



CKCS members receive a 20% discount on all class and workshop fees.



#### Should You Turn Off Your WiFi Router at Night?

ore and more websites are recommending that you turn off your WiFi router when you're sleeping. It's very simple to do. Just plug your WiFi router into a surge protector and turn it off at night. Or, use the on/off button on the back or bottom of most modern routers.



Why should you consider turning it off? To reduce your exposure to radio frequency (RF) radiation.

The radiation health risks website points out that, "WiFi devices such as anything Bluetooth or a

WiFi router, emits RF Radiation at its full strength constantly twenty four hours a day seven days a week, whenever it is turned on. And the higher the frequency that your WiFi router uses, the more intense and potentially harmful its RF Radiation remittance is."

The SYB (Shield Your Body) <u>website</u> writes, "There are literally thousands of high-quality peer-reviewed scientific studies linking this type of radiation to negative health effects like cancer and infertility. In one such study, scientist Dr. Martin Pall calls WiFi an important threat to human health and details seven well-established effects of WiFi exposure, including sperm dysfunction, cell damage, and oxidative stress. The World Health Organization lists EMF radiation as a Class 2B carcinogen. In reality, there is no safe level of EMF."

In addition to EMF radiation issues, some folks suffer from symptoms of EHS (electromagnetic hypersensitivity.)

The EMF empowerment <u>website</u> indicates these may include headaches, nausea, itchiness, impaired sleep, and difficulty sleeping.

If your WiFi router is next to your computer or iPad desk, you might consider buying a WiFi router guard or cover. These are usually mesh shield covers or cages that act as a Faraday cage for radiation exposure.

Other possibilities include using an automatic electrical timer to turn off your router at a specific time before you go to bed.

When possible, some websites <u>recommend</u> turning off your WiFi router whenever you aren't using it. In addition, if your computer is close to your router, some suggest using an ethernet cable to connect directly rather than relying on a wireless Internet signal.

Here's how the website EMF Risks <u>describes</u> it: "On the rear of the router, you typically have 2-4 10-base-T jacks to which you can attach a standard internet cable to which you can connect your computer. This recommendation is, however, situation-specific in that it assumes your computer will be used close to the router. The decision to use hard cabling connections is up to you."

#### **Spring Storms?**


Experts say you need to turn off your WiFi router during spring thunderstorms that strike the Bluegrass, especially in March, April and May. Even if you have the router plugged into a surge protector, that might not be enough during a raging storm just outside your window.

As How Stuff Works <u>writes</u>, "The family pet might have the right idea when a thunderstorm approaches: Hide under the bed and wait it out, whining nervously. That's not just acceptable behavior; it might, in fact, be quite safe."

It adds, "A surge protector can also help because it limits the amount of voltage the devices can receive. That allows for computers, printers, phones and the like to avoid the current a big surge would produce [source: <u>Graham</u>]. But don't just invest in 19 surge protectors and call yourself safe. A big surge can bypass the protector, for one, causing a bit more electricity than advertised to get through. For this reason, it's suggested that if you do have the time and wherewithal, it wouldn't hurt to disconnect electronic devices from wall sockets."

In addition, "Now keep in mind that we're not talking tornadoes or

hurricanes here. If you're watching a twister approach vour house at breakneck speed, please don't take the time to fuss over vour iPod dock. Simply get to the safest place in the house (a cellar or -- if you're strictly at ground level -- the most interior room or closet of your



home) as soon as you

possibly can. The same lesson that applies to tornadoes also applies to your run-of-the-mill storm: Back up all your data religiously, just in case."

#### Mandatory Ten-Digit Local Dialing Coming to 859 Area Code

If you live in the 859 area code in central or northern Kentucky, better get ready to dial the area code plus the phone number you're calling starting in late April.

As AT&T <u>describes</u> it in a billing flyer, "Get ready to change the way you dial your local calls."

