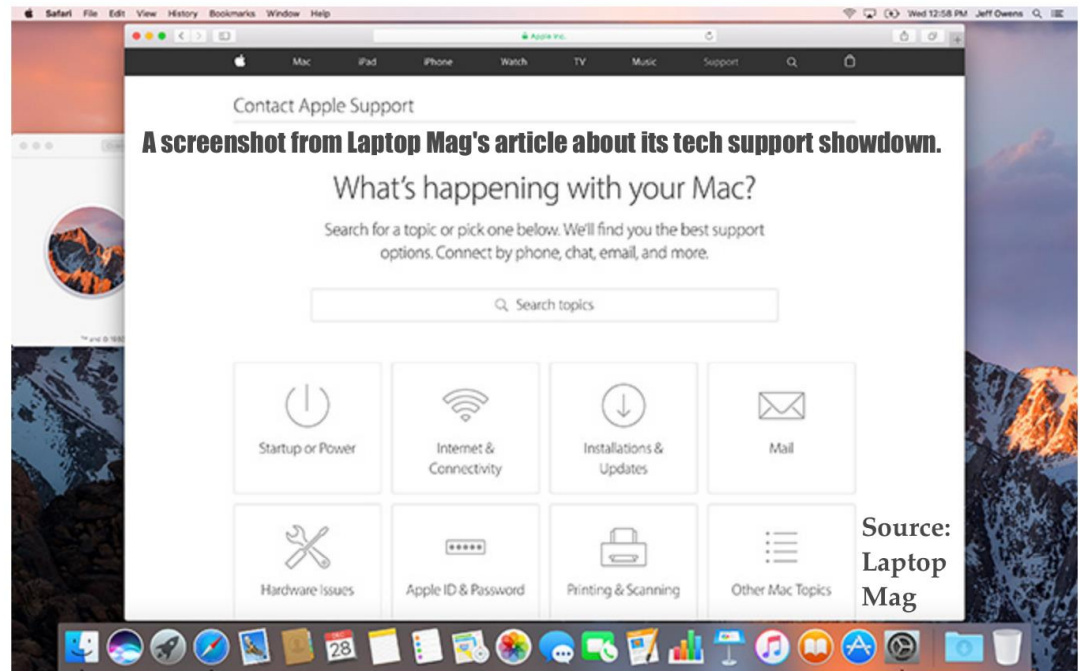
Laptop Mag praised Apple as giving “the best tech support in the business” for the third straight year.

As MacRumors reports, the magazine “sent reporters undercover to make calls, query support chat online, and ask questions on social media, and accumulated data on the following top ten notebook makers:

- Apple
- Acer
- Lenovo
- Microsoft
- HP
- Dell
- Razer
- Asus
- Samsung
- MSI

Web Support

After searching "How do I undo moving my Documents and Desktop to iCloud?" on Apple's support web page, I found a page that explained how to use iCloud to store the contents of these directories, but no explicit instructions for undoing this change. I figured out how to reverse this step by going through the process listed and unchecking the Desktop and Documents box.



Each company was given a grade on a 100–point scale, and Laptop Mag weighed 60 points toward online support and 40 points toward phone support.”
Out of 100 possible points, Apple scored 93.



Acer came in second with 88, and Lenovo in third place with 86 points.

Here's how the other notebook makers fared:

- Microsoft – 82 points
- HP – 80
- Dell – 76
- Razer – 74
- Asus – 72
- Samsung – 67
- MSI – 63

On the average, it took Apple's phone tech support reps six minutes per call to provide answers – one minute less than last year.

Acer actually beat Apple by one point in phone support, but Apple's web support score was unrivaled.

“Ultimately, Laptop Mag noted that while the customer service reps might have a few spots of incorrect knowledge about Apple's software and hardware, they still “provided solutions in a speedy and positive manner,” writes MacRumors.

“Despite a couple of snags, Apple still offers the best and most comprehensive support of all the laptop-makers we reviewed in this Tech Support Showdown,” reports the Laptop Mag item.

