Everyone knows that Presidents' Day is celebrated in February and so is Valentine's Day. Have you heard of National Clean Out Your Computer Day? Well, I hadn't either, but I stumbled upon this when I was researching something else. I don't



know how true it is, but the article I found said it was established in 2000 and "it is a day to take some time out of your busy schedule to do needed care on your computers." I think most of us need a day set aside to do that. Otherwise we keep throwing things into our computers and not getting rid of things we no longer use.

The article gave some tips on how to observe the day. It suggests that you "take a look at your files and programs on your computers:

- •Organize your files and folders.
- •Delete junk files.
- Delete duplicate files.
- •Delete old files and programs not being used."





Even though it's a made up day, it's not a bad idea. We all need to designate at least one day a year as the day we are going to do some spring cleaning on our computers. The weather in February is usually not very pretty, so show your computer some love and stay inside and work on cleaning out the useless junk on your computer. But be sure to be finished by the evening, because that is also Tech Night at CKCS.

Remember that you can get some help with your Windows PC at Doctor Fixit, and get help with your Mac, iPhone or iPad on the first Saturday in

# Be Prepared

It's happened to many of us. We've made a mistake, hardware crashes or an update causes our PC to go south. You never know when it will happen, but it does. I've developed a plan for just those occasions that helps make the recovery easier.

The first step is an image backup. This allows you to recover the entire system if your hard drive crashes or it is corrupted. Most external hard drives have a program that will do this, or you can use a program such as Acronis Backup. Make sure that you have the backup recovery program saved some place safe so that you can recover the

system.

The next step is a second backup, this time of all my personal files. I prefer this to be stored in the cloud. This can get a few, or all my documents, pictures, music,

etc. back when I recover. If you own Microsoft Office 365 you have a large cloud repository on One Drive. If not, there is Google Drive, Dropbox, etc. You can also use the windows built-in backup File History available in the Setting app.

Once I have all my backups in place, I create two additional resources. These are a copy of all my currently installed or saved software I have downloaded. I set up a library in file manager called Software and move my downloaded

software to it. I categorize the library into folders. They include Applications, Internet or Online, Games, Graphics or Pictures, Multimedia or Music & Video, and Tools or Utilities. I also make sure that this library is backed up with my personal files.

The second of these resources is a catalog of all my software keys. Have you ever tried to install a program on your new computer and lost the key? If so, you understand that this will save you from repurchasing the program. I keep this information in two places. The first is a loose-leaf binder labeled 'Software Bible' with A- Z indexes. When I receive a key for a piece of software, I print the email and the file sheet(s) in my binder under the programs name. The second place I store this information is in a saved folder on my e-mail account. My primary email is setup as 'imap' so that it retains the emails I do not delete in the cloud as well as bringing it into my commuter through my e-mail program. I can then use my e-mail to

search for the program and retrieve the key. If that doesn't work I have the 'Software Bible' as a backup.

I hope this will help you to be prepared for an emergency or a new computer.



# **Course/Workshop Descriptions**

### **Classes**

Learn the Magic of Microsoft Word? Students will learn the basics of Microsoft's Word with hands-on, step by step, exercises. Topics include: ribbon toolbars; page setup; selecting, editing & moving within a document; office clipboard; cut, copy & paste; spelling & grammar checking; character & paragraph formatting; tab stops & tables; manual page breaks, page numbers; numbered & bullet lists; multiple columns; headers & footers; insert, resize & move pictures; find & replace; printing. Students must bring their own flash/thumb/USB drive to each class.

#### Advanced Photography: Composition, Perspective, Depth of Field, and Photo Stacking\*

This photography course will cover four skills that will improve your photography. *Composition* will focus on elements of design, lines, shapes, forms, textures, patterns. *Perspective* will

include seeing and photographing from many different points of view. DOF (Depth of Field) will show you how to make what you want to have in focus and what you want out of focus to emphasize your subject in your picture. *Focus Stacking* is the process of taking multiple pictures of a subject, changing focus for every picture and combining them in post process to have a photograph with everything in perfect focus. Students will have weekly assignments using the information explained in each class. The last class will be a critique of everyone's favorite photos. Students need to bring their camera with a fully charged battery and their camera manual to each class. The instructors will show you how to set your camera for each part of the course. Cost \$40.00

### **Workshops**

White Balance & Camera RAW\* Learn to use the white balance setting to improve your photos according to the lighting situation. Also, get the highest level of quality for your photos by using Camera RAW.

**Understanding Facebook** Students will learn how to create, use, and maintain a Facebook page via the computer. Adding a profile picture and cover photo, finding friends, customizing your privacy settings, posting comments and photos, and other features will be covered.

Secrets of the iPhone\* Learn important (and hidden) functions of your iPhone. Learn how to download apps, move them, nest them and delete them. Learn how to get better photos with your phone, organize your pictures, and send them in text and emails. Texting messages and using Siri will also be covered. Participants should bring their iPhone passcode and their Apple password to access the App store.

Secrets of the iPad\* Learn key information about many preinstalled apps on your iPad. Important functions in settings, how to arrange, nest, download and delete apps, sending email and texts will be covered. Taking better photos, making folders and sending them will be demonstrated. FaceTime will be included if time permits. Participants should bring their iPad passcode and their Apple password to access the App store.

