

Computer tips from CKCS members and friends

Members are invited to share their favorite computer tips with other members. They may involve your use of computers, tablets or phones. COMPUTER TIP: Finding something in a long document. Do you have a long article on your computer from the internet and you want to find a certain name or piece of information without reading the entire article? With the article open, on your keyboard, hold down the control (Ctrl) key and then tap on the letter **f**.

A box will open where you type in the word or words that you are looking for. Each time the word is mentioned in the article will show up and you can then navigate to that place.

For example, if you are looking for the word **park** in an internet article, hit **Ctrl** and **f**. The following box will appear. In the box, type in **park**.



In the article, everywhere that word appears it will be highlighted, helping you find what you are looking for. An example:

A **recreation area** is a type of protected area designated in some jurisdictions. In the United States, National Recreation Areas are administered by several different agencies. They typically do not meet the strict guidelines to become national parks. In U.S. state park systems, recreation areas may also fail to meet some criteria to be designated state parks, such as having a large number of non-

COMPUTER TIP: Preparing a fancy email. If you want to send someone a plain email, of course the simplest way is to open a blank email and type your text and press SEND.

However, if you want an email using different type fonts, font sizes, various colored words or paragraphs like you might do for an invitation or announcing an item for sale, I recommend you do your typing and editing using MS Word. Word has so many gadgets and features to easily make your message neat and pleasing to the eye. Adding a picture among your text works best in MS Word allowing you to put the picture where you want it rather than as an attachment to that email. Once you get it just the way you want it, just copy and paste it from Word into a blank email after adding a subject line and a list of recipients from your address book.

COMPUTER TIP: How to print from your device. I get asked quite a bit by folks who own Apple devices (iPhone, iPad and iPod touch) about how to print from their devices. First, make sure your printer is AirPrint compatible. That's the name Apple gives to printers that are capable of printing from a device.

Here is the Apple Support web site showing every printer that's AirPrint compatible: https://support.apple.com/en-us/HT201311 (It's quite lengthy since every printer in the last five years or so is AirPrint compatible.)

Second, when you get to an item on your screen that you want to print, look for the "Action Menu." It looks like a rectangle with an arrow pointing up. Tap on that icon and choose "Print."

Third, you need to choose a printer and determine how many prints you want, quality of printing, etc.

If you are using your home WiFi connection to print from your Apple device, initially you have to set up that device to recognize your WiFi signal. That might only include entering the name of your network along with your WiFi password.

It's really that simple.

Are you aware of WINDOWS HELLO?

One of the exciting features that has evolved in Windows 10 is **Windows Hello**.

This feature adds to the original Windows sign-on features password, pin, picture sign-on the ability to use biometric (physical features) to sign into Windows 10. These being your face (eyes) or your fingerprint. These sign-on features are more secure, faster and unnecessary to remember.

However, to use **Windows Hello** requires special equipment. For the fingerprint, you either must have a fingerprint reader built-in, or added to your PC.

For the face recognition, a special camera is required. Some PC's already have this equipment. Many laptops or convertibles include a finger print reader and a few have a **Windows Hello** capable camera, such as the Surface 4 Pro and the Yoga 15. If you activate face recognition, when you sit in front of your computer, it recognizes you and signs you on.

For those of you, like myself, you will need to make a purchase to acquire the camera. There are only a few currently available. They include the Intel RealSense camera, the Logitech Brio, Microsoft LifeCam Studio and several others. Also, some of the Modern Apps enable **Windows** Hello sign-on. These include Dropbox, One Drive, Passwords 10 and several others.

If you have the appropriate hardware, do the following to activate **Windows Hello**:

- Go to Settings, Accounts.
- ➤ In Accounts, click Sign-in options and you will be taken to the Sign-In Options window
- Under Windows Hello, click Face Recognition Set Up





Follow the directions from Windows by first signing in and then having the camera recognize you.

Apple slow to react to angry pro Mac users

Mac & iPad

Apple invites small group of reporters to Cupertino to discuss Mac's future

Men and women who use high—end, expensive Macs to do their jobs must have felt as if they were tossed off a ship onto a small raft to fend for themselves. *Abandoned by Apple* is the phrase that comes to mind.

While iPhones and iPads have been continually updated over the past few years, Apple's Mac Pro desktop computer went stale years ago. Apple has not upgraded the hardware in this machine since it was released in December 2013. That's right. My calendar tells me we're in May, um, 2017.



