Say No to Default Privacy Settings



Google, Facebook, Amazon, Microsoft and Apple say we are in control of our personal data, but they don't make it easy to change those default settings. There isn't a simple single click you can make to say "no" to their collecting data on you. It's hidden behind many layers and can be intimidating.

Awareness of this issue has come about with the Facebook incident with Cambridge Analytica a couple of years ago and the EU's implementation of the General Data Protection Regulation in May of this year. As a result, many companies have been sending out their new privacy agreements with all the legalese that most people never read.

You have probably been aware of an ability to control your data, but like many of us, haven't taken the time to figure out how to do it. Bob Brown, Joe Dietz and Brooke Thomas will be tackling the steps you can take to change some of your default settings. During the Tech Night hour, we will be able to walk you through some of controls to change those settings.

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As a result, Facebook, Google, Microsoft and Apple won't be sharing as much of your data with advertisers. Of course, these companies tout their collection of your data as helping give you a more personalized experience across their services. It's your decision whether you want advertisements and other activities to be personalized to you.

BACKUP BACKUP BACKUP

If you have never backed up your data files or your computer, you may want to start doing it ASAP.

The latest major update for Windows 10 (version 1809) was released several weeks ago and many people that tried to be the first in line to install it had major problems with it. For some it deleted <u>all</u> their data files. One person said it deleted twenty years of pictures he had taken. Fortunately, for him he had just backed up his computer two weeks before this happened.

Microsoft, after hearing about this, pulled version 1809 from the market. If you have the Pro or Enterprise version of Windows 10, you can delay updates for up to 365 days to make sure something like this doesn't happen to you. If you have the Home version you cannot delay updates, BUT, you can back-up your data files and/or your computer.

If you have never backed up your data files and/or your computer, I recommend you do so NOW if you have files you want to keep.

At this Windows 10 SIG meeting, I will talk about how to back up your data files and your computer. This will be a repeat of a topic I discussed earlier this year. Because of what has happened with the 1809 update, backing up your data and/or your computer is more important than ever.

TECH TALK

.DLL files,.PDF files, and file extensions

Shared files are usually DLL files or "general purpose" files that more than one program can use.

DLL (Dynamic Link Library) files are basically "support" files for software.

They work like this: Let's say a program needs to perform an operation. Rather than all the coding being built into the program, it uses a particular DLL file that, with a simple call, can perform the operation for it. This saves lots of programming time, especially since many of the common DLL files are already installed with Windows.

Several programs may use the same .dll file. Many problems come from having a corrupt or deleted .dll file.

We have all seen the error message "Could not find ***.dll" and wondered how to get the file back. Here is the place to go for free downloads of the most common files that are missing from your computer.

Simply type your missing file name into the search box to find if it is available, then download it. You can also go to the "dll-files.com" find the download page and scroll down the alphabetical list to find the file you need.


Most .dll files are in C:\Windows\system 32, but they are in all your programs. All programs need .dll files.

What does it do? After a few quick taps in Windows settings you will be ready to go.

Here is the list that Windows uses to advertise this app. As time permits we will go through a bunch of them

- Crop and rotate photos, adjust lighting and color, add filters and other effects.
- Trim video clips and upload them to YouTube, or other social apps.
- Create new videos from photos and video clips, with music, filters and other effects.
- Search your collection for people, places and things that are automatically tagged for you.
- Draw on a photo or video.
- Edit your video project to change music, camera motion, text, filters and more.
- Add 3D effects to videos, like a swarm of bees, lightning, or a fireball!
- Enjoy albums and videos created for you automatically edit and save the ones you like.
- Remix videos to instantly change the look and feel--recombining images, music and styles.
- Remix an album to view it as a video. Remix again for new music, style and content combos.
- When browsing your collection, make images smaller for quicker scrolling, or larger for more detail.
- Fix red eyes and blemishes in photos.
- View images as a slideshow.

News to Use

To stream a CKCS SIG be sure to use the correct URL

Sometime more than a year ago the company that CKCS uses for video streaming some of our meetings was sold. Soon afterward the new company created a new internet URL for people to receive CKCS streaming videos: "<u>https://video.nest.com/live/g5PGQK</u>".

We at CKCS scrambled to make the change in all our publications, web sites and other documents. But, we missed a few places. And, some of our members did not keep up either.

The problem is that the old URL kept on working for several months, so anyone who did not know a change was made, did not lose the service. Until recently. Now, the old URL no longer works. So be sure to switch your copy of the URL to the new one above. Or, you could just go to the CKCS website and click the Streaming Live headline on the front page.

Generally, internet URLs quit working when the owner stops paying the annual fee. This happens a lot of times after one company buys another company and prefers to use different URLs for the web property purchased. It also happens when the owner forgets to pay the fee. Sometimes, in these cases, an evildoer comes along, pays the fee and takes over the old URL. The URL can then be used to deliver advertisements, viruses or other annoying software. Some of the current anti-malware software tools can detect such situations and warn users. However, the warning messages may be vague and confusing.

Url - Definition Dictionary.com

Uniform Resource Locator: a protocol for specifying addresses on the internet. an address that identifies a particular file on the internet, usually consisting of the protocol, as http , followed by the domain name .

It is best to take the message seriously and not pursue the URL.

What is streaming?

Have you ever watched a YouTube video on your smartphone or a Netflix movie on your laptop? That's streaming. It's the way video and audio content is delivered over the internet, and has become a popular way to watch TV.

Why? Because streaming lets you watch what you want, the moment you want to. You don't have to wait for a download to finish, your DVR (digital video recorder) to record, or the show to come on the air.

Have you ever made a post on Facebook and clicked "share" only to see that you have misspelled something or made an error you wish you could correct? It's very easy to make changes.




If you click on the three dots in the top right hand corner of your post you will have some options to make changes to your post. One of those is to "edit", where you can correct any errors. Also, note that there is the option to "delete" if you decide that you shouldn't have posted it! COMPUTER TIP – The latest iPhone IOS offers a new MEASURE APP

Do you have an iPhone with the latest operating system(IOS 12)? If you do, you should try out the new measure app.

With IOS 12, you can leave your tape **measure** in the back of the kitchen drawer.



Once you install **iOS** 12, you'll notice a new Apple **app** called **Measure**. This **app** uses augmented reality to act as a tape **measure** or ruler, **measuring** objects around you with the phone's camera. **A**ll you have to do is mark a couple of spots and the **length shows up**. For a detailed description of how to use this



app, go to <u>https://support.apple.com/en-us/HT208924</u>. Or just try it out - it's pretty easy!

After trying that, (while still in the measure app), look at the bottom of the screen and click on the level. You now have a handy easy to use level when trying to make sure the picture on the wall or the table is level.

October Tech Night Review The Tech Night webinar was a success

October's Tech Night was a learning experience. Not only did we learn a lot about protecting our loT's, but also how Zoom software can help bring experts to us from afar. Bob Gostischa was in New Mexico for this presentation via Zoom. We were able to see his presentation and also ask questions as if he were in the room with us. He was also able to see us and talk with us via our laptop. Participants in the audience gave a favorable review of this method to hear from distant experts.

The hour-long presentation covered the whole gamut of threats and remedies, from our routers, to identity theft, to securing our cars and houses. He started his presentation by helping us realize how old we are by showing images from our past, like old TV's, stereos, drive in theaters and pictures from Life magazine.

He stated how life has changed and identified things we need to do to keep our computers and IoT's safe. If you missed Tech Night, or would just like a review of what he covered, he has provided us with a link to a similar presentation.

As an Avast adviser, he shared information about their products such as Avast Free and Prey, as well as information about CCleaner, Malwarebytes, and Unchecky. Links to these resources are at the end of this article.

Here are a few of the tips he gave during the presentation:

- Routers and modems need to be kept up to date and protected with a strong password. Be sure to change the password that comes with it.
- Don't put your address in your car's GPS because if it is stolen they know your address and more than

likely can open your garage door to get into your house. He suggests putting in the police department's address if it's close.

• If you use a smart speaker assistant like Google Home or Amazon Echo be sure you use a secure network and turn if off when you are not using it.

- Don't use an open WiFi to do banking or shopping.
- If you get a scamming call, don't talk, just hang up. They are recording the calls and the more you talk the more they have of your speech and can play back your words.
- Due to the previous Equifax breach, it is important to get your free credit report. You are entitled to one free credit report each year, but if you request one from each of the three credit reporting companies at different times of the year, you can monitor your credit every four months.