\* These classes or workshops meet in the main room and their class size is determined by the instructor. All other classes meet in the computer classroom and are limited to eight students.

Students may use their own portable computers if they have the appropriate software installed (this is at the discretion of the instructor). CKCS cannot provide copies of the proprietary software.

COSTS: All classes have a fee payable to CKCS of \$60 and Workshops have a fee of \$30, unless stated otherwise (see above).

### Something new for CKCS members

This is the first time CKCS members will have an opportunity to participate in a Virtual Technology Conference (VTC) sponsored by the *Association of Personal Computer User Groups* which CKCS recently joined. APCUG is offering virtual instruction sessions on six topics that can expand your technical knowledge about the devices we use. The 50-minute classes, originating mostly from California, are conducted over the internet with individuals across the country listening in. Participants will be able to ask questions of presenters at the end of each 50-minute session. The sessions are free to CKCS members from the convenience of your own home! All you need is your computer, tablet, etc. and internet access.

As a CKCS member, this will be a great opportunity to expand your technology experience and be introduced to new skills. Details of the presentation topics and schedule are found on pages 10 to 12 of this newsletter.

#### Are you a proofreader?

When you read a newspaper, or emails, magazines, do you spot errors in grammar, spelling or content, and say to yourself, "That is embarrassing. Can't they do better than that?" If so, you may be the very person we seek.

### TECH TIP SHORTCUT TO CHANGE CASE IN MICROSOFT WORD

If you type some text in all capital letters and didn't mean to, what do you do? Type it over? Nope! What if you type a sentence normally and decide later you want it in all capital letter, no you don't have to type that over either. That is because there is a keyboard shortcut to correct the problem. It involves holding down the **SHIFT** key while you tap the **F3** key. Here is how that works. First you highlight the text you wish to change.

#### If a highlighted line of capitols letters DOES NOT have a period at the end,

each tap of the F3 key while holding down the shift key toggles that text to

- 1. all lower case then to
- 2. Title Case (The First Letter Of Each Word Is Capitalized)
- 3. then back to all capital letters

For example, tapping the F3 keys three times does this:

#### (NO PERIOD)

#### THIS TEXT IS FOR DEMONSTRATION PURPOSES

- 1. this text is for demonstration purposes
- This Text Is For Demonstration Purposes
- 3. THIS TEXT IS FOR DEMONSTRATION PURPOSES

#### If a highlighted line of capitols letters DOES have a period at the end.

each tap of the F3 key while holding down the shift key toggles that text to

- 1. lower case then to
- 2. Sentence Case (Only the first letter of the sentence Is capitalized)
- 3. then back to all capital letters

For example, tapping the F3 keys three times does this:

#### (PERIOD AT THE END)

# How to put names on a photo


Open Paint, not 3D Paint.

Note: Paint is part of Windows 10 so the easiest way to get to the Paint program is type paint in the Windows search space on your task bar.

Drag your photo onto the white pallet that opens in Paint.

Click on an insertion point on the photo, then click on the A in the top middle section of the ribbon bar.

Now type in the names, and do control + S (save).





That is all there is to it. If putting names on a dark surface, just use white letters.



#### Chromebooks for Seniors

Chromebooks are laptops that use Google's operating system. They are quite inexpensive as compared to a Windows or Apple machine. My newest Chromebook is 15" and was \$129.00 as a refurbished item.

I had a back injury some years ago when I heard about Chromebooks as they had just been rolled out. The critics slammed them as being guite useless. I seemed to be drawn to them after reading a lot about how they work. This looked like a good computer to me. I decided to challenge the critics and make this my main machine if I could. I would be able to spend some time learning as I was laid up.

One drawback that the critics named was storage. My first Chromebook had only an 18gb hard drive. I had a Gmail account and found that I had 15gb of cloud space for free. I could also add an SD card to give me more memory. Also, when you buy a Chromebook you get an extra 100gb of online storage for free for a couple of years. Another drawback was you had to be online to use your Chromebook. I always am so that didn't bother me. Improvements have made the Chromebook useful offline as of now.


The third obstacle was you couldn't load software.

True, but instead we use apps that are downloaded. In my opinion, they are better than software. Some of the apps are not as robust as a complete software suite. But, hey, I have slowed down with work and the apps work fine for me. Also, Google sets up a drive in the cloud, which means on their servers, for the user. Included is a software suite almost as good as Microsoft Office and compatible with it.

Once I got the knack of using my Chromebook I never looked back. Updates take a few seconds. The laptop starts in 7 seconds. The battery life is about 10 hours. I can watch Netflix movies, Skype, Email, create documents and slideshows, and much more. There is no need for antivirus software.

It is perfect for me. Did you know that 70 percent of schools use Chromebooks because of their price and functionality eclipsing iPads and Windows machines for students? So, the critics were dead wrong. They didn't give something new a fair chance. A couple of years ago my grandson, 14, told me how cool my Chromebook was. I sure was proud of my decision to go with my gut and try something new.

"And he had all these people around him in golf carts and people walking around taking photographs."





Be careful with the spelling of the name of a site; be careful with the first "findings" of the search engines; most times they are no findings but (many times deceptive) advertising.
- » If somebody call you about the "problems of your computer" simply hang off; they are not legitimate people so do not even waste your time even threatening them.
