Your shiny new iPhone is filled with features and yet you've barely learned the basics.

Are you considering upgrading your Mac to macOS Big Sur? And what about that iPad sitting idle on the desk because you haven't had the time to go beyond the basics?

If any of these scenarios describe you, then iHelp and Dr. Fixit are for you.

The sessions are held on the first Saturday of the month from 10 A.M. to noon.

iHelp tackles questions and issues with Apple products, including iPhones, Macs, and iPads.

Dr. Fixit troubleshoots problems and answers questions about Windows 10 computers as well as Android devices.



Join us in person at CKCS or on Zoom to meet the staff at Ky Trade.



This Month: Electric cars to 1960s computers APCUG to offer plenty at August VTC

Apple Issues Record iPhone Updates iOS 14.7 Breaks Record for iOS Releases

Many folks who don't live and breathe in the tech world might have missed this milestone.

In late July, Apple released iOS 14.7 for its iPhones (and iPadOS 14.7 for its popular tablets.)

Tech websites are noting this latest release is unprecedented. It breaks the record for the most releases of any iOS version. In other words, Apple has never released an iOS ending in .7 before (with the exception of iOS 13.7 which only added contact tracing for Covid.) The latest release includes:

- Wireless battery pack support for the iPhone 12 series (called MagSafe).
- Air quality in the built-in weather app is adding more countries including France, Canada, the Netherlands, Spain and elsewhere.
- Podcasts Library update
- Fixes for Dolby Atmos and Apple Music Lossless
- An upgrade making it easier for users to set up multiple named timers in the Home App.

• A fix for Braille displays in the Mail App.



Windows 11 Coming Later This Year Free Download, But Can Your PC Run It?

You might remember that Jerry Nixon, a Microsoft employee, said more than five years ago that Windows 10 would be the last release of the PC operating system. Not so.

It turns out Microsoft has rethought the matter. Windows 11 is expected later this year.

You can use the PC Health Check App to see if your machine will run the latest Windows version.

The minimum requirements include a minimum 1 GHz processor with two or more cores on a compatible 64–bit processor or System on a Chip (SoC).

Four GB RAM, 64 GB or larger storage device, UEFI, Secure Boot capable, Trusted Platform Module 2.0 are all required. Read more from <u>Windows Central</u>.

As *Tom's Guide* points out, millions of Windows users could potentially be left out in the cold – unable to run Windows 11 because of stiffer minimum security requirements:

"But Windows 11 changes all that, leaving a significant number of Windows 10 computers - even high-end workstations from just three years ago and possibly current Surface Studio - out in the cold, because they won't meet the minimum requirements, which have changed significantly for the first time since Windows 7 launched in 2009."

Tom's Guide adds that plenty of folks aren't exactly sure which machines the final version of Windows 11 will run on because Microsoft has not released details.

"...Even a major workstation CPU that came out in 2018 will likely not be able to run Windows 11 and it's quite possible that any PC processor older than 8th Gen Core Intel or AMD Ryzen 2000 series will not be supported in the final release." The real issue appears to be the Trusted Platform Module (TPM) that many computer users don't even know about. The TPM provides a secure way to store encryption keys, certificates and other sensitive data on computer hardware.

Microsoft issued a statement saying PCs of the future need a way to protect from common and sophisticated attacks such as ransomware and attacks from nation-states.

TPM is disabled on a lot of modern PCs. *Tom's Guide* reports, "The good news is that, if you have a processor from the last three to five years, there's a good chance you can <u>enable TPM</u> in the UEFI BIOS and solve this problem."

As laptopmag.com writes, "Microsoft is walking a tightrope. It needs to strike the right balance between requiring strict security measures while including as many Windows users as possible. The messaging to this point has been poor, with users learning their systems won't run Windows 11 because of a security chip they'd never heard of before. Then there is the CPU compatibility which is widely considered to be too constraining. With Windows 11 arriving within months (possibly in October), Microsoft doesn't have long to clear the air. We hope it expands the hardware requirements to include more PCs without sacrificing the minimum security measures it wants to enforce for years to come. Including 7th Gen Intel and AMD Zen 1 chips would go a long way to achieving that goal."






Topic: VPNs

Here's Where You Can Check Out Free eBooks

If you're the type of person who just can't get enough good books to read, you probably want to get a library card from more than one central Kentucky library.

Years ago, a CKCS student from Frankfort who took one of my Mac classes urged me to travel to the state's capital city to get a library card from Paul Sawyier Library (named for one of Kentucky's most famous artists – known for his impressionist paintings.)

I traveled to Frankfort, had lunch with her, and then followed her to the city's public library to get my card. It was well worth the trip.

Years later, I was in Winchester and stopped by the Clark County Public Library to get a card there. That was another worthwhile trip.

Here's the deal. Both libraries belong to Kentucky Libraries Unbound. It's a huge consortium of Kentucky libraries from Pikeville to Paducah.

Because Kentucky Libraries Unbound sometimes has more copies of the same eBook and audiobook than Lexington Public Library, your wait time before the book is checked out to you might be shorter.

In addition, it's wise to keep these book sources in mind:

Open Library

Registered users can browse through millions of books free. Genres include everything from sci-fi to medicine to thrillers to romance. Some audiobooks are also available here. A really neat feature is the "search inside" option. If you're looking for a specific piece of information, Open Library lets you choose an eBook and "look inside" by using a search bar to peek into the book.

Internet Archive

Some folks call this the Internet's digital time machine. Internet Archive boasts 32–million eBooks, and by most accounts, is the largest digital library ever created. Visit the page and you might be overwhelmed as I was. You'll find so many topics here ranging from Old Time Radio to Sermons and religious lectures to NASA images and comedy films. There are men's magazines from the 1970s and genealogy records. Kentucky digital newspapers are here as well as Duke University libraries and items from the Montana State Library. As you scroll down the page, you'll discover a treasure trove. Dig in and expect to be overwhelmed!