Spring Cleaning

STARTUP:

Right click an empty space on the Taskbar, click Task Manager, at the bottom of this window, click on More details. At the top, click **Startup**. Notice on my startup screen shown below, I have only one item enabled. Any of the others I only start when needed.

Like a car, you don't start with the radio on, heater on, blinkers on, windshield wipers etc. turned on. You start them when needed.

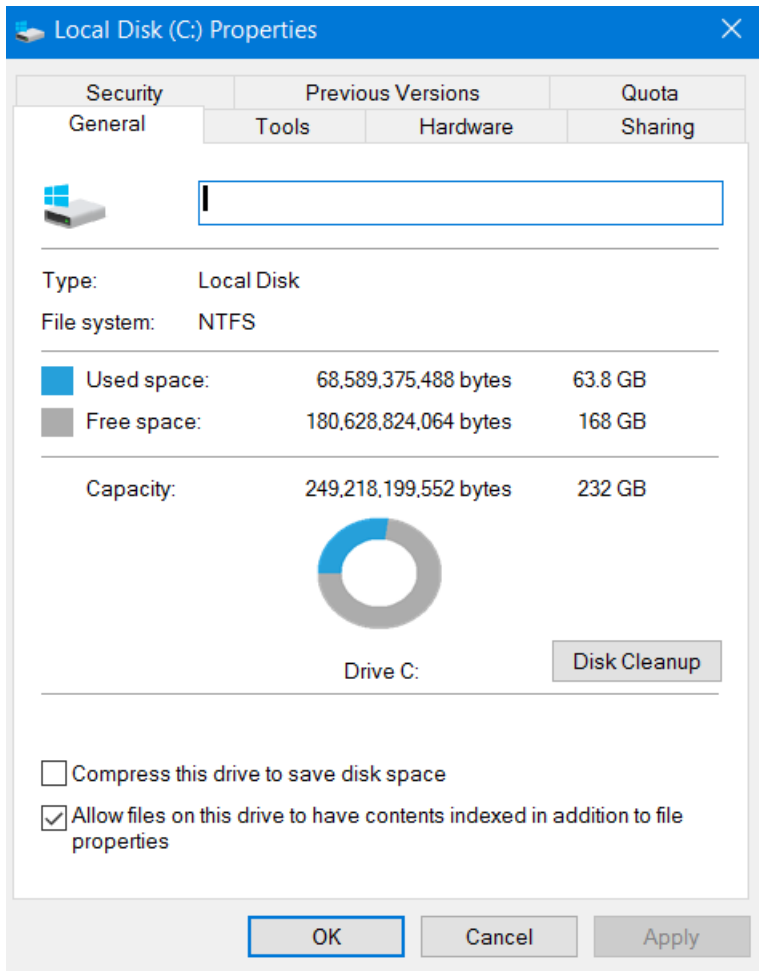
If you have most of these enabled, they start up when you start your computer and they slow your system down and use valuable resources.

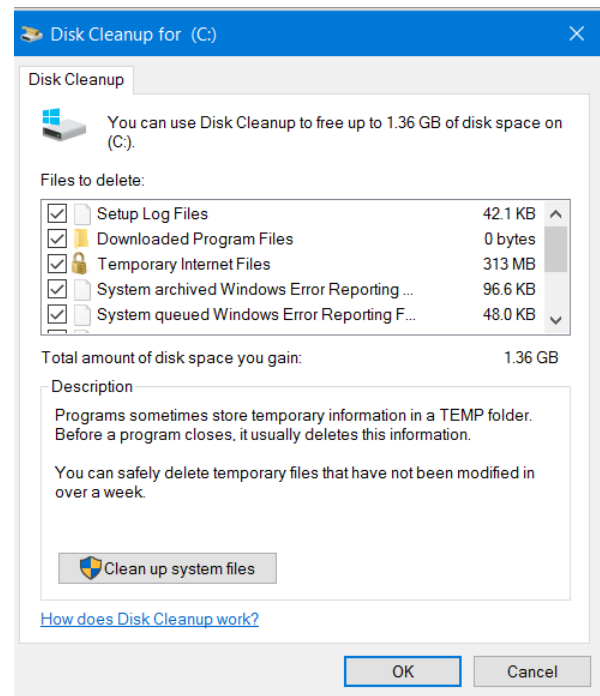


Free up disk space

- Right click on the Local Disk (C:),
- Right click on Properties.
- In the middle, click on **Disk Cleanup**.

