Course/Workshop Descriptions

Classes

Introduction to Photoshop Elements... In this course you will learn how to use some of the tools in Elements to do basic photo enhancements including quick fixes, cropping, cloning, spot healing, red eye removal, levels and adding borders. We will also discuss photo considerations prior to printing, introduction to layers, converting images to black and white, enhancing and restoring old photos, adding text, using brushes, graphics, adjustment layers, templates, special features, filters and creating a slide show.



Point & Shoot Photography...* This is an introductory photography class using Point and Shoot Cameras. We will show you how to take great pictures with the many built in settings on your camera. You will learn to shoot like a pro.

Windows 10... Learn how to navigate in Microsoft's Windows 10 operating system. You will install several free programs and learn how to use them, including a free word processor that is as robust as Word. We will look at computer security and how to back up your computer. Also, we will look at OneDrive, Microsoft's cloud storage system, and how to use it to share your pictures with friends and family.

Workshops

Posing People for Your Photographs...* With the holidays coming up soon, feel confident on how to line up and take family group photos. Also, learn how to pose individuals and couples anytime you are asked to photograph people. Your photography skills will improve those "once in a lifetime moments" you want to capture.

Sports & Action Photography...* Students will learn how to shoot sports and action photographs.

Understanding Facebook... Students will learn how to create, use, and maintain a Facebook page via the computer. Adding a profile picture and cover photo, finding friends, customizing your privacy settings, posting comments and photos and other features will be covered.

Secrets of the iPhone...* Learn important (and hidden) functions of your iPhone. Learn how to download apps, move them, nest them and delete them. Learn how to get better photos with your phone, organize your pictures and send them in text and emails. Texting messages and using Siri will also be covered. Participants should bring their iPhone passcode and their Apple password to access the App store.

Advanced Techniques of Paintshop Pro... In this workshop you will learn some of PSP's advanced techniques. We will discuss customizing your workspace to be more efficient. We will demonstrate techniques on removing someone from a picture; different ways to make selections from your photos, how to capture more frames, tubes, brushes, etc. that don't come with PSP. We will also cover Smart Carver - a neat way to take something out of a photo, adding a sky to a photo. We will cover these and other advanced techniques as time permits.

Making Note Cards With Microsoft Word...Learn how to make your own ORIGINAL note cards using Microsoft Word! You will be taught how to set up a note card page, add graphics and/or photos, how to make sets of note cards or individual cards, and how to file them for future use. This is an opportunity to engage your imagination and have a fun time. Card stock will be provided by the instructor. Each student should bring a personal thumb drive loaded with photos to be used to create her/his personal note cards.

* These classes or workshops meet in the main room and their class size is determined by the instructor. All other classes meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.

Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (this is at the discretion of the instructor). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.

COSTS: All classes have a fee payable to CKCS of \$60 and Workshops have a fee of \$30, unless stated otherwise (see above).

CKCS members get a 20 percent discount on all class, seminar, and workshop fees.



Moving Videos from phone to computer

After shooting this video on our walk trail with an iPhone, we were wondering if it could be transferred to our Mac wirelessly from our location. After researching the Apple website, we found the following instructional articles to be very informative. This can be done on Windows or Mac computers but it does have to be shot on an iPhone. This will not work on a regular camera.

iCloud Photo Library

iCloud Photo Library works seamlessly with the Photos app to keep your photos and videos securely stored in iCloud and up to date on your iPhone, iPad, iPod touch, Mac, Apple TV, and iCloud.com.



Here's how it works

iCloud Photo Library automatically keeps every photo and video you take in iCloud, so you can access your library from any device, anytime you want. Any changes

you make to your collection on one device, change on your other devices, too. Your photos and videos stay organized into Moments, Collections, and Years. And all of your Memories are updated everywhere. That way you can quickly find the moment for which you're looking.

Your collection uploads to iCloud each time your device connects to Wi-Fi and your battery is charged. Depending on your Internet speed, the time it takes for you to see your photos and videos on all of your devices and iCloud.com might vary.



Before you begin

- 1 Update your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch to the <u>latest iOS</u>, your Mac to the <u>latest macOS</u>, and your Apple TV (4th generation) to the <u>latest tvOS</u>.
- 2 Set up iCloud on all of your devices.
- 3 Make sure that you're <u>signed in to iCloud with the same Apple ID</u> on all of your devices that you want to use with iCloud Photo Library.
- 4 If you have a Windows PC, update to Windows 7 or later and download iCloud for Windows.