Apple has also shown no love to another desktop, the least expensive Mac – the Mac mini. It was last updated in October 2014. Pro laptop users are also screaming – murder!

Because Apple has been extremely slow to even hint that it cares about its pro Mac users — the folks who shell out plenty of money for a pricey high—end Mac and use the machine for video editing, Photoshop—type work, etc., it's apparently losing Mac customers. Don't believe me? Read the PcWorld column by Séamus Bellamy titled, How to switch from Mac to PC, Part 1: What's driving me to do it. Folks, this is exactly what businesses want to prevent.

Just a few years ago, this would have been unthinkable. Mac users were some of the most die—hard computer users committed to a single platform.

Séamus Bellamy tells how a lemon MacBook Pro refuses to work properly despite ongoing visits to an Apple tech for repair.

He also laments the state of Apple's software and has been dismayed by Apple's lack of interest in delivering really great hardware: "Apple once catered to creatives—hardcore power users in film and music production, desktop publishing, and other artistic endeavors.

They valued the company's hardware for its performance and ease of use. But the last update to the company's iconic Mac Pro desktop was years ago. The company's MacBook Pro laptop line saw years of underwhelming incremental

updates before being given a serious overhaul a few months ago."



He closes his column with this: "It's time to switch. I don't yet know where this journey will take me, but by the end, you and I both will have a well-informed opinion on whether it's worth it."

Angry pro Mac users aren't the only challenge facing Apple. Macs used to be standard fare in nearly any classroom.

Fortune <u>reported in March</u> that Apple is losing America's classrooms to Google and Microsoft: "Apple's status in the education sector has tumbled in recent years. Apple mobile operating system iOS ended 2016 with a 14 percent share of new mobile devices used in Kindergarten through 12th grade, down from 26 percent in 2014, according to new data from research firm Futuresource Consulting. Meanwhile, Apple's computer-only operating systems OS X and macOS fell to a 5 percent share in 2016 from 8 percent two years earlier.

As Apple's hold on the education world declined, Google has grown the share of its cloud-based operating system, Chrome OS, to 58 percent from 38 percent in 2014. Microsoft stabilized the market share of its Windows operating system in education last year at 22 percent, flat from 2015 and down from 25 percent in 2014."

In addition, <u>a recent Laptop Mag survey</u> of the best and worst laptops ranked Macs in fifth place after Apple earlier took the No. 1 spot for several years. Since the survey began in 2010, Apple had always taken the top spot. Now, Lenovo wins the No. 1 position followed by Asus, Dell and HP. Apple tied Acer for fifth place.

What's going on here? For such a large technology company, some say it would appear that Apple has lost its way.

There are nearly 100–million Mac users — more customers than many Fortune 500 companies have. 20 percent of all Mac users are desktop users. The rest use laptops.

Mac User Base = approaching 100 million users Desktop users = 20% of Mac users

With so many Mac customers, wouldn't it make sense for Apple to keep them from straying to Windows or Linux operating systems?

My opinion? Apple screwed up. Big Time. This is quite rare for Apple, a company which normally operates on all cylinders and produces some of the most sought—after electronics in


Do you hate ROBO calls?

Vista Support ended April 11, 2017

No more security patches or bug fixes from Microsoft and an operating system is nearly impossible to protect if you use it online. If you go online with Internet Explorer 9, you are especially vulnerable.

Microsoft Fixes Office Flaws

The April 13 security update from Microsoft takes care of a serious security hole in Microsoft Office, one that's already been exploited by hackers. The flaw allows hackers to create a malicious rich text document that can attack your PC when opened in either Word or WordPad.

There are also updates to fix potential problems in Internet Explorer and Microsoft Edge.

The Windows 10 Creators update is a big deal.

Probably the biggest update of 2017 is the release of Windows 10 creator.

It will come to you as a regular Microsoft update, newer computers will get the update first, it rolled out April 11. It may take a while before you get it. It is a big download with big improvements including better security. Takes about 30 minutes to download with a Solid State Drive, otherwise about an hour.



Microsoft Edge: 5 key improvements with the Creators Update

- 1. Tab organization; Edge offers two new ways to manage your tabs with the Creators Update.
- 2. Read ebooks in Edge.
- 3. Import bookmarks.
- 4. Translate extension: Translates a website into more than 50 languages with a single click of the Translator icon in the address bar.
- 5. Streaming Netflix in 4K, requires a 4K monitor.