"To complete all local calls, you will now need to dial area code + telephone number. This applies to all calls within your area code that are currently dialed with seven digits," notes the second—largest wireless phone company in the U.S. Starting April 24, the switch over to ten—digit dialing begins in selected areas throughout the country. Beginning October 24, you must dial the 859 area code plus the phone


number or the connection won't go through. If you dial just the seven—digit number, you'll get a recording saying the call cannot go through.

The F.C.C. says ten digit dialing is designed to "conserve phone numbers and slow the need for new area codes." In other words, we're running out of numbers. Another reason

for the switch is a change in the National Suicide Prevention Hotline manned by mental health crisis counselors, to the three–digit number, 9-8-8 (similar to 9-1-1 the nationwide emergency number), starting July 16 of next year.

One interesting note is that Kentucky's Fort Knox army post adopted the ten-digit dialing back in 2014 for off-

base numbers. The post is actually served by area code 502 (the area code serving Frankfort, Georgetown, Louisville and many other cities), but men and women on the post can make local calls to cities in both the 270 and 364 area codes. Because of that unique situation, Fort Knox imposed tendigit dialing ahead of many other areas.

The change forces all telephone companies – copper–wire landline service (the system that all of us used to use in the Bell System days), wireless cell phone providers (such as AT&T, Consumer Cellular, Verizon, and T–Mobile), and landline service over the Internet (such as Metronet, Spectrum phone, Ooma, Vonage, RingCentral Office, Dialpad, MessageBird and others) to update their systems.

The ten-digit dialing switch will also force anyone living in a 988 area code to begin dialing a "1" before the area code and phone number.


#### Springtime, Hope, and Joy

#### They're Back! Aviation Summer Camps

ou can hear the mother's pride through the phone as she tells about her son enrolling in Purdue University's aeronautical engineering program. "It all started with aviation camp," she says.

A grandmother is surprised when her granddaughter tells her what she wants to do with her life.

"She came to me, asked me to sit down, and gave me the news. This girl, who can never make up her mind, finally chose a career for herself. She wants to be an air traffic controller. It was the trip up the tower at Blue Grass Airport that helped make up her mind...aviation camp really did change her life."

These are two stories of many that camp organizers hear

every summer as young people figure out how they want to spend their careers.

The non–profit Aviation Museum of Kentucky (commonly called AMK), located at Blue Grass Airport in Lexington, has been holding aviation summer camps for young people since the mid-90s. Yet many people don't know about them. These camps are unique young people get to help fly a small plane (weather permitting) during the two-day camps.

After the coronavirus pandemic forced the museum to cancel last year's camps, they are back this summer.

April's Tech Night will focus on the camps.

Bob Jones, camps director, will discuss the camps and talk about why you might want to register your youngster for camp.

CKCS TECH NIGHT Who: Bob Jones, aviation camps director will speak at CKCS Tech Night in April.


What: Aviation Summer Camps

#### Warm, Warmer, Warmest? Forecast: A Warm Spring and Early Summer


April may be the month when we can store away the coats, hats, and gloves. That's if the prediction from NOAA is correct. Those of you who are weather-wise know that NOAA runs the National Weather Service.

Current predictions show a warmer than normal April, May and June. In fact, there's a 50–60% chance of above normal temperatures for central Kentucky during that period. AccuWeather <u>predicts</u> that La Niña – where the water in the Pacific Ocean near the equator is cooler than normal – will still be in the driver's seat, impacting our weather.

Central and eastern Kentucky are expected to be wetter than normal with a higher than normal severe thunderstorm risk (March to May 2021).

AccuWeather writes, "St. Louis; Little Rock, Arkansas; Jackson and Tupelo, Mississippi; Nashville and Memphis, Tennessee; Lexington and Paducah, Kentucky; and even Indianapolis are all in the area where AccuWeather is projecting the highest risk of severe thunderstorms from March through May."

AccuWeather adds that the weather pattern this spring somewhat resembles 2011, which was a very active year for spring storms. More than 800 tornadoes were reported in April 2011. That was a record for the most tornadoes in a single month.