Turn on iCloud Photo Library

- On your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch with iOS 10.3 or later, go to Settings > [your name] > iCloud > Photos, then turn on iCloud Photo Library. In iOS 10.2 or earlier, go to Settings > iCloud > Photos.
- On your Mac with OS X 10.10.3 or later, go to System Preferences > iCloud. Click Options next to Photos, then select iCloud Photo Library.
- On Apple TV (4th generation) with tvOS 9.2 or later, go to Settings > Accounts > iCloud > iCloud Photo Library.
- On your Windows PC, follow these steps.

See your edits on all of your devices

When you make <u>edits in the Photos app on your iOS device</u> or <u>your Mac</u>, the photo automatically updates across all of your devices. So when you crop or enhance a photo from your iPhone, you see the changes when you access your library from your Mac. If you change your mind and want to revert to the original view, it's no problem. The original photos and videos are stored in iCloud and you can go back to them at any time.

Even the <u>photos and videos you delete</u> on one device, delete everywhere that you use iCloud Photo Library. And if you want to get a photo back, you can restore it from the Recently Deleted album for 30 days.

You can make edits on your iPhone, iPad, iPod touch, or Mac, and you'll see them on your AppleTV automatically. Your entire collection is available on Apple TV, including your Memories and shared albums.

File types that you can use with iCloud Photo Library

Your photos and videos are stored in iCloud exactly as you took them. All of your images are held in their original formats at full resolution — JPEG, RAW, PNG, GIF, TIFF, and MP4, as well as special formats you capture with your iPhone, like slo-mo, time-lapse, 4K videos, and Live Photos.

Make sure that you have enough storage

The photos and videos that you keep in iCloud Photo Library <u>use your iCloud storage and your device storage</u>. And as long as you have <u>enough space in iCloud</u> and on your device, you can store as many photos and videos as you like. When you sign up for iCloud, you automatically get 5GB of free storage. If you use all of your iCloud storage, <u>you can buy more</u> starting at just \$0.99 (USD) a month.

Save space on your device

iCloud Photo Library keeps all of your photos and videos in their original, high-resolution version. You can save space on your device when you turn on Optimize Storage.





On your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch:

- 1 Tap Settings > [your name] > iCloud. If you're using iOS 10.2 or earlier, tap Settings > iCloud.
 - 2 Tap Photos.
 - 3 Choose Optimize [device] Storage.

On your Mac:

- 1 Open the Photos app and click Photos in the menu bar.
 - 2 Click Preferences.
 - 3 Go to the iCloud tab and choose a storage setting.

If you turn on Optimize Storage, iCloud Photo Library automatically manages the size of your library on your device. Your original photos and videos are stored in iCloud and space-saving versions are kept on your device. Your library is optimized only when you need space, starting with the photos and videos you access least. You can download the original photos and videos over Wi-Fi or cellular when you need them. You can use Optimize Storage on your iPhone, iPad, iPod touch, and Mac.

If you turn on Download Originals, iCloud Photo Library keeps your original, full-resolution photos and videos in iCloud and on your device.

Pause library uploads to iCloud

When you turn on iCloud Photo Library, the time it takes for your photos and videos to upload to iCloud depends on the size of your collection and your Internet speed. If you have a large collection of photos and videos, your upload might take more time than usual. You can see the status and pause the upload for one day.

- On your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch, go to Settings > [your name] > iCloud > Photos. In iOS 10.2 or earlier, go to Settings > iCloud > Photos.
- On your Mac, open the Photos app. In the menu bar, click Photos > Preferences. Click the iCloud tab.

Back up your photos and videos

When you turn on iCloud Photo Library, your photos and videos automatically upload to iCloud. They're not duplicated in your iCloud backup. But we always recommend that you keep back up copies of your library. You can download your photos and videos from iCloud.com to your computer and store them as a separate library, transfer them to another computer with Image Capture or Photos, or store them on a separate drive.

How Photos and iCloud Photo Library handle RAW images Learn how to work with RAW images using iCloud Photo Library and Photos for macOS.

<u>iCloud Photo Library</u> keeps your photos and videos up to date on your iPhone, iPad, iPod touch, and Mac. If your photo library includes images in RAW format, you can view and edit them on your Mac.

About RAW files on your Mac

The availability of RAW files on your Mac depends on a few conditions:

- If you have the Download Originals to this Mac option turned on in Photos (Photos > Preferences > iCloud > Download Originals to this Mac), then your RAW files are always present in Photos on your Mac.
- If you have the Optimize Mac Storage option turned on, then your RAW files are stored in iCloud Photo Library. Photos saves disk space on your Mac by displaying optimized JPEG versions of your RAW images. If you edit an optimized image on your Mac, Photos downloads the RAW file for that image.
- When Photos downloads a RAW image from iCloud Photo Library, it creates a new full-sized JPEG for optimal viewing on your Mac. It won't replace the RAW and embedded JPEG file already stored in iCloud. iOS devices will view the embedded JPEG.
- RAW files that you store outside the Photos app library (for example, in your Pictures folder) are always present on your Mac, but aren't stored in iCloud and won't stay up to date in the Photos app on your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch.