Microsoft Edge browser getting better

- 1. Recurring Cortana reminders
- 2. Dynamic Lock; Just pair it with your computer and Windows 10 will use the Bluetooth connection to determine your proximity and will lock your PC when you stray too far.
- 3. A new Touchpad settings page lets you configure three and four-finger gestures for things like switching apps, searching Cortana, and toggling Multitasking view
- 4. Better tab management; An addition to Microsoft's Edge browser makes it easier to keep track of your tabs. If you have a bunch of tabs open. You'll find a new *Set these tabs aside* button to the left of Edge's address bar.


APRIL TECH NIGHT REVIEW

Members are now smarter about smart TVs

Michael Cox, Director of Marketing at Pieratts, walked CKCS members through the evolution of the television from 1990 and on into the future. He discussed the first large format plasma TV sold in

1997 and took us though the LCD, the smart TVs, the LED, the 4K UltraHD TVs up to the first latest format OLED TVs. This Tech Night presentation held on April 10 was very educational and Michael made it entertaining as well.

He explained the various types of LED panels in HDTV's. He then compared the LED panels to the newest technology of the OLED panels. The big reveal came when the audience was able to compare CKCS's about four-year-old LED TV next to a 65-inch LG

OLED TV he carried from the store for his presentation. Our LED TV had the latest and best features at the time. It's thin, light and with a great picture but sitting next to the OLED, the difference was obvious. Not only is the OLED super thin, (6mm), see the picture at left, he turned the set sideways to show it's thinness) the colors and the solid darks were amazingly rich.

He then introduced us to the future, or what seemed futuristic. He showed a video of the innovative wallpaper LG OLED TV that lets you stick the display (2.6mm) to the wall with a magnet mat. The truth was that these TV's are not a future concept, but already are available.

It was a very eye-opening event for anyone interested in new



technology and especially those thinking about buying a new TV in the near future. It's amazing how far and how fast the technology has come!

- » Do Image Backups of your computer: of the whole computer (OS, programs, settings, everything) and no only your documents and personal files; use Acronis Backup Software to do monthly (and weekly) completely unattended image backups of your computer to a second hard drive (a USB connected one but preferable an internal one).
- » Use MalwareBytes software to protect against malware: and better yet use the Premium version (only \$15 per computer per year);
- » Windows 10 is GOOD and free (for existing Windows 7 and Windows 8 computers)! Welcome back to the Windows 7 like interface that most everybody feel at home with. Please be also aware that Windows 10 expand the amount of information obtained by Microsoft from your computer usage (more on it can be read at many places online including http://www.polygon.com/2015/7/31/9075531/windows-10-privacy-how-to).
- » Make sure that you are visiting the website that you really want to visit; there are many misleading sites that try to trick you into believing that they are the intended legit site ... but they are not! Be careful with the spelling of the name of a site; be careful with the first "findings" of the search engines; most times they are no findings but (many times deceptive) advertising.
- » If somebody call you about the "problems of your computer" simply hang off; they are not legitimate people so do not even waste your time even threatening them.

When <u>Business Insider</u> publishes an article with this title, *Apple abandoned some of its most important users, and now it's trying to catch up to its biggest competitors*, you know the Apple has soured. The article concludes, "It is refreshing to see Apple admit it has fallen behind. Schiller even said he was sorry for the slow movement in the company's pro lineup. But until Apple can start shipping products, there's a huge opportunity and plenty of time for its biggest competitors to capture the pro market Apple abandoned."

Even NYMag writes how the iPhone has surpassed everything else at Apple. The smartphone outsells every other Apple device, brings in more money, and has more users: "The Mac, whether in laptop or desktop form (Apple says it currently sells about 80 percent laptops and 20 percent desktops), is a relatively small part of its overall business. Its quarterly earnings reports show how much the iPhone has come to dominate its revenue stream. It could quietly stop making computers altogether and only lose 10 percent of its overall revenue."

Problem is, there are folks like me who will never own an iPhone. Period. I don't like phones.

I don't want an iPhone. Yet I do use the Mac and iPad, along with the iPod touch, every day.

courting. Instead, some of those folks, for the first time in years, are eyeing the possibility of a new Windows machine. Once they leave the Mac – they won't be back.

Then they won't buy another iPad or iPhone. Hello Microsoft's Surface tablet and Samsung smart phones. *Apple, it was nice while it lasted...* And none of this had to happen. From all appearances, the iPhone is the darling child at Apple, while the Mac is a second class device.