World Digital Library

This website declares, "Search 19,174 items from 193 countries between 8000 BCE and 2000." That remark hides the fact that World Digital Library, launched in 2009, contains rare books, manuscripts and plenty of rare materials going back to 8,000 B.C. <u>The MakeUseOf website</u> points out that not all eBooks are free to read and download, but users are allowed to browse and view specific chapters.

Wiley Online Library

If you looking for sources you can trust, you've come to the right place. Wiley Online Library serves up plenty of trustworthy resources for term papers, science projects, and other projects. Scroll down the page and you find subjects ranging from veterinary medicine to chemistry to computer science and information technology.

The Online Books Page

This website provides access to books that are free and available to read via the Internet. Currently, there are more than two million books in various formats. Under "Features," you'll find links to "A Celebration of Women Writers" and "Banned Books Online." Under "Archives and Indexes," I clicked on General and got access to so many links that I didn't know where to begin. Non–English books include French, German, Italian, Hebrew, Russian, Danish, Icelandic, Chinese, Australian indigenous languages and everything in–between.

ReadPrint

TIME Magazine declared this website one of its 50– best websites in 2010. ReadPrint has more than 8,000 online books by 3,500 famous authors.

<u>Authorama</u>

Free books from many different authors are posted here for users to read online or off–line. As the website says, "The books may have been published before but not in this form."

International Children's Digital Library

An effort by the University of Maryland to provide the world's largest online multicultural collection of children's literature. It offers free access to books from more than 42 countries.

More Free eBooks

<u>Bibliomania</u>

Don't be put off by this website's bright red background. Bibliomania has won plenty of awards including being voted one of the top 300 websites in the world by *Forbes* magazine. Here you can read free Sherlock Holmes mysteries, short stories and plays, and works by writers such as Mark Twain.

ManyBooks.net

"Lots of eBooks. 100% Free" claims Many Books. The site claims there are 150,000+ fellow readers. This site allows users to search free books by language. Once you register and decide to download a book, you've given plenty of formats from which to choose including EPUB, MOBI, PDF, FB2, RTF, HTML, and more.

Free Computer Books

Links ranging from a tutorial to the Python computer language to Java programming for kids, to rational cybersecurity for business are all here. The site also allows readers to explore cloud computing, learn about networking devices, and the essence of software engineering.

Overdrive

The Makeuseof website says, "Overdrive is the cleanest, fastest, and most legal way to access millions of eBooks-not just ones in the public domain, but even recently released mainstream titles. There is one hitch though: you'll need a valid and active public library card or to be a student to have access to these free books. Overdrive works with 30,000 public libraries in over 400 different countries worldwide."

Library Genesis

Despite one website telling its readers, "you'll have to get used to the terrible user interface of the site overall," Library Genesis makes the list because it indexes nearly three million eBooks and 60 million articles. Here, you'll find both fiction and non-fiction and a variety of genres if you can get used to the interface.

Centsless Books

This site displays free Kindle books available on Amazon. The goal of Centsless Books is to keep you up-to-date on all of the free eBooks provided by Amazon. One note: Some of the free books are only "free" if you belong to Amazon's Kindle Unlimited service.

Feedbooks

Offering more than onemillion books, Feedbooks is know for its huge collection of fiction, nonfiction, copyrighted and public domain books, free and paid versions. Despite the large collection, only about half of the books are free.

A Potpourri of Tech News Just For You

Windows Commands

I would guess that most Windows users are so used to using icons and a mouse that they've forgotten many of the keyboard commands available from the operating system.

Folks who used DOS (Disk Operating System) years ago, became quite familiar with keyboard commands before the mouse became standard on PCs.

MUO (Make Use Of) is offering a free <u>downloadable PDF cheat</u> <u>sheet</u> that just might jog your memory. You have to fill out a short form to access the sheet.

Report: Mac and iPad Sales Shine In Latest Apple Earnings Report

Record numbers of Mac computers and iPad tablets are selling as people continue working from home. Tech sites that cover Apple, including <u>MacRumors</u> and <u>Macworld</u> reported that news as Apple detailed its third quarter sales for this year.

"According to Apple CEO Tim Cook, the iPad had its best June quarter in nearly a decade, while the Mac set a new June quarter revenue record. Apple CFO Luca Maestri said the last four quarters have been the Mac's best four quarters ever," reports MacRumors.

A chip shortage didn't stop Apple's record sales. iPhone revenue accounted for nearly half of Apple's third quarter revenue despite problems getting chips. Services (iCloud, Apple News+, Apple Music, Apple TV+, and others) set an all time sales record. The Apple Watch (which is in the wearables category) also was a hot seller.

Several Dell Alienware Gaming PCs Banned In Six States

Try buying several Dell Alienware Aurora R12 or Aurora R10 PCs in six states and your order will be cancelled, reports PCMag and PC Gamer. Newly adopted energy efficiency requirements in Vermont, Washington state, Oregon, Hawaii, Colorado, and California are the reason. Those PCs simply use too much power to legally be sold in those places, according to various news reports.

1Password Introduces Version for Linux

Popular password manager, 1Password, has been available for years on the Mac and Windows platform.

Now the Canadian developer has released an official version for <u>Linux</u>. David Teare, the founder of AgileBits, based in Ontario, says, "Linux support is far and away our most requested feature."

He adds, "We believe that native apps with deep integration create a better experience, so 1Password for Linux will feel right at home on your desktop, whichever flavor of Linux you choose."

Other Linux password managers include Bitwarden, Buttercup, KeePassXC, Enpass, and myki, among others.