RAW files imported to iPad with the Camera Connection Kit

If you import RAW images to an iPad with the Camera Connection Kit, turn on Download Originals or edit the images on your Mac so that the files are available on your Mac in iCloud Photo Library. When you work with RAW images on an iPad, the iPad shows the embedded JPEG thumbnail of the image created by the camera, not the actual RAW file.

Apple announcements, September 12, 2017.

Apple just came out with some exciting new products on September 12.

The newest version of **Apple Watch** is the Series 3, which now has cellular capabilities, independent of the iPhone. Siri will now communicate with you through the Apple Watch. Another helpful feature of the watch is that now it will display your health-related information. However, you will have to add the Apple Watch onto your cell plan, so it will cost you a bit more. Apple watches starts at \$249 and the new Series 3 watch starts at \$399. Available September 22, 2017.

Next, the **Apple TV** is now 4K with HDR. However, to take advantage of the 4K, you must have a strong enough bandwidth to support this new product. One nice feature new to the Apple TV is the use of Siri to navigate through the various functions available. Those of you who attended the CKCS tech night SIG on using optic cable know that officials from the city are working on bringing optic cable to Lexington.

The Apple TV starts at \$149 and was available September 22.



The new **iPhone 8** has a glass and aluminum design, a single 12-megapixel camera with an f/1.8 aperture.

The iPhone 8 plus has dual 12-megapixel cameras. The wide angle will have an aperture of f/1.8, while the telephoto will have f/2.8.

Both have optical image stabilization which helps reduce motion blur.

The iPhone 8 plus has a feature called "portrait lighting" which provides a variety of lighting conditions for portrait work. The phone also provides sharper details and more natural boca in the background. It has stereo speakers, is water and dust resistant, and has wireless charging. (It uses a special charger pad).

The iPhone 8 starts at \$699, and was available September 22, 2017.

The **iPhone X** has a display that fits from edge to edge, top to bottom, with glass in both front and back. The OLED technology provides a bigger and more vibrant viewfinder and frame for photos and videos. There is a dual optical image stabilization, and a portrait lighting feature for better photos and videos in low light.

The iPhone X uses face ID to unlock the phone, so if you have an evil twin, protect yourself with a passcode.

With so much new technology in this phone, you might want to wait until all the bugs are worked out. The iPhone X costs \$999 and is available November 3, 2017.

Computer tips from CKCS members and friends

TECHTIP Part 1: SAVING YOUR WORK. I was working on this newsletter and had spent more than two hours adding a story and getting it the way I wanted. It had some illustrations and pictures and was perfect. I was proofing it one more time when suddenly on a pretty, sunny, quiet day outside, the power blinked off for maybe two seconds. Not once, but twice within a 15-second period. I had not saved my work at any time since adding to my document. Too late to fuss at myself for not saving my work. So this tip is to frequently save your work as you go along.

TECH TIP Part 2: ACCEPT PROGRAM UPDATES or as needed, buy the latest version. Microsoft and similar companies, continually improve their products and correct problems. Had the power failure (mentioned above) occurred 15 or 10 years ago, or even a few years ago, all my labor would likely would have been lost; that was common in early computing. Upon restarting my computer, when I first opened my word document, all the changes had been lost, however, in a section at the left there were Restore Options. It listed my document three times. Each list had its own date/time stamp. The first was about when I first started making changes and the next two were just a minute apart. I picked the last one which I assumed was the second power failure, and much to my surprise, all my work was there and It gave me the option of saving the document with an extension (autosaved). So this tip is keep your programs up to date. When updates are offered, like in Windows 10, accept them. Windows 10 was free and updates so far have also been free. If you have to buy a newer version, keep in mind that there are bound to be some improvements and problems corrected in the new program – at least we hope so.

Credit Card SCAM-very clever

This is a heads up for everyone regarding the latest in Visa fraud. Royal Bank received this communication about the newest scam.

This is happening in the Midwest right now and moving across the country.

This one is pretty slick, since they provide YOU with all the information, except the one piece they want.

Note, the callers do not ask for your card number; they already have it.

This information is worth reading. By understanding how the VISA & MasterCard telephone Credit Card Scam works, you'll be better prepared to protect yourself. One of our employees was called on Wednesday from 'VISA', and I was called on Thursday from 'MasterCard'.