- Then click OK.
- Wait for it to finish, then click on Delete Files.

Can you really believe what you read on the internet?

Should you trust all that you find on the internet? When you quiz Google or some other reliable search engine, or perhaps sites like Wikipedia for facts, the answer is 99 percent of the time: yes. However, if you get your news and facts from social network or from emails from an anonymous source, the answer is: probably not. When I taught a SIG here, I often would say, "Probably 80 percent of the stuff you find on the internet is not true." If something sounds unreasonable or unrealistic, it's probably is not true. One should check it out – particularly if you plan to forward it to send it to your friends or family.

When I receive something that is hurtful about an individual, group or organization, I look at those with a jaundiced eye. I often use fact checking websites like: *Truth or Fiction*, *Snopes* to evaluate questionable sounding items I receive. One time, many years ago, a friend from Tennessee sent me a very derogatory comment about a previous president he thought was funny, which Truth or Fiction said was fiction. I pointed that out to him and he said it was just too funny and he continued to send it to many others. The source of that derogatory comment was anonymous, but had my friend been quoted in a newspaper or magazine, he could easily be sued for libel.

That is the trouble with people on the internet. Since individuals can write just anything about anyone or thing and act like it came from someone else, one can feel safe about being anonymous. A lot less fictitious stories and information would be out there if the author had to take ownership. In the meantime, I remind you, don't believe everything you see on the internet.

My dissertation on this subject came about when in January someone contributed the following item for publication in the CKCS newsletter. I thought it was interesting so I felt it might be appropriate for "A few Funny Pages / Useful Information" in the February issue.

MARCH TECH NIGHT REVIEW

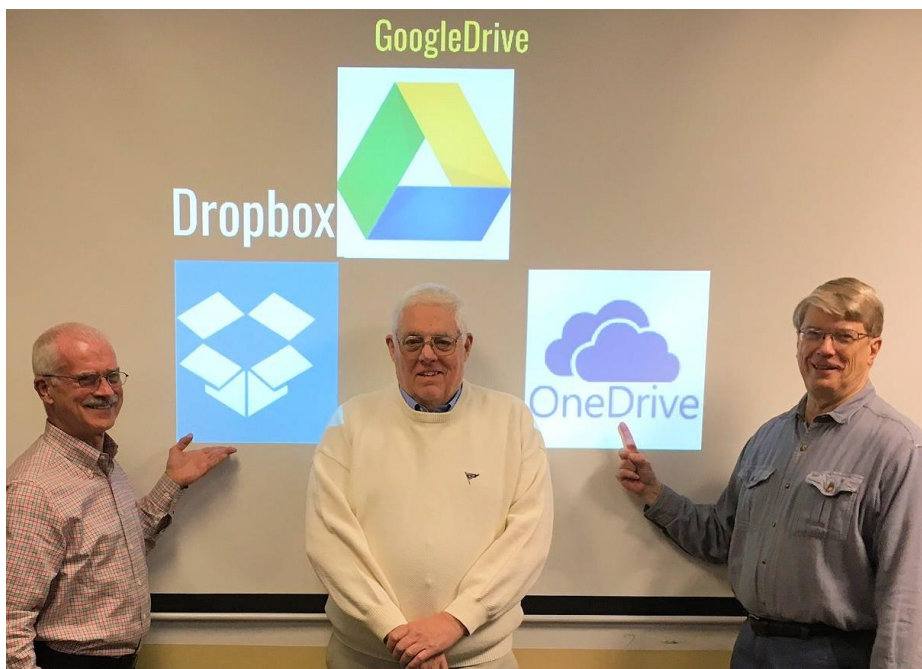
Cloud Services available

At the March Tech Night, the attendees were treated to presentations by the trio of Joe Dietz, Bob Brown and Mike Seiler. They explained the file syncing and cloud services that they personally use.