As Daring Fireball's John Gruber writes, "The iPhone epitomizes everything Apple stands for. But it's a mistake to focus so much attention on the iPhone that other important products suffer." Here. Here. You can read Gruber's account of his meeting with Apple's top officials here. It's very good reading for anyone concerned about the future of the Mac.



After being ignored by Apple for years – these angry pro Mac users apparently have finally been heard. Apple invited Gruber and other tech journalists to its California headquarters to hear about what the company has in store for future desktop Macs.

As TidBits reports, "In an unprecedented move, Apple invited five prominent industry journalists to an on-the-record meeting with top executives Phil Schiller, Craig Federighi, and John Ternus (VP of Hardware Engineering). The writers included John Gruber of Daring Fireball, Matthew Panzarino of TechCrunch, Lance Ulanoff of Mashable, Ina Fried of Axios, and John Paczkowski of BuzzFeed."

The topic of discussion, <u>reports TidBits</u>, was "The Mac Pro, why it's taken Apple so long to update it, and Apple's commitment to the professional market."

It adds, "To show how important the Mac remains to Apple, Phil Schiller said that the Mac user base is nearing 100 million users and is a \$25 billion business — on its own, it's nearly a Fortune 100 company. (Also interesting was the statistic that notebooks make up 80 percent of Mac sales, with desktops at 20 percent. It's not surprising, given the stagnation of the Mac Pro and the Mac mini.)"

TidBits adds that Apple kept on emphasizing how important the Mac is to the company:



The best–selling desktop Mac for many years has been the iMac. It is also the world's best–selling all–in–one computer since Steve Jobs first introduced the model in August 1998.

"Schiller said, "The Mac has an important, long future at Apple, that Apple cares deeply about the Mac, we have every intention to keep going and investing in the Mac. And if we've had a



pause in upgrades and updates on that, we're sorry for that — what happened with the Mac Pro, and we're going to come out with something great to replace it." Craig Federighi chimed in, saying "The Mac is — we say it over and over, we're saying it again here — a huge part of our future, we're deeply invested in it."

To that, I say actions speak louder than words. Did you get that Apple? *Actions speak louder than words.* What a company does is more important that what it says.

Apple execs revealed that the company would produce a new Mac designed for the pro audience, a new Mac display for the pro Mac, and they admitted that Apple needs to communicate better with its pro users. (You think?) The new Mac Pro and display are not expected to be released this year – instead, we're probably looking at a 2018 release.

For now, Apple dropped prices on the current configurations of the Mac Pro and updated the machine with faster chips, to apparently try and make up for the snub to pro Mac users.

<u>MacRumors concludes its article</u>: "In the end, the comparatively small but vocal community of pro users was loud enough that Apple likely felt it needed to respond now, rather than keep its plans for new products under wraps until later. It's exciting news for Apple's pro customers, even if some patience is still required until Apple's roadmap materializes."

I would add: Apple, do you finally get it? Do you see how you have angered your customer base? Do you finally understand how important the Mac is to many computer users? Maybe you should listen to pro Mac users to hear what they want in a new computer before designing it? That's a concept that Apple needs to examine. Build a machine using input from these pro Mac users you're trying to appease. What. A. Concept.

Macworld's Roman Loyola actually wrote a <u>column</u> titled *What I'd like to see in the new Mac Pro*. Here are some of his suggestions:

- A practical tower case design
- Modern graphics processors and the ability to upgrade
- Up-to-date CPUs
- Ports: Thunderbolt 3, USB-C, USB 3.0
- 512GB SSD to start
- A complimentary 5K display

I have to say that 512GB SSD (512 gigabyte, solid—state drive) is a no brainer. I would never buy another Mac with a traditional hard drive. Years ago, I bought the latest Mac mini available (the late 2014 model) purchased from Apple's Web site with what's called Fusion Drive.


It's a combination hard drive and solid state drive (SSD) machine. My most—used files and apps migrate to the SSD portion, while most of the operating system and least used files and apps reside on the traditional hard drive. It is quite zippy. Whenever I have to use a Mac with a traditional hard drive (say in the CKCS classroom), it feels incredibly slow. The machines with traditional hard drives boot up slowly, and they are very slow in their operation. Simply put, I would never go back to a traditional hard drive on a Mac.



Speaking of the Mac mini which badly needs to be updated, Gruber writes, "Near the end, John Paczkowski had the presence of mind to ask about the Mac Mini, which hadn't been


mentioned at all until that point.