The scam works like this:

Person calling says – This is (name) and I'm calling from the Security and Fraud Department at VISA. My Badge number is 12460, your card has been flagged for an unusual purchase pattern, and I'm calling to verify. This would be on your VISA card which was issued by (name of bank). Did you purchase an Anti-Telemarketing Device for \$497.99 from a marketing company based in Arizona ?' When you say 'No', the caller continues with, 'Then we will be issuing a credit to your account. This is a company we have been watching, and the charges range from \$297 to \$497, just under the \$500 purchase pattern that flags most cards.

Before your next statement, the credit will be sent to (gives you your address). Is that correct?' You say 'yes'.

The caller continues - 'I will be starting a Fraud Investigation. If you have any questions, you should call the 1-800 number listed on the back of your card (1-800-VISA) and ask for Security. You will need to refer to this Control Number. The caller then gives you a 6 digit number. 'Do you need me to read it again?'

Here's the IMPORTANT part on how the scam works - The caller then says, 'I need to verify you are in possession of your card'.

He'll ask you to 'turn your card over and look for some numbers'. There are 7 numbers; the first 4 are part of your card number, the last 3 are the Security Numbers that verify you are the possessor of the card. These are the numbers you sometimes use to make Internet purchases to prove you have the card. The caller will ask you to read the last 3 numbers to him. After you tell the caller the 3 numbers, he'll say, 'That is correct, I just needed to verify that the card has not been lost or stolen, and that you still have your card. Do you have any other questions?'

After you say no, the caller then thanks you and states, 'Don't hesitate to call back if you do', and hangs up. You actually say very little, and they never ask for or tell you the card number. But after we were called on Wednesday, we called back within 20 minutes to ask a question. We were glad we did! The REAL VISA Security Department told us it was a scam and in the last 15 minutes a new

purchase of \$497.99 was charged to our card. We made a real fraud report and closed the VISA account.

VISA is reissuing us a new number. What the Scammer wants is the 3-digit PIN number on the back of the card. Don't give it to them. Instead, tell them you'll call VISA or Master Card directly for verification of their conversation.

The real VISA told us that they will never ask for anything on the card, as they already know the information, since they issued the card! If you give the Scammer your 3 Digit PIN Number, you think you're receiving a credit. However, by the time you get your statement you'll see charges for purchases you didn't make, and by then it's almost too late and/or more difficult to actually file a fraud report.

What makes this more remarkable is that on Thursday, I got a call from a 'Jason Richardson of MasterCard' with a word-for-word repeat of the VISA Scam. This time I didn't let him finish. I hung up! We filed a police report, as instructed by VISA. The police said they are taking several of these reports daily! They also urged us to tell everybody we know that this scam is happening. I dealt with a similar situation this morning, with the caller telling me that \$3,097 had been charged to my account for plane tickets to Spain, and so on through the above routine.

It appears that this is a very active scam, and evidently quite successful....


Windows 10 WEATHER – fantastic program

Mayor's Chief Innovation Officer explains goals for Lexington

Scott Shapiro, representing Mayor Jim Gray, explained lofty goals for the city of Lexington during CKCS Tech Night on September 12. The mayor would like to see



Lexington to become the first city of our size to become a gigabyte city.

What is a gigabyte city? That would be one with fiber optic cable offering super high speed internet, plus TV and telephone. Residences and businesses which subscribe would be able to download 400 gigabyte movie or programs in two or three seconds. You may wonder if that is important, but the way movie, cable TV and internet is changing, that is likely the way of the future. Being a gigabyte city would make Lexington a most attractive destination for big business and therefore the economy.

Shapiro has been developing three other programs for Lexington:

- Notifications. Called LexAlerts, the goal is to provide text notifications to
 citizens regarding city activity on their blocks. This opt-in service would send you
 a text if your garbage pick-up day was changed due to weather, or if the city was
 scheduled to pave your street, or if you leaf-collection date was approaching.
 The city's goal is to launch this service by the end of the year.
- 2. **Hey Big Lex!** This project is named after Lexington's new logo, the big blue horse you may have seen in publications and at bus stops and on the city's web site. This project involves the University of Kentucky using a product like Amazon's Alexa system being able to ask questions about upcoming events and projects. This project is just taking shape, but he can give some insight into the potential uses they see for chatbots and virtual assistants to keep citizens and tourists informed.



3. And lastly, Shapiro talked to us about the idea of **University Cities** – a new species of city that occurs when college towns like Ann Arbor, Madison and Lexington grow up and have diversified economies. It turns out that these cities are all exceptional in many ways, including high median wages, outsized arts and culture sectors, lots of entrepreneurship and more. On October 13, there will be a conference at the University of Kentucky that explores this idea. More information can be found at www.universitycities.org.