NOAA's three-month outlook for April, May, and June shows a much warmer than normal trend for Kentucky and the eastern one-third of the country, the southeast U.S. as well as portions of the south-central U.S. and portions of the western mountain states.

#### **Ask Bob Rankin Columns Inform**

espite what you may have heard, the Internet was not designed to withstand a nuclear war, Al Gore did not actually claim to invent the Internet, and when you delete files from your computer they're not actually gone.

You'll find these tidbits and more in the "Ask Bob Rankin" column. Rankin writes about tech support, boosting your WiFi signal, sending mass email, computer displays, and more.

Rankin has written for *Computer World*, *Newsday*, and a number of other publications.

If it's time to buy a new computer monitor, Rankin recommends not even considering very small computer displays. He writes, "Screens in the 22 to 24 inch range are affordable (typically under \$150), and will serve well for most home and office tasks (email, web browsing, composing documents, online video). If you are into photography, graphic arts, or serious gaming, you'll want a monitor that's 27 or more

inches. Just remember that screen sizes are measured on the diagonal, just like televisions."

One reader <u>asks</u> Bob how to improve the WiFi signal throughout his home. Rankin writes, "Yes, where you place your router does matter. If your wireless laptop or tablet is in another room, the signal has to go through walls and other interference before it reaches you. You can change the positioning and give everyone equal access. For example, in an open office room setting, instead of placing the router in a corner, try putting it in the middle of the room, where the signal should extend out more evenly, giving better coverage to the entire office. If you're looking for optimal wireless coverage in various parts of your home, position the router in the middle of the house. Moving it up off the floor, to a bookcase or shelf, should also help."

Rankin offers a whole slew of tips and tricks in his columns. Check them out if you're troubleshooting your computer or just want to learn more tech advice.



#### How Do I Know When It's Time to Buy a New WiFi Router?

Shortly before Halloween of last year, I noticed my Internet connection was getting slower and slower. I would visit <a href="CKCS.org">CKCS.org</a> to check the latest newsletter. Then I would visit <a href="The Animal Rescue Site">The Animal Rescue Site</a> to give free food to shelter pets.

Molasses pours faster out of the bottle than my Internet service. I ran the free Speedtest app on my Macs and iPad. My Internet speed was as fast as usual.



But the connection was problematic. Pages were quite slow to load. Delivery of email was on the pony express route. I would open my email app and new mail would eventually appear.

I considered what was going on and realized that my eight—year—old WiFi router might be the problem. Most folks don't realize the beating their routers encounter. They can get very warm and have to deal with interference from neighbors' signals, microwave ovens, and even wireless landline phones. In addition, electrical spikes in the home (when the refrigerator compressor kicks on or the dryer is running) can take a toll on the router even if it's plugged into a surge protector.



After checking everything I could think of, I ordered a new TP–Link router from Amazon (using <u>smile.amazon.com</u> so CKCS gets a portion of what I'm paying Amazon.)

TP-Link is one of the top-rated routers, according to thewirecutter.com, one of my favorite review websites.

If you're wondering about your WiFi router's performance, here are some signs your device is failing, according to <u>robots.net</u>:

• Slow Internet – If web pages are loading more slowly than normal that's a telltale sign that your router is not up to par. robots.net recommends plugging an ethernet cable from your computer into the router (and turning WiFi off on your desktop or laptop.) If the signal perks up and pages load much faster, that's a clear indication your router's performance is failing. If you are streaming a show and the website on your computer or app on your iPad rebuffers constantly (a circular arrow often turns on the screen when there's a signal problem), that's a sign all is not right in router—land.



- Your router stops functioning altogether or the indicator lights stop glowing – This is an obvious indication that your router is unable to function properly. Of course, you want to check your internet service provider first to make sure there's no outage in your neighborhood.
- Overheating This occurs more often than most people realize. robots.net writes, "Most routers, depending on the brand, are made from quality materials that can withstand minor impacts and heat. However, routers aging from three to five years and up can be damaged by heat. So, if you've been using your device longer than the mentioned average lifespan and it suddenly breaks down, perhaps its internal components are no longer working due to heat. When this happens, try to move your router to a place where the airflow is good or place a fan pointing at the device and see if it exhibits any difference. If not, it's about time to replace your router to a newer version."