Schiller: "On that I'll say the Mac Mini is an important product in our lineup and we weren't bringing it up because it's more of a mix of consumer with some pro use. ... The Mac Mini remains a product in our lineup, but nothing more to say about it today."



It has been one of the best Macs L have owned since I bought my first Mac (a Performa 550) at a Sears in 1992. Dan More praises the small Mac mini and why he believes in it here.

He concludes, "The Mac mini's quiet operation, built-in power brick, and

Mac Pro can't. The Mac mini may never match the sales of the iMac, much less Apple's portable Macs, but in the same way that Apple has realized that the Mac Pro needs to live up to customers' idea of what "professional" means, I hope that the company realizes that the

iPhone ownership in U.S. hits an all-time high

As you read this, Apple now has more iPhone users in the U.S. than ever before, reports the market research firm comScore.

MacRumors reports, "There are now over an estimated 85.8 million iPhone owners aged 13 and older in the United States, based on a three-month average ending December 2016. according to comScore MobiLens Plus. Apple's latest iPhone 7 and iPhone 7 Plus models accounted for approximately 15 percent of that total.

iPhone 6 and iPhone 6s models, including their respective Plus-sized versions, remain Apple's most popular smartphones in the U.S. with an estimated 48.4 percent share of the overall installed base. Meanwhile, an estimated 17.8 percent of the users are still using an iPhone 5, iPhone 5s, or iPhone 5c."



Two research firms – Kantar Worldpanel and IHS Market – go even further. They report that Apple's iPhone is now the single most popular smartphone in the U.S. and the world.

Best desktop Mac email apps

I have never been a fan of the built—in mail app on the Mac called "Mail." I started using it before Apple released the version of the Mac operating system called "Jaguar" back in 2002.

I had issues with Mail then, and I have issues with Mail now.

So I looked elsewhere. If you also don't favor Mail, consider the alternatives. In 2016, Macworld published an article on the <u>best alternatives to Mail</u> that are available on the Mac App Store.

Some of the better known Mac options include:

Postbox – This email app is designed for folks who get a lot of email and want to cut to the chase. "Postbox lets you isolate tasks so you can work quickly and efficiently without interruption," reads the Postbox web site. The app is customizable and utilizes tabs like Thunderbird to easily switch between messages. Last October, Macworld reviewed Postbox: "A robust alternative to Apple Mail and Microsoft Office." The normal price of Postbox 5 is \$40, but the developer says that includes all future updates.



Thunderbird.app

One of the most popular alternatives to Apple's Mail app, which comes pre-loaded on all Macs, is Thunderbird, an email app that the folks behind the Firefox browser first released back in July 2003.

<u>Thunderbird for Mac</u> – Originally developed by Mozilla, the folks behind the Firefox web browser. Version 1.0 was released in July 2003. It's available in 53 languages and is one of the most customizable email apps currently available. Some compare Thunderbird to OutLook, but peppier and easier to use. Free.

<u>Spark</u> – Created by Readdle (known for the Mac app, PDF Expert, which is a fast and robust PDF reader and editor), Spark first appeared for iOS devices and then made its way to the Mac. Macworld gave Spark for Mac (version 1.1) a four—mice rating. J.R. Bookwalter wrote in his Macworld <u>review</u>, "I do the bulk of my daily work on an iMac, so having the same application available on my iPhone and iPad is a must. Now that Spark for Mac has arrived, is it finally curtains for Apple Mail? The short answer is: Almost." Free.

MailPlane for Mac — A 2016 review by The Verge called MailPlane "the least fancy Mac mail client you'll find. It's basically a browser wrapped inside of an app, which helps it integrate better with OS X." This is the app that gives you the real Gmail experience. MailPlane shines because it provides support for multiple Google email accounts and looks just as Gmail would look if you viewed your email using a web browser. It uses tabs so you can quickly switch between Gmail accounts. This may not seem like much but it's a godsend for folks with multiple Gmail accounts. The downside is it doesn't handle any email services but Google's, but there it performs quite well. \$29.95 for a personal license that you can install on any Mac you personally use.



<u>Polymail</u> – Available for both macOS and iOS, features Contact Profiles and displays all of the information it can find for that individual online. Macworld writes, "Think of it as Facebook, but for email." This app provides a variety of productivity tools including "send later," "read later," and email tracking. Polymail is designed with business people in mind. Free.

<u>Inky</u> – If you're looking for extra security, Inky might be the solution. Also available for iOS, Inky offers end–to–end encryption and digital signing (which verifies the sender is who he or she claims to be.) One key feature is Inky's ability to search email. This app indexes and analyzes messages automatically, so its search function is awesome. \$5 a month from Inky.

<u>Boxy</u> – Macworld says if you love Inbox by Gmail, the Boxy might be your favorite Mac email app. One of the highlights of Boxy is that it allows you to begin writing an email on one Apple device (say a Mac) and then continue writing that email on an iPad or iPhone. \$5.99 from Mac App Store.

<u>Airmail 3</u> – Offers a clean interface with the ability to switch quickly between email accounts. Filters important mail separately from all messages that flow into your "inbox." One reviewer in the Mac App Store writes, "Everything works flawlessly and I have found it extremely easy to set up and use. Since moving over several months ago, I have had zero issues." \$9.99 from the Mac App Store.

Newton Mail (formerly CloudMagic) – A subscription–based email app available in the Mac App Store, and a hit with Mac users who had been using Mailbox before Dropbox bought it and then killed it. Newton Mail contains a bare interface with few buttons. Newtown Mail works with Gmail accounts, as well as Exchange and Outlook. There is a 14–day free trial if you'd like to give Newton Mail a spin. \$24.99 in Mac App Store.

Helpful iPad/iPhone tips you may never have seen before

There are <u>dozens of tips</u> that iPhone users might not have seen before. Here are just a few of the suggestions (from c|net) that might help you get more out of your phone.

- **1.** Close three apps at the same time. Simple swipe up with three fingers to close up to three apps at once.
- 2. Use bold, italics and underlining. Surprising how many folks don't know this one. If you're using an app such as Mail. First, highlight the text you want to edit, and tap the arrow in the copy/paste popup window. Then you can choose B/I/U (Bold, Italics or Underline.)
- **3.** Go back! If you're using Safari, Mail or Messages, swipe right from the edge of the screen to go to the prior window.



Browser scams target Apple Safari users on Mac and Apple devices

Several years ago, users of Apple Macs, iPhones, iPads, and iPod touches started getting Safari ransomware messages claiming to show messages from the FBI, demanding users send \$300 to unlock their browsers.

These are phony tech support scams claiming that the computer user could end the Safari pop—up issue by sending in \$300 to unlock their Web browser.

SVA News writes, "These scams can appear on any web browser running on any Mac, PC, or iOS device. They appear to be authentic, because they might include details such as your IP address and an icon of the browser you're using. Some of them include voiceovers or annoying alert sounds. You can't find a way to dismiss the popups, and you can't find a way to quit Safari. Even if you were to completely shut down and restart your Mac or iPhone, the annoying popups might just keep reappearing."

An Apple support discussions web site writes, "The above screenshots are mere

examples. There are thousands of variations of this scam whose exact appearance and wording can take any form. There are also millions of permutations of the "toll-free" phone numbers they provide, and they can easily originate from the other side of the globe. These scams are easily created, simple to distribute, and new examples appear every day."




The discussions web site adds, "A variant of the same scam will cause a webpage to appear accusing you of engaging in some sordid or illegal Internet activity. The page might bear official-looking government or law enforcement seals, say your Mac is infected with some ick, and / or employ technobabble intended either to intimidate you or create an impression of authenticity."

"These scams are routinely perpetrated by criminals around the world in an effort to convince you into giving them money. They cannot succeed without your active participation. Don't be a victim," writes the Apple Discussions Web site.

How to restore data from iCloud

If you've ever wanted to restore data from iCloud, <u>TidBits</u> shares insight into this procedure in a recently published article. To start, you need to use a browser to log into your iCloud account using your Apple ID and password at <u>icloud.com</u>. Then, click the Settings icon on the launchpad page. Then, you'll see information about your iCloud account, a list of devices using iCloud, and finally, at the bottom, an Advanced section providing details on how to restore data.



The article tackles files, contact, calendar events and reminders, and bookmarks for Safari.

This is what TidBits has to say about restoring files: "When you remove a file from iCloud Drive, whether you do it by dragging it out of iCloud Drive on your Mac or by deleting it from within an app on your Mac or in iOS, iCloud saves the file for thirty days before it goes away for good, much like the way deleted photos are stored in the Recently Deleted album in the Photos app.

Select the files you wish to put back into their respective iCloud Drive folders and click Restore to have them reappear in iCloud Drive."

If you're confused about restoring data using iCloud, this is well worth your time