Joe (in left of photo) uses Dropbox primarily for sharing photos with others and having access to his files wherever he is. He has the Dropbox app on his phone, tablet and laptop. His files are not automatically stored in the cloud. He demonstrated how he could drag the files he wanted to put in the cloud to the Dropbox on his computer and then he could access them on his other devices. He also demonstrated how he could easily share specific folders and files with others via email. Recipients don't have to have Dropbox to see and download the files.


Bob (in center of photo) demonstrated Google Drive and how it works with the many Google programs. The advantages are that files are available on all devices that have Google Drive installed, they are saved as they are modified, and compared to the two other file storage services you get 3-times the amount of free space. Google Mail and the files created with Google programs

don't count against the free space. The disadvantage is the same with all the other cloud storage services; you are entrusting your files to a company's safe keeping versus having the files on your computer as well. Of course, you can save a copy of the files on your computer, as well.



Word Online, Excel Online and Power Point Online. If you have Windows 10 you don't have to pay for these programs. They don't have all the capabilities of the Office 365 versions, but have the features that most people use. When using the online programs, the files are automatically saved to the cloud. It is also a way to share large quantities of photos with others.

Mike (at right) showed how Microsoft OneDrive works. He explained that you have to have a Microsoft account to be able to access this cloud service. But along with the cloud storage you have access to many of the other Microsoft programs like

There was so much information to absorb in one night. All of the programs have more capabilities than can be covered in one evening. Mike teaches the Windows 10 six week class that gets into more depth about One Drive. If you are interested in learning more about OneDrive, a Windows 10 class is forming now. Check out the April class schedule in this newsletter. 

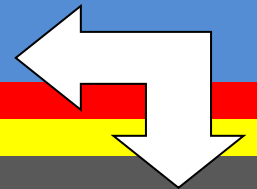

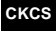

Mac and iPad pages continued

What if you're using an iPad or iPhone? Laptop Mag reports, "In December 2016, Apple finally revealed its Support app, which makes it slightly easier to jump straight into Apple's support page from an iPhone or iPad. When you open the app, it shows buttons for the Apple devices registered to your name, which made it easy for me to find documentation about my Touch Bar MacBook Pro."

An Apple phone tech support rep named Hayley stumbled, writes Laptop Mag, when he incorrectly told the magazine's reporter there was no way to turn off iCloud Desktop and Documents without disabling iCloud Drive. (You can easily do this by clicking on the iCloud icon in the Mac's System Preferences, clicking the "Options" button next to iCloud Drive at the very top of the window and then unchecking the box next to "Desktop and Documents Folders.")

"If Apple wants to improve its support," writes Laptop Mag, "it should ensure support techs learn about all of the new features so they can give completely accurate answers to questions on topics such as iCloud Documents. Its Twitter account could also improve by providing answers directly, instead of linking to posts where the content is found. Overall, though, Apple offers the best support of any laptop manufacturer, as it has for many years."

Less Expensive iPad Replaces iPad Air 2

Critics of Apple sometimes complain that the company's products are too expensive. Well, Apple is [introducing a new iPad](#) to replace the iPad Air 2 and it costs only \$329.

The new tablet is simply called "iPad" and is available in three colors with 32 GB of memory installed. Apple's Phil Schiller says the users and old iPad owners who are looking for a new tablet to use at home, work and school.

Apple is using older internal components in the iPad to bring the price down but the 9to5Mac web site notes that the 9.7-inch Retina display screen is brighter than the iPad Air 2 that it replaces. The new iPad is also \$70 less expensive than the Air 2 which will no longer be sold.

This iPad model with 32 GB of memory and cellular service costs \$459. (The cellular service allows you to connect to the Internet in places where there is no WiFi available. There's no contract – you pay a monthly fee whenever you want to connect the iPad via cellular service from providers such as Verizon, AT&T, T-Mobile and Sprint.)

Here's what [TidBits says](#) about the new iPad: "While the iPad Air 2 featured an A8X processor, the new iPad boasts a faster A9 chip, the same processor used in the iPhone 6s. Unfortunately, it doesn't have the A10 Fusion chip that powers the iPhone 7 or even the iPad Pro's A9X." TidBits isn't sold on the new iPad: "Nevertheless, we can't see many people upgrading from an iPad Air 2 or even an iPad Air to this new iPad. The improvements just aren't sufficiently compelling, as nice as the new model is as an entry-level iPad."

Apple discontinues iPad mini 4 with 32 GB

Fans of the smaller iPad mini will be pleased to learn that Apple has begun selling the iPad mini 4 WiFi with 128 GB of memory for \$399, the same price as the now discontinued 32 GB iPad mini 4 with WiFi. You can also buy an iPad mini 4 with 128 GB of memory and cellular connection for \$529.

Want old technology? Try desktop Macs

"This is the most prestigious computer company in the world, and their top-of-the-line computer is more than three years old. How can the top management at Apple think this is normal? Perhaps they all use iPads, and they expect us all to switch to that platform, but it's obvious that there are still millions who use computers," writes long-time Mac user Kirk McElhearn in his [article for Macworld](#).

While Apple regularly introduces new iPhones and iPads, the Mac appears to be an afterthought. McElhearn writes that the iMac has not been refreshed in 521 days. The Mac mini hasn't seen any changes in 883 days. And the Mac Pro? "Apple should be embarrassed selling a computer that hasn't been changed in 1,184 days at the same price as when it was launched. That top-of-the-line Mac features three-year old technology at three-year old prices," he writes.

His piece points out that the Mac is a \$22 billion business and many companies would absolutely love to bring in that much money from a limited product line.

McElhearn writes that he owns three Macs: a 2014 5K Retina iMac, a 2015 MacBook, and a 2011 Mac mini.

Since Apple apparently doesn't care about the desktop Mac or keeping customers who rely on



new Macs, McElhearn adds, “But the worst thing about the lack of new Macs is the hit that Apple’s reputation is taking...It’s been 1,184 days since Apple last released an innovation for the desktop.”

I learned at a very young age that action speaks much louder than words. Apple’s actions are speaking a lot as it ignores an important sector of its base customers.

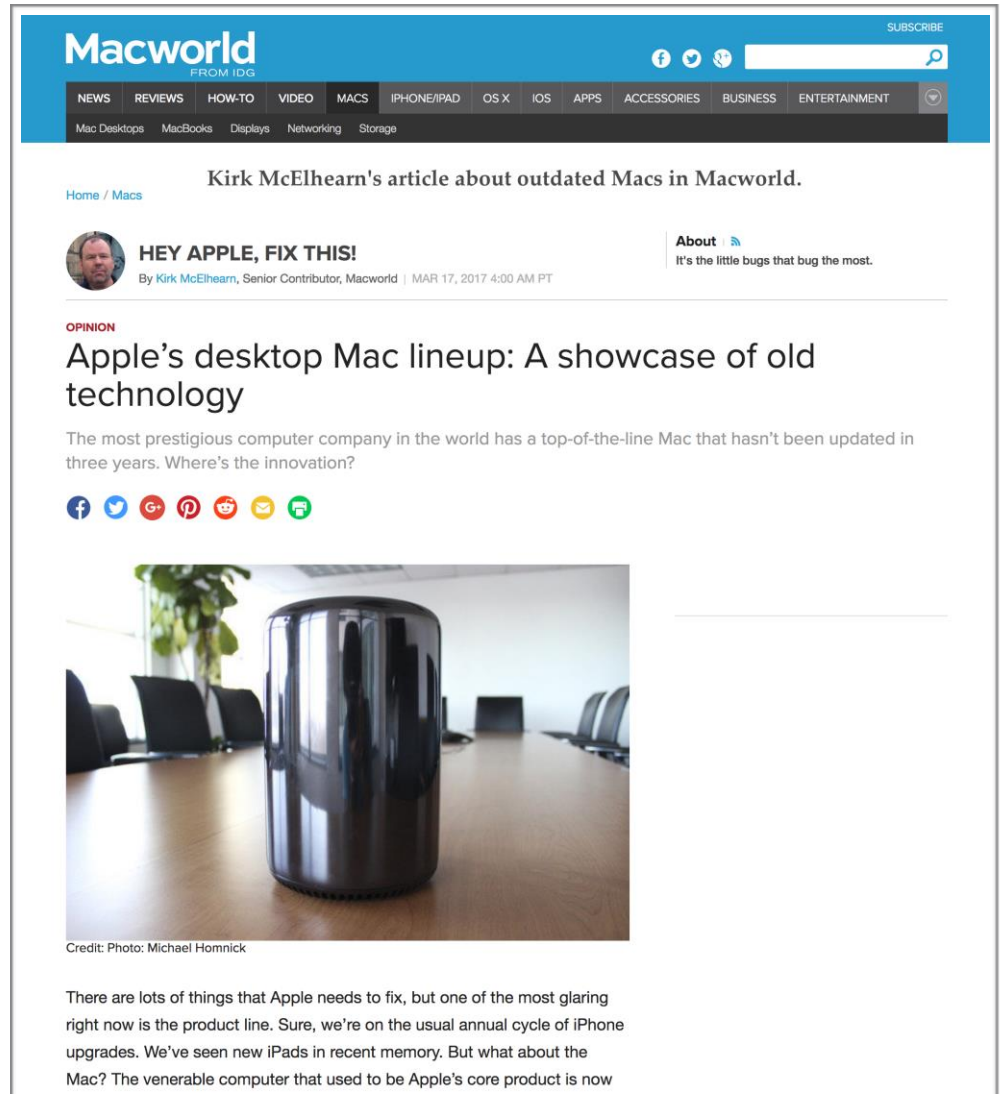
[Last December](#), Dan Moren wrote in Macworld, “Overall, what the Mac desktop line currently seems to lack is vision—and recent articles about the internal state of Apple’s Mac division—certainly suggest as much. While the product lines may not be as exciting to work on as the bleeding edge of iOS devices or even MacBooks, there are still plenty of people who’d greet the arrival of Mac desktop updates as a cause for celebration. And if the customers are there, Apple should be able to find people within its ranks who are at least as excited. Not unlike desktops themselves, improving the lot of iMacs, Mac minis, and even the Mac Pro is something that starts from within.”

Come on, Apple. Step up to the plate and innovate.

British man dies while charging an iPhone and using it in bathtub

A coroner in Great Britain is warning about the dangers of using electrical devices in the bathroom after Richard Bull, 32, of West London apparently died in December while charging an iPhone. At the same time he was using the phone in the bathtub.

The [Daily Mail reports](#) the tragedy occurred because Bull ran an extension cord from an electrical outlet outside the bathroom and put the charger on his chest while using the phone. Newspaper reports indicate Bull’s wife discovered him and she thought he had been attacked because his burns were so severe. The victim was preparing to meet family members and

Apple: There Were no iCloud or Apple ID Breaches

Apple says reports of recent breaches involving iCloud and stolen Apple IDs is simply false. Apple told Fortune its systems have not been breached. If hackers do have access to iCloud accounts, Apple says previously compromised third party services are at fault, according to a [report in MacRumors](#).

A report in *Motherboard* said hackers known as the "Turkish Crime Family" claimed to have access to hundreds of millions of iCloud accounts and threatens to reset the iCloud account and remotely wipe victims' Apple devices if Apple refuses to pay ransom.

According to MacRumors, "The Apple spokesperson also told Fortune the company is "actively monitoring to prevent unauthorized access to user accounts and are working with law enforcement to identify the criminals involved," but did not outline what specific steps are being taken to monitor the situation beyond "standard procedure."

In addition, Apple is recommending that all iCloud users choose strong passwords, use different passwords for different Web sites, and use two-factor authentication to protect their accounts.