#### Tiny Checkmark Might Mean the Beginning of the End for Spam Calls

f you own an iPhone or Android smartphone, you may begin noticing a new feature over the coming months. On the iPhone, a tiny checkmark will appear in the Recents list in the phone app as well as in call details. On some Android phones, you'll spot a "verified" sign on the incoming call screen.

The tiny checkmark and "verified" sign mean the phone company believes the call was legitimate and not from some scammer trying to sell you snake oil. A TidBits <u>article</u> provides an overview of the new feature. (TidBits is one of the Internet's oldest Apple–oriented blogs and newsletters.)


Glenn Fleishman writes, "These tiny checkmarks appear on calls that pass through a new standard implemented on major telephone networks starting in 2019 and gradually being rolled out by smaller ones since."

Carriers are in a race to block spam calls from ever reaching their customers. The deadline is June of this year for major phone companies and those providing phone service over the Internet to implement the checkmark or "verified" sign. These indicate that an incoming phone call is verified by the carrier and is not spam.


The standard is called STIR/SHAKEN, and major phone companies with 100,000 or more lines must implement the new feature by June 30. Smaller phone companies have until June 30, 2023.

"Ultimately, companies and carriers will find their calls dropped or blocked unless they embrace STIR/ SHAKEN as it's adopted by mobile phone operating systems and the rest of the phone network," adds Fleishman.

This will force spammers to rely much more heavily on legitimate originating phone numbers. It should make them a lot more vulnerable, able to be tracked, and even more easily arrested. "It could help authorities shut down boiler—room operations much more quickly, too," writes Fleishman.



The FCC's <u>website</u> describes how the new system called STIR/SHAKEN will work and how it will help phone users. Unwanted spam phone calls are the number-one complaint of phone users worldwide. Mobile phone carrier Verizon says it blocked nine billion unwanted calls in December of last year alone.





hen I was a child, I wanted to be a vet. Animals amazed me. At the time, I thought Wow. These guys are smarter than many humans. (I think a fair number of

humans would agree with that sentiment today.)

My career plans changed when I discovered that, as a vet, I would have to put animals to sleep.

But I never lost my fascination with four– legged creatures. If you're having a really crummy day, they can

So it should be no surprise that the first minute I glimpsed *The Yorkshire* Vet on the Acorn TV streaming service, I was hooked. (As I write this, season one is available on Amazon Prime Video for Amazon Prime subscribers.)

The show follows the staff as they treat animals at the Skeldale Vet Centre in Thirsk, North Yorkshire, in northeast Great Britain.

#### **James Herriot Connection**

This is the town where noted author and vet James Herriot worked and wrote his popular series of books, *All Creatures Great and Small*. In addition, this is the veterinary practice Herriot started decades ago.

Vets Julian Norton and Peter Wright, along with the nurses and other employees, make this an engaging series. The vets make house calls to the Yorkshire countryside, and this makes for long, long workdays as they perform duties saving lambs and calves and working also on horses, mules, pigs, alpacas, and a long list of farm animals.



#### "Absolutely wonderful"



**Batch Process** – reduce the size of many pictures at once to send to someone. Or turn a bunch of photos to black–and–white in a few easy steps.

**Batch rename**- Just took a trip to Africa and all my pictures are identified by img\_.00002 or DCS0789. I want them all to be labeled something like Africa 001, Africa002. How do I do that?

For this meeting, I will be using a free program called **FastStone**. It does a great job of things mentioned above. I will also show you how to get the program. Other programs such as Corel PaintShop Pro, Adobe Photoshop, Irfan view, etc. offer similar ways to do these processes.

#### Windows 10 Update Designed to Fix Printer Woes

Got printing troubles with your Windows 10 computer? In late March, a number of tech sites <u>reported</u> a new Windows update was issued to tackle that problem. The apparent cause of the problem was an earlier Windows patch that Microsoft released, creating printing headaches. Symptoms include the dreaded blue screen of death computer crash (BSOD), missing color graphics in printouts, blank pages sent from the printer, and misalignment and formatting issues, according to the Pocket Lint <u>website</u>. "With an increasing number of people working from home and buying and using printers, these sorts of issues are obviously a large concern," added writer Adrian Willings.

#### Redesigned iMacs Coming With Larger Screens?

Apple is expected to launch new designs of its popular all—in—one computer, possibly by late spring. DigitalTrends and several other tech sites report the company is expected to replace its 21.5—inch models with slightly larger 23—and 24 inch—screens. The most popular iMac – the 27—inch screen model – is said to keep its larger display. Analysts claim these will be the first iMacs with the new M1 chip, made by Apple. It will replace the Intel processors that began appearing in Macs back in 2006. So far, Apple has installed the new M1 chip in its Mac mini desktop models, as well as its MacBook Air and MacBook Pro laptops. MacRumors first reported that several iMac models had been removed from Apple's online store, suggesting they have been discontinued.

#### **Apple Introduces New Teacher Portfolio**

Apple is providing teachers with a new product designed to create a collection of their most creative and engaging lessons to share with colleagues and leadership teams. As part of the company's Apple Teacher Learning Center, the Portfolio contains a series of templates and lesson plans for educators to use in the classroom. Apple also updated its Everyone Can Create Curriculum, which provides new features for the iPad. Apple says more than 5,000 K–12 schools and institutions are using the Everyone Can Create Curriculum worldwide.

#### SPOTIFY REDESIGNS MAC & WEB APPS

Spotify, one of the largest music streaming services, has announced it has updated its Mac and web apps to make them easier to use. The move follows a major iOS update. According to the 9to5Mac website, Spotify told its users, "Since the desktop experience served as the original window to the world for Spotify, this was not a task we took lightly. It took months of tests and research, talking to users, and gathering feedback. Now, we're pleased to deliver a new, clean design, more controls, and a great new foundation for our listeners to use Spotify across our desktop app and web player for the years to come." Spotify is based in Stockholm and has more than 345 million active monthly users, including more than 155 million paying subscribers.

#### **New File Explorer Icons Coming to Windows 10**

Windows 10 users should look for a visual overhaul to the File Explorer system icons—including the Recycle Bin, Pictures, Documents folders, and devices such as disk drives and flash drives. A Microsoft spokesperson is quoted in The Verge as saying "that should make it a little easier to tell them apart at a glance." As The Verge <u>notes</u>, "These icon changes are fairly minor in the grand scheme of Windows, but they're part of a broader effort inside Microsoft to modernize Windows."



#### Brand Loyalty for iPhone at All-Time High

ot an iPhone? If so, when it comes time to replace it, chances are you'll buy another iPhone. A new cell phone brand loyalty survey conducted this year by sellcell reveals just that.

More than 90% of iPhone users plan to buy another iPhone when they replace their current phone.

8.1% of iPhone users would switch to a different phone brand.

Meanwhile, Samsung Android phone loyalty has dropped to 74% in 2021 from nearly 86% in 2019.

More than one—quarter of Samsung Android phone users say they will buy another brand when they upgrade to a new phone.

Of those leaving Samsung, the survey revealed 53% will switch to an iPhone for their next phone.

The primary reason for the switch? Privacy concerns.

31.5% cited privacy and security as the primary reason why they're switching. 24% say they'll buy a Google Pixel phone next time.

The survey also found that Motorola and LG phone owners were the most likely to switch brands.

71% of Motorola phone users and nearly 63% of LG users are planning to buy a different brand of phone when they upgrade.

SellCell asked those taking the survey to pick their favorite model from a list of major smartphones released in or after August 2020.



#### Responses from the 2021 sellcell study include:
